Ants Can Be Controlled

Ants can be a real household nuisance but application of the right insectedes will bring them un-der control in a hurry Entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service say that chlordane or dieldrin, sold in many stores as roach and ant sprays, are very effective against ants.

The entomologists point out that several species of ants can become pests in the home. Some may nest in the house, but mos thuild their nests outside and find their way inside through openings. Once they find a food supply they set up a regular route between the food and

their nests. The most common species found in Texas are the Pharoah, black crazy, fire and Argentine ants. They range in size from the tiny Pharoahs to the much larger fire ants. They feed on any kind of food material in the home including sweets and greasy foods.
The thief ant prefers greasy foods.
For inside the home applications,
the entomologists recommend a

two or three precent chlordane or a five-tenths (.5) percent dieldrin household spray. Special attention should be give to drainboards, win-dow sills, door openings and pansheles.

For outdoor applications, the entomologists recommend a 10 per-cent chlordane, 2 percent dieldrin or 5 percent heptachlor dust. If an emulsion spray is used, they strong-ly urge that label directions be ly urge that label directions be followed. They suggest that a band of nsecticidal dust or spray be ap-plied around the foundaton wall and that all ant nests in the yard

They point out that repeated ap-plications of the insecticides may be needed to give complete control of ants. They suggest that a copy of L-311, "Tebas Guide for Con-trolling Household Insects" be obtroiling Household insects be ob-tained from the local county ex-tension agent The Guide lists con-trol measures for the most common-ly found household insects includ-ing those attacking fabrics, food, structures and humans.

Six Votes in Wheat Election

Only six votes were cast in Lynn county Thursday of last week on continuing the system of marketing cuotas for the 1961 wheat crop. Of the six votes cast, four were for the proposal and two were against, according to the Lynn County ASC Office. The vote carried nation-wide, by more than the required two-thirds majority.

Charcoal Rot May Hit Grains, Other Crops

Charcoal rot is a common disease of grain sorghum and corn in most areas. The fungus root rot causes more damage than head smut in many area. Close to 100 percent infection may occure in susceptible sections o r varieties. Losses are apt to be heaviest dur-

ing years of little rainfall with dry-land farming.

Damage is noticed during June and July in South Texas. The dis-ease appears in north Texas durng August and September. Damage is easiest to detect when the plants are approaching matur-

the plants are approaching maturity. Charcoal rot damaged plants have poorly filled heads or ears with lightweight grain. Diseased stalks ripen and dry early.

Weakening of the stalks by the fungus, in many cases, causes them to lodge. Stalks are soft an discolored at the base with the pith disintegrated and shredded. Small pinpoint, blackish, seed bodies may be among the shredded pith.

Other crops affected by the disease are alfalfa, cotton, lespedeza,

ease are alfalfa, cotton, lespedeza, sugar beets, sweetpotatoes watermelons, sunflowers. peppers, cow-peas, beans and peas. Crops that have their seedling stages and those that mature in cool or rainy weath-
