#### Truman Proposes Moscow Mission, Rocks Foundation of U. S. Policy; Russ Ask Big Four Parley Renewal

Bi-partisan unity in the U. S. was grievously wounded by the knife-edged Berlin crisis when, on the one hand. President Truman called a private conference with Under Secretary of State Robert Lovett and Secretary of State George Marshall to mull over the



and, on the other hand, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey summoned his foreign affairs advisor, John Foster Dulles, from Paris to find out for himself what was going on in Europe.

#### DIPLOMACY:

Trip Canceled

To President Truman, for engineering the abortive deal to send Chief Justice Fred Vinson to Moscow for personal talks with Kremlin leaders on the atomic bomb, went the credit for producing the most heroically proportioned diplomatic faux pas of the year.

It happened very swiftly and very simply. Mr. Truman deciding suddenly to try his own hand at straightening out the tangled foreign mess, started making preparations to send Vinson to Russia.

THEN the state department heard about it. Robert Lovett, under-secretary of state, profoundly shocked, notified George Marshall who came winging frantically across the Atlantic from Paris to stop the President from committing what he considered a blunder of immense

The Vinson trip was called off, of and President Truman backed hastily away from the whole business after issuing an abashed note of explanation.

BUT THE memories lingered on. Mr. Truman, in the minds of those who knew or thought they knew about the international situation. had gone completely beyond the pale with this momentary, headstrong effort.

His campaign opponent, Gov. Thomas Dewey, at first wavered between righteous anger at what he obviously considered a deliberate flouting of the established bi-partisan foreign policy and elation that the Democratic candidate had made such a grievous tactical error.

And although the Dewey samp was astute enough to realize that its cause would benefit more if it magnanimously ignored the affair than if it leaped in for the slaughter, it nevertheless redounds to the New York governor's credit that he did not take advantage of this internationally dangerous situation for his personal gain.

#### Significance

Why was President Truman so widely and thoroughly castigated for making what he undoubtedly looked upon as a sincere, constructive attempt to clear up the Russians' "misunderstanding" of the problem of atomic control?

Because his intention of sending Chief Justice Vinson to Moscow represented a serious divergence from the basic characteristic of U. S. foreign policy-toughness with Russia. MR. TRUMAN'S proposal amount-

ed to a softening up of the laborithe U. S. toward Moscow, It was tantamount to saying in a pleading voice, "Let's get together once more and try to talk this thing

Current history has proved that President sought to institute in the Vinson trip has been completely unavailing in dealing with Russia since the war. Moreover, insofar as personal diplomacy always tends to bypass the United Nations, it usually has an ill effect on international relations in general.

IN THE final analysis, a personal visit to the Kremlin by Vinson probably would have upset the entire, carefully fabricated structure of the policy upon which the U.S. is depending to defeat Russia's were making no concession to aims in Europe.

#### ANYTHING NEW-What, No War?

Answers to the question "Does Russia want war?" are a drug on the market, in informed and uninformed circles alike, but now and then someone comes up with a reply that is a little more imaginative than most.

ONE OF this kind has been furnished by an experienced professional diplomat-necessarily anonymous lest his identity become known to the Russians—who is attending the U. N. meetings in Parls. He said:

"There will be no war soon. The reason is that Stalin, the head of the peace party, has just had Andrei Zhdanov, the head of the war party, murdered.

(Zhdanov, who died several weeks ago, was one of the ranking members of the politburo where he was almost on a par with Molotov in power and influence. He had been talked of as a possible successor to Stalin. His demise was mourned with parades, pageantry and ostentation by Stalin, the boys in the Kremlin and the Russian people.)

"HE (ZHDANOV) urged immediate war. He argued that if Russia was defeated militarily she would win politically, since the resulting horror and chaos would cause a new, irresistible wave of commu-

"As long as Zhdanov was successful, Stalin gave him his head. When he failed in Yugoslavia, Stalin told him to lay off. Zhdanov defied the Soviet generalissimo. So Stalin got his head.

"This means that Stalin's waiting tactics have prevailed. There will be no war soon."

#### BIG FOUR:

Come Again

While the U.S. state department was exerting all its influence to prevent a return to direct negotiations with Russia at this time, the Soviets were hammering away at the opposite course of action by demanding that Big Four discussions of the Berlin issue be resumed.

THE TWO viewpoints, starkly emphasized by the reception Mr. Truman's futile mission-to-Moscow idea received in the U.S., revealed with extreme clarity the broad gap now separating the East and West. Russia's demand wasn't new. It

was a repetition of Moscow's now well-established tactics in East-West relations. What the Soviets wanted was simply that the Berlin ously built "get tough" attitude of question be removed from the agenda of the U. N. security council and that discussions among the Big Four be resumed where they were severed last August in Moscow.

Andrei Y. Vishinsky, deputy Soviet foreign minister, handed a the kind of personal diplomacy the note to that effect to Juan A. Bramuglia of Argentina, acting president of the security council, separately informed the U.S., British and French delegations.

#### CHURCHILL:

Grim Accents

At the British Conservative party's annual convention in Llandudno, Wales, Winston Churchill, never a man to deal in flimsy optimism when the going was tough, talked in grim accents about the world's peril.

HE WAS the old pre-war, noappeasement Churchill as he warned against letting any French breach appear in the line of western resistance to Soviet drives.

To the United States he said, in effect: Keep those atomic bombs. Destruction of the U.S. atomic arsenal now would be tantamount to suicide.

"If it were not for the stocks of atomic bombs now in the trusteeship of the United States there would be no means of stopping the subjugation of western Europe by Communist machinations backed by Russian armies and enforced by political parties.

"BOLSHEVIK Russia is already heavily armed and her forces in Europe far exceed those of all the western countries put together. At the present time the only sure foundation of peace-and the prevention of actual war-rests upon strength.

He urged the West to "bring matters to a lead and make a final settlement" before Russia produces a usable bomb.

Such a settlement, according to the view of the wartime British prime minister, could be arrived at only after the Russians had released their grip on satellite states. released the German and Japanese prisoners they "now hold as slaves," ceased to "oppress, torment and exploit" those parts of Austria and Germany they hold and called a halt to disruptive operations elsewhere in the world.

BUT CHURCHILL would not be a party to issuing any "false hopes of friendly settlement with Soviet Russia." Actually, he said, the Berlin blockade may precipitate a war at any time.

#### ALIENS:

On the Job

The U.S. is hiring scores of aliens. many of them in countries behind the iron curtain, to staff its 27-million-dollar international information

Leland J. Barrows, deputy director of the state department's office of information and education, told the senate appropriations committee that the department planed to add 278 aliens and 60 Americans to overseas duty by the end of the 1948 fiscal year.

WHAT WILL they do? Barrows said that the aliens-14 of whom will be added to the American embassy in Moscow-would be used primarily as translators, clerks, messengers and in other work associated with the U.S. foreign information program.

Testimony before the committee showed that the state department gained the committee's reluctant approval of its foreign-hiring plan, despite the objections of Chairman Styles Bridges (R., N.H.) who contended that it would provide a fertile field for Communist infiltration into government functions.

GEORGE V. ALLEN, assistant secretary of state, countered that there were certain jobs that had to be performed overseas that could best be done by aliens.

He said aliens could be employed much cheaper for certain tasks where they can be watched fairly easily, even though Americans may suspect their loyalty.

This departure from the norm in the business of hiring federal employees was a new wrinkle in the government that very probably will be attracting considerable public attention within the next few months.

#### Reverse Russian

#### SUB RADAR:

Sentry Duty

A submarine with radar "eyes." a new unit in the nation's defense system, was scheduled to start operating in November to detect any hostile planes attempting a sneak approach across such remote reaches as the polar seas.

The navy announced that the submarine Tigrone, taken from the reserve fleet and converted into the first radar picket submarine, was to be commissioned November 1.

Admiral Byrd didn't look much older than when we bid him Godspeed before he started on his first Antarctic venture. That was close to me for I was connected with the organization that syndicated the story for the press. But I was struck with the passage of time,

Paul Siple was chosen to go on the 1929 expedition after winning in a competition involving 600,000 Boy Scouts of America. Then he was a tall, slender lad of 20. Now he's stocky and graying. As a prominent geographer he has done important research for the war department.

The story of the Antarctic is studded with great names - Scott. Amundsen, Shackelton, to mention only three-as we'l as with sacrifice and tragedy. This picture of the "Secret Land," less secret now, shows the tremendous advances in technology made since the days of the early explorers. It took thousands of years to shape

the penguins' wings into the fins which make his survival in a polar land possible. In a few years in the laboratories and factories of America we have shaped the means which make survival and exploration possible in the same environment - exploration and discovery which some day may be of tremendous benefit to mankind.

#### Dangerous Malady

What the Russians stand for has lately come under heavy attack from almost every group and indi-vidual in America. We are almost unanimous. Current Congressional investigations at last seem to be hitting pay dirt. Russia herself, by strangling little Czechoslovakia and conducting the "cold war," has been losing some of her friends. Influential Communists are deserting, once they see what Russia's "ideologies" really are like.

In Our Generation

No matter by what name you call it, state control has grown in almost every country you can name. This has happened in our genera-tion. After World War I, politicians in many nations sensed their opportunities for power. Usually, this power was obtained through eco-Usually, this nomic tyranny. Heavy taxes, false money, and tinkering with production and distribution kept the tyranny in power. Finally, it was Germany, Italy, and Japan that brought

on another terrible war.

They were the "statist" nations. In each of these nations aggression against other countries followed aggression against the individual at home. Little nations, weakened by statism of their own, were easy vic-When their people did not care to resist and nothing seemed worthwhile, totalitarianism could find easy pickings. Now, statist Russia continues this sorry business.

Recognize the Infection

The infection of statism is at its worst in Russia, but we have not escaped it in America. We cannot always call it Communism, for unfortunately it does not always wear the name. Yet its effects are unmistakable. It demoralizes everything. Those in government can then justify a growing hunger for more and more power. Statesmen lose their vision to become mere politicians. They come to believe that the state can do everything.

The citizen is demoralized by statism. He gets to the point where he does not resist inroads on his liberties. He becomes a slave of the state. He is willing to follow evil courses no matter whether his heart tells him they are wrong. Resistance is simply not worthwhile. This is an exact picture of the German people before and during World Wars I and II. It fits also the Italand the Japanese in World ians

America's Danger

The picture fits Russia, too. It is the statist, government-controlled countries that soon take their peo-ple down the road to war. Nations do not foment wars when the people have a say-so. The greatest danger in America today is that we shall adopt one by one the ways of statism, even while denouncing Communism. This is what Russia would like to see us do. Instead, we must learn to identify the infection, no matter what label it may carry.

One label we are learning to avoid is Communism, but our understanding of it is usually pretty sketchy. Read and study "Comsketchy. Read and study munism in Action," a a 140-page booklet, prepared by the Library of Congress. Copies may be obtained free from: American Wage Earners Foundation, 30 N. La Salle St., Chicago, Ill. This is a factual study that will show the results of statism in Russia. It will convince you that neither you nor America could be better off under government managed economy.



#### Woman's World Study Your Figure Problem If You Are Short and Slight

MODELS are usually taller by far than the average woman so they can show clothes off to an advantage. If we see clothes they wear, we frequently want some like they have, but often we do not stop to think that the lines chosen for tall women will not do a thing for the woman with a short, slight figure.

Just because you're five feet three inches or less, however, does not mean that you can't look as smart as the girl who is taller. The main thing to do is to scale your clothing to the exact proportions of your figure. Keep clothes in proportion to your size and remember, above all things, that simplicity should be your guiding point not only in clothing but in accessories.

Generally speaking, the shorter jackets, the smaller hats, which by the way are very popular right now, fewer and smaller accessories, are the main pointers for short, slight

women to choose. To be delightfully chic, don't let horizontal lines cut what height you have. Use softly curved clothes, but have nothing to do with fussiness. You may wear gathers, shirring, short boleros and full skirts. Don't use too much detail in clothing as it will only detract from your delicate face and figure.

Choose soft fabrics as well as soft colors. Wild plaids and bulky fabrics are only for those with the taller figures who do not look swamped in them.

Keep things trim and ship-shape Give a unity of impression in every thing you wear, and you'll be dressing in good taste for your size.

#### Check Your Waist Before Buying

No matter how small and slight the figure, there may still be special problems in connection with choosing clothes since we all have some figure faults.

For instance, if you are small but long waisted don't bring the attention downward by wearing a long torso line and low placed skirt interest. It is far better to raise the waistline and achieve the long look



in this way. The Empire fashions, now being shown are ideal for solving this problem. If you're short waisted, don't se-

lect a dress with a lot of bodice interest. Wear simple, longer lines to add length to the short upper figure. No matter what the waistline on the short slight woman, she cannot

wear heavy large furs on her coat. She should choose high revers rathern than a deep shawl collar. Short women do best to choose coats that are gently flared or softly belted. Any fur on the coat should be in proportion to the figure itself.

The sleeves or bottom of the coat, or other trick applications of fur break up the figure of a short woman and do her no good. There should never be too much fur on your coat if you're short. Long-haired furs are out of the question; stick to those that are

Choose Fur Coats

#### For Proportion

The choice of a fur coat for the small and slight person usually offers more of a problem than for one of taller stature. The tall figure can show furs off taturally to more advantage and the choice of fur is not

so limited, but short women can look chic also. Overpowering furs are to be avoided completely unless you want to look like an overgrown bear cub. Choose the small fur with slightly accented shoulders, careful length, and little fullness. The slim, prin-

cess silbouette in a flat fur is perfect for petite figures. The demi-coat, about 32 inches in length, in a flat fur such as Persian lamb, mouton lamb or muskrat are good choices for the smaller figure currently. Be sure the shoulders are slight, and do not have too much

fullness in the coat generally. If you're choosing a fur jacket, don't choose a longer cape or wristlength type. The above-the-waist cape or capelet are much better.

#### Choose Light Feeling Suits for Short Figures

Larg t plaids made of heavy fabrics are not for small people since they take large frames to carry them around. Your suit may be softly tailored or even man-tailored,

but it should be in good proportion to your figure.

Soft monotone woolens or small patterned light-weight tweeds may

be worn by small people. Roxy, double breasted jackets will cut the small figure too much so it's wise to choose those suits which give long lines.

Select a suit that is best kept closed so that it will give a unity of impression and thus add height. You may have a small, frilly collar on the blouse, but it's really better not to show more than that, as contrasty blouses and suits destroy

If you're petite, another thing to do is to avoid equal length in the skirt and jacket. Emphasize the girlishness of the figure by having a short jacket.

When you do have a color break in your suit, keep it high, rather than bringing it down even as far as the waist. Match hat and shoes so they can make you look taller.

High heels and high hats do not make the short woman look taller. They give just the opposite impression because they are in such contrast to the figure itself. You may wear a high but not a towering hat, and medium heels.



#### Poultrymen Advised To Retain All Pullets Culling Hens Is Means

Of Increasing Returns

To assure top poultry profits during the winter season, keep an allpullet flock. Pullets lay in the fall and winter when egg prices are high. At the same time, old hens are going through their fall molt and consuming 25 to 30 pounds of feed while producing no eggs. In the spring, when old hens re-

thus necessitating a very heavy layer to pay the \$1.50 feed bill which was amassed during the winter months.

Old hens may be sold at once or they may be culled individually as they go out of production.

A weekly check of the old hen flock will enable the poultryman to cull out the loafers If an old hen flock is maintained over the winter months, separate housing for pullets and old hens should be provided for best management and disease control.

As another step in culling the poultry flock, old roosters also should be eliminated. They serve no useful purpose and eat lots of

Some pullets also may have to be culled if the flock is to be maintained at the desired size for profitable operation throughout the winter. In this case, only the best potential layers should be retained. A good ready-to-lay pullet is one that is smoothly feathered, plump in body and carries richly pigmented

Pullets so developed can be brought into 50 per cent egg production without crowding by the time they are six months old. Pullets, however, never should be forced into high production during their first two months of laying. ----- 000-----

A good feed of fertilizer gives the soil a backlog of plant nutrients that benefit succeeding crops. Wellfertilized legume-grass crops in any good soil building program leave behind them important carry-over values. Legume-grass mixtures fed with plenty of phosphate and potash will add to the soil's organic matter and build soil structure. They will improve tilth, drainage and

Because of these carry-over benefits, agronomists recommend a minimum of three years for charging off the cost of fertilizer applications

#### Thorough Check of Silo Will Prevent Wastage

Silos will help to assure good use of this year's bumper crop of cornstalks. To prevent waste of the ensiled crop, however, the silo must be in good condition.

Thorough cleaning is the first step, entailing cleaning out the pit and scraping old silage off walls. Walls should be examined for air leaks, using melted paraffin to fill small cracks in mortar joints or be- from \$1 up tween silo staves.



# 1/2 Billion Dollar Road Block!

RAILROADS MUST OPERATE around the clock every day and night of the year.

Although they know this, leaders of 16 railroad unions are demanding a five-day, Monday through Friday, week for one million

They want 48 hours pay for 40 hours work -in itself a 20% wage increase.

They also demand a minimum of 12 hours pay for any work performed on Saturdays, and 16 hours pay for any work performed on Sundays and holidays.

On top of all this they want an additional increase of 25c an hour for every employe!

#### You'd Pay the Bill!

Summing up these demands, they mean that these union leaders seek to force the railroads to give one million employes an annual raise which would average \$1500 per employe!

The total cost of this would be no less than 11/4 billion dollars per year, which is more than twice the expected net income of the railroads this year.

You'd pay the bill, because if these increased costs are forced on the railroads, they must have still further rate and fare increases.

#### **Demands Unreasonable**

These employes have had substantial raises during and since the war. Their average weekly earnings are higher than the average weekly earnings of workers in manufacturing industries. They have more job security than the average worker in American industry. They also enjoy paid vacations, a retirement system and other advantages more generous than the average worker receives.

In contrast with the demands of these 16 unions, which add up to the equivalent of 48c an hour, the Conductors and Trainmen recently settled their wage request for an increase of 10c

#### Railroads Run for Everybody-Not Employes Alone

The railroad industry must serve not one but

many groups-producers, businessmen, ship pers, passengers and the general publicnight and day, every day of the year. These unions are proceeding in utter disregard of this important difference between railroads and other industries. Industrial plants can be shut down over weekends and holidays, but freight, mail, express and passengers must continue to move. Everybody who enters rail-road employment knows this.

Strike Threat

On September 18, 1948, the leaders of these 16 unions began taking a strike vote. But the threat of a strike will not alter the opposition of the railroads to such unreasonable demands!





#### Efficient Fertilizer **Use** Boosts Yields

Good Soil Management Must Aid Plant Food

Every ton of fertilizer can be stretched or used more efficiently, boosting crop yields at the same time. Many farmers, says Middle West Soil Improvement committee, use fertilizer as a crutch. They try to make it substitute for good management practices. They put plant food in the soil without making sure the plant can send out its roots to use it.

Fertilizer is essential in giving the soil plant nutrients to feed crops. But fertilizer can't do the whole job. It must be teamed with other practices that build and maintain soil structure and keep the top soil "nailed down."

The soil needs good structure so roots can grow and reach out for plant food. Roots need air and water to live. When a soil is packed down and tight, there is no room for the air and water needed by roots

and plants for high crop production The way to build soil structure is to grow legumes and grasses regularly in the rotation. These legumes make a thick layer of good soil.

YOU CAN S-T-R-E-T-C-H YOUR

They add organic matter. Such soil has plenty of air space. Water soaks in quickly and more of it is held. Weak, scattered stands of legumes won't build soil structure. For All these crops can't be cut for hay or graze close and still be expected to build the soil. At least a part of these crops must be turned back to

#### True Wisdom

Lesson for October 31, 1948

WHAT is the most important thing in the world? What is worth more than anything else? Some would say Money; some Pow-

er; some Goodness; some Truth. Another answer is given by the writers of a group of books, two of which are included in our Bible. 'Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom," they say. The books

Dr. Foreman

Proverbs and Ecclesiastes in our Protestant Bible. and the books of Ecclesiasticus and the Wisdom of Solomon in the Apocrypha, all have this viewpoint and are therefore called the Wisdom Literature.

Other writers in the Bible divide the human race into the Good and the Wicked, or the Believers and the Unbelievers; but these writers see mankind as the Wise and the Foolish. The books they wrote (especially Proverbs) were intended particularly for those who are so far neither foolish nor wise-that is to say, the young.

#### Knowledge Is Not Wisdom

WISDOM (as these writers use the word) is not the same thing as knowledge. A person may know a great many things and still be a fool. Or he may not even know how to read and write, and yet be wise. Some modern writer has said: Knowledge is knowing what to do: skill is knowing how to do it; and yirtue is doing it. Wisdom is all of these put together.

But the special feature of the "Wisdom Writers" is this: True wisdom begins with the fear of God. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom . . . the knowledge of God is understanding." In other words, wisdom without religion, without faith, is foolish after all.

We can see how in our times the story of the Nazis has shown this once more to be true. The German Reich of 1935-1939 had the best of the science of the world; they had scholarship and wealth and "knowhow" in many fields; but they rejected God and defied his churchand so a nation was destroyed.

We too may profit by their example. We of the western nations have wealth and technical skills beyond any other peoples, we have the atom bombs-but have we the wisdom without which all these things are but as torches in the hands of madmen?

#### University on Ant-Hill

KNOWLEDGE may be expensive. It costs a great deal of money to know what it takes to be an engineer or a surgeon. Wisdom, strange to say, is less expensive. It is fact on such a low shelf that most people pass it by.

Consider where the "Wisdom Writers" tell us we may learn wisdom. One place is experience. "Experience keeps an expensive school, but fools will learn in no otherand hardly from that," says a more modern proverb.

Many of the proverbs in our Bible are simply distilled drops of experience. "A soft answer turneth away wrath, but griev-ous words stir up anger," for example. Do you need an angel from the sky to tell you that?

Another source of wisdom is just Nature herself. "Go to the ant, thou sluggard (lazy fellow); consider her ways and be wise." A lazy man is a fool; but how shall he learn to be wise? Not by reading books—just by watching the ants.


#### Inspired Common Sense

A FORMER governor of Virginia used to say that during his term of office he received more practical help from reading Proverbs than from any of the books on political science in his library. For the science, or the art, of government is simply one specialized form of that most important art, getting along with people. And the Wisdom Literature shows us how it is done.

Some people think that Inspiration is always mysterious, and that the Holy Spirit would not stoop to inspire what we could learn in any ordinary way. But the Christian church, when it declares Proverbs (for example) inspired, expresses her belief that there is such a thing as Inspired Common Sense.

God may speak to us, and does speak-if we will listen-in the advice of our parents, in our everyday experiences, in the hard-working ant and the majesty of the soaring eagle. 
