## Good Show Reported On Well

### Drilling Continues At Saleh Wildcat

Unconfirmed reports circulating this week indicate that the Standard No. 1 Saleh one mile northwest of the North Y had a very good show Saturday nite in the Mississippian sand. The well is being drilled as a "tight well", that is little public information. Identification of the formation is not certain and possibly could be an unknown pay. A large amount of wet gas and 49 gravity oil was said to have gushed out, but was controlled and cut off ti drill another 1,000 feet to look at Ellenberger and associated formations where the better wells are produced. Drilling Tuesday was below 10,400 and contract depth is not expected to be reached for another 15 days. The Spraberry and associated formations were said to be interesting on tests and the rank wildcat may be completed, if it is completed, as a dual pay. Little "oil fever" is evident here. (The above is not to be considered a "factual" story as the Index is only reporting "second hand" reports and rumors.)

## Know Your Law

WHY LAWYERS DEFEND CRIMINALS  
If you do not provide for the proper defense of all who are accused of crime, then the innocent, when falsely accused, have no way to prove their innocence. So, under our law, we look on a man as innocent until he is found guilty under proper court proceedings.  
From this it follows that all of us have a right to be represented by a lawyer. Since the lawyer has a duty to represent you, much criticism of him for doing so is unjust.  
Should a lawyer defend persons in court if he knows or thinks they have done the acts of which they are accused? Yes, the worst criminal has a right to a fair trial. This he cannot have unless a lawyer sees that he has a fair jury and that it hears only lawful evidence against him.  
Sometimes the defense counsel arouses public feeling by his sincere efforts to see that his client has every proper legal safeguard. The public may misunderstand these legal moves. For the public they seem to be an unethical effort to defeat justice, by delay or by taking advantage of certain "technicalities."

Attorneys should tell people that it is one of our basic democratic rights to be considered innocent until legal evidence proves our guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. All who are charged with crime have a right to an attorney's aid. An attorney swears to see that the accused gets each protective legal right to which he is entitled.

**COTTON CLASSING SERVICE AGAIN AVAILABLE**

College Station -- Growers who wish to have their cotton classed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture under provisions of the Smith-Doxey Act should apply for these services as soon as their cotton is planted, says Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist.

The Smith-Doxey Act provides for one free classification for each eligible bale of cotton. Samples must be submitted by a bonded sampler or by a public warehouse which issues negotiable receipts, explains Elliott. Each cotton improvement group, except those in southern Texas, must file an application with the cotton classing office serving its territory not later than August 1.

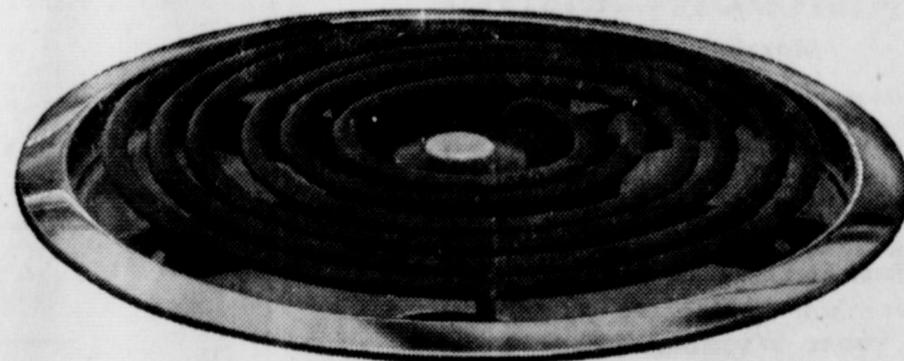

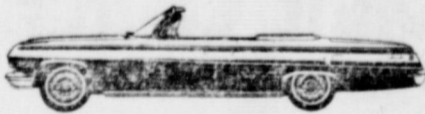

**THE LAW IN TEXAS — INSURANCE CONTRACT**

It is possible today to insure against almost anything within reason. You can insure yourself against home accidents, thefts, automobile injuries, life, fire, health and business risks.

The law covering insurance is vast. Yet basically your protection rests on the same simple elements of any contract.

1. Offer and acceptance: You must offer to pay for the insurance and the company must accept you as a proper risk.
2. A "consideration": The premium you pay in return for which the company gives you certain protection.
3. A lawful purpose: You cannot insure an unlawful activity. You may insure yourself against burglary but a burglar cannot take out a policy to insure his success.
4. Competency: The parties to an insurance contract must be "competent" to enter it. And, as a rule, anyone who can enter any other contract can enter an insurance contract.
5. A special rule: You must have an "insurable interest." You cannot take out fire insurance on some old house down the street that you think will go up in smoke. That is, you cannot insure it unless you have some interest in it, such as a mortgage or an option to purchase. Nor can you insure the life of just anyone. You can only insure somebody whose life means something to you—a close relative, a breadwinner, a partner or the like.

You can insure your house against loss by fire, but you cannot take out several policies with different companies which total much more than the true value of your house and expect to collect the full amount on all of these policies in case of fire. The theory behind insurance is to protect you from loss, not to enable you to make a profit.

**SANITARY PREVENTION IS BEST INSECT CONTROL**

Insects have bothered man since the beginning of recorded history. They have stung him, bitten him, destroyed his home and his food, and, even worse, carried germs that brought sickness and death. Entomologists report that they can identify some 10,000 "public enemy" insects that do \$4 billion damage annually.

For thousands of years man probably did little but sweat and squish the insects to defend himself against them but by 1000 B. C. Homer was writing about sulphur as a fumigant. Since that time insecticides have steadily improved. One, DDT, was developed in 1942 and gave promise of providing the knockout punch against insect hordes. However, many insects, including flies, salt marsh mosquitoes, roaches, and lice quickly developed resistance to the chemical. Other insects including Mexican beetles, spider mites and many aphids were not affected by it.

Even today there is still only one sure defense against insects. A simple but complete program of community and home sanitation. Start this program at home by clearing the weeds from around the garage, stock ponds and fence corners. These are ideal breeding places for mosquitoes and flies.

Check your garbage cans for leaks and corrosion, replacing those that are worn or misshapen. Garbage cans should be washed weekly to keep them clean and dry. Always replace the lid when depositing refuse. Inspect the house and ground carefully for stagnant water catchers. Vases and flower pots inside the house are frequent offenders as are old tires, wood piles, tin cans and empty jars in the yard.

**FILING OF IRS TAX FOR STUDENTS EXPLAINED**

Special message to students and part time workers from the Internal Revenue Service and payments of federal income taxes withheld from wages are paid only upon the filing of a proper federal income tax return.

"While everyone whose income was \$600 or more during 1961 must file a return (\$1200 for those over 65) the IRS stressed, "we find frequent cases of people apparently believing that because their tax withheld was greater than their tax owed, they will automatically get a proper refund.

"Somewhat the same belief is held by students or other young people who worked during a portion of the year and whose taxes were withheld from their salaries or wages. To get a refund, they, too, must file a return even if such income was under \$600."
