Marines Make Call For Men

According to word received today by Postmaster J. Mack Noble, an authorized increase of 9,000 men for the U. S. Marine Corps has been approved by Congress, bringing the strength of the Corps up to 34,000.

These 9,000 men will be used, in addition to bringing the present regiments up to peace time allowance, for the following: one Infantry Regiment, two Defense Battalions, and 1,500 men to increase the guards at Navy Yards.

ST. LOUIS, JUNE 6.—Supported by leaders in every phase of public life, Red Cross chapters redoubled this week efforts to raise the \$200,000 Red Cross war relief fund. Meanwhile, a 9-000-ton "mercy ship" was scheduled to sail this week for France with a million dollar cargo of American Red Cross relief supplies.

The ship is loaded with clothing, drugs, soap, gauze, dried fruits, canned soups, meat, milk, vegetables, and a number of auxiliary hospital trucks. Earlier, Red Cross emergency supplies were rushed to the far zone by clipper plane. Ten American Red Cross disaster workers are now in Europe, and funds nearing the million mark have been cabled overseas by the organization to date for desperately needed supplies to fill the most immediate needs of more than 3,000,000 homeless, destitute war-sufferers.

The war fund was increased to \$200,000,000 to help meet a refugee problem of "unprecedented and unforeseen proportions," stated William M. Baxter, Jr., manager of the Red Cross, Midwestern area, today.

"After the tragic events of the past weeks the \$10,000,000 originally asked by the American Red Cross will be insufficient to cope with the desperate need in Europe today," he said, "America is the one outstanding neutral nation where these suffering people can turn for aid. Unless their plight is quickly relieved, there can be little hope for these stricken populations against actual hunger and disease. I cannot stress too strongly the urgency of this need."

Lamesa Planning Annual Rodeo

Lamesa, June 4.—Plans for the annual Lamesa Rodeo were nearing completion this week as officials announced that arrangements had been made with Curley Daugherty, O'Donnell rodeo stock man, for 195 head of bucking horses, roping calves, and Brahma steers. Two performances daily, afternoon and night, will be given on the days of June 19-20.

Contestants in the riding and roping events are pouring in their applications, and cowgirls from many West Texas cities have registered their intentions to enter the cowgirl contest, open to every cowgirl in the Southwest, except those who have already won two first places in other shows. Cities and towns may be represented by any number of participants.

Three saddles, shop-made boots, Stelson hat, and silver spurs, are listed as awards over and above the \$650 cash to be given daily. One saddle will go to the winning cowgirl. The other saddles will be given for the best two-day averages in the bronc-riding and calf-roping events. The other articles listed will be given for the best two-day averages in other events.

A good-will tour is being arranged for June 11 and 12 to other cities and towns in this section, including Tahoka and O'Donnell.

Showers Aid, But Good Rain Needed

Heavy showers visited various portions of the county this week, amounting to more than an inch in small localities.

In Tahoka the downpour Tuesday afternoon amounted to 1.19 inches which was increased to a total of 1.22 by a lighter shower which fell that night. At O'Donnell the precipitation measured 81 of an inch, O'Donnell and vicinity had received more than an inch a little more than a week ago.

The rain here became lighter in every direction from town, extending only five or six miles north and south and only a very short distance east and west of the city.

Besides the rain at O'Donnell, a half inch is reported at Midway and Redwine and an inch at Draw. Some of the lakes contain much water.

Other showers that have visited other parts of the county recently have been sufficient in much of the territory to bring up the crops. Some of the cotton has not yet been planted, however, and some is being planted this week.

Demands Heavier For Fish Stock

AUSTIN, JUNE 3.—With new, huge lakes being built in Texas constitute the demand for fish raised by the State Game Department in its ten hatcheries increases monthly. The latest lake to be stocked is Possum Kingdom. Bass numbering 71,000 were planted in it recently, it was announced today by the executive secretary of the Department. That was the first of many shipments which will be placed in the lake.

All the new lakes being stocked by the Game Department are being studied by aquatic biologists to determine the amount of fish food the various bodies of water will produce. Too, they are determining the species of fish most suitable for each lake.

The state hatcheries produced more than 5,000,000 fish last year, but by using improved methods of fertilization, some of them developed by Texas Game Department aquatic biologists, and by making use of other recently discovered methods of propagating fish, it is hoped to double the hatcheries' production this season. To date it appears the hatcheries will reach the 10,000,000 mark.

Mahon Named On Important Body

Washington—Chairman Edward Taylor of the House Committee on Appropriations has called upon Congressman George Mahon to serve on the important sub-committee on War Department appropriations, and Mahon has accepted that post in addition to his other duties on the Appropriations Committee. The Chairman asked him to serve on this sub-committee because of the heavy program of work and vital importance of the sub-committee in handling appropriations in the national defense program.

Mahon stated that while his principal interest in Congress had not been in military matters, he was honored by the request and was willing to serve because of critical world conditions. "I join all Americans," he said, "in my anxiety that we have an adequate national defense program and I shall seek to serve in every possible way and was willing to believe that we must be fully prepared to meet emergencies which may confront our Nation from without and within."

Mahon also pointed out that it was his deep conviction that our program for national defense should be coupled with a foreign policy developed to keep our Nation out of war. "We must," he stated, "proceed calmly and efficiently to prepare for the defense of our own Nation, making our foreign policy one of non-involvement in the European conflict."

Mahon is the only member of the Appropriations Committee from Texas and is the only member on this sub-committee from the Southwest.

Apply Now For Cotton Mattresses

Eligible families who haven't yet applied for mattress making materials under the Department of Agriculture's program for aiding low-income farm families should do so soon or they may lose their opportunity to participate.

This notice has been sounded by Maurine McNatt, Lynn County Home Demonstration Agent, who points out that June 8 is the deadline for ordering cotton and ticking for the demonstration program from the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation; that means, then, that all applications should be filed several days prior to the deadline date.

The families who are eligible to receive this material are those whose income was \$400 or less, half of which was derived from some source of agriculture.

In a recent report on the program made by Miss Mildred Horton, Vice-director and State Home Demonstration Agent, she stated that although sufficient cotton and ticking to make 73,770 mattresses had been ordered by the State AAA office through the last week in May, there are still thousands of eligible families in Texas who have yet taken advantage of the plan. She indicated that in some counties communities canvasses by home demonstration club women and other local means of informing the public about the program will likely to be employed in the remaining weeks before the closing date.

Already 146 Texas counties have been approved for participation in the program, and cotton has been shipped by the FSSCC to 40 counties. Figures released by the AAA indicate that 7,377 bales of cotton and 738,600 yards of ticking have been ordered for use by Texas farm families with a gross cash income of less than \$400 for 1939.
