SUMMERS RETURNS FROM SEA DUTY TO SAN DIEGO

San Diego, Calif. Nov. 17 -- George J. Summers, seaman, U S N, son of Mr and Mrs Edward W. Summers of O'Donnell arrived here yesterday aboard the landing ship USS IST 898 which was completing her second tour of the Korean combat zone. A unit of the Pacific Fleet Amphibious Force, the 898 did her part in the relocations of thousands of communist prisoners of war from Boje Island to the Korean mainland and new island locations. The ship also operated under United Nations Blockading and Escorting Forces off the coast of Korea in anti invasion boat patrols and participated in amphibious training exercises around Okinawa and Japan.

"Greatest Show On Earth" Here Saturday

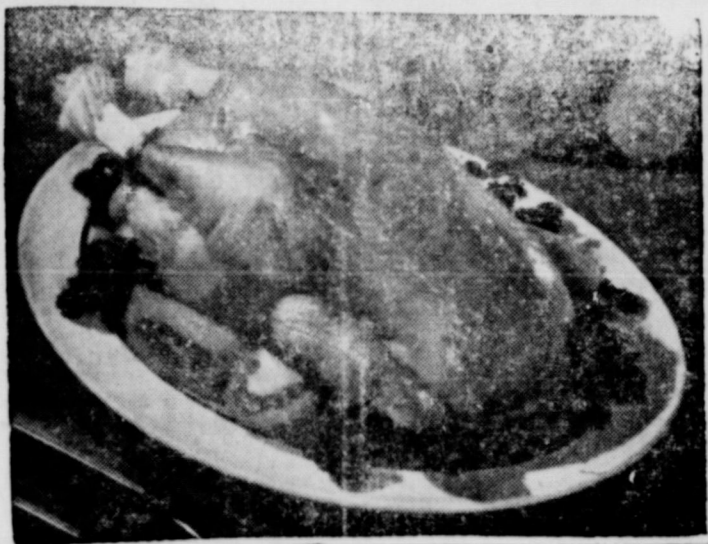

Lloyd Davis Killed By Train Here Monday Morning

Funeral Is Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Lloyd Davis, sr, 43, who was killed instantly shortly before noon Monday when his car collided with a Santa Fe freight train near the north outskirts of O'Donnell, were held at 3 p. m. Tuesday. Rites were conducted by Rev. Troy Dale of here in the local First Baptist church. Interment followed in the O'Donnell cemetery under the direction of Stanley-Jones Funeral home. His death brought the area rapidly soaring traffic toll to 101 only 6 under that for end of November of last year. The mishap occurred about 11:15 a. m. Davis who lives and farms west of town on Chemical plant road, was the school bus forman of local schools and he also worked at the Lynn theatre at night.

According to local officers, Mr Davis did not see the train until the last instant. He was driving north enroute to Lynn Theatre, probably, and the train was headed south. The 1951 Chevrolet coach was demolished. Engineer of the train was reported to be V P Williams, the conductor, G B Middleton, both of Slaton.

It had been raining and was misty with some fog and the road was wet but whether that contributed to mishap or not was not immediately known.

Survivors include the wife, four sons, Lloyd, jr., Wayne, Gerald and Harvey, all of here, one daughter, Wanda, of here, three stepdaughters, Shirley and Patsy of here and Mrs Aubrey Carpenter of Wichita, Kan., two brothers and four sisters, names not available as we go to press. A more detailed obituary will follow next week.

Car Is Totally Wrecked

The wrecked car was taken to Forbes Motor Co. Garage mechanics said it was the worst wrecked car they had ever seen. The force of the train drove the engine and front half of the car up and under the rear half in such a manner that the car appeared to be only half as long.

Lester Parker, a carpenter, working near the scene of the mishap was among the early arrivals at the scene. He said the train had apparently set its breaks some yards away from the crossing and the rails were shiny bright from the engine sliding. Dr. Lehman arrived shortly and pronounced Mr Davis dead.

His body was badly broken including broken legs, a skull fracture, chest crushed, and a broken neck which probably caused his instant death.

A number of years ago, Elliot Harris, now of Brownfield, received crippling injuries in a similar mishap at the same crossing. Signal Needed

A Signal fashioned along the swinging arm type is needed at this crossing and at the South Y crossing, which is extremely dangerous due grain tanks being near and cutting off vision. Both crossings are used by heavy high way traffic including buses and school buses. The City Council should investigate such warning signals.

Mr. Davis was one of our most popular and likable men having lived here for a number of years. He farmed west of town and was as well bus forman of the school. The heartfelt sympathy of the community goes to the loved ones at this tragic time.

### Purple Heart Veteran Deported as Wetback

SAN ANTONIO—Immigration authorities sent a 21-year-old Purple Heart veteran of Korea back to Mexico as a "wetback" recently.

The veteran, Cpl. Alberto Gonzales of Monterrey, Mexico, was sent in an immigration bus to Laredo, Tex., to be put off in Mexico. Immigration Officer W. Meulhauser said he had entered the United States on a dead man's birth certificate before he joined the American army three years ago. Wetbacks—named for those who swim the Rio Grande—are illegal entrants.

The G.I. Forum, which works on the problems of Latins in San Antonio, assigned an attorney, Richard Casillas, to the case with instructions to "go all the way" to the state department if necessary to allow Mr. Gonzales to live in the United States.

The immigration office said it was being allowed to leave the country "voluntarily" and predicted he could get a permanent visa from the American consul in Mexico that would allow him to come back in time for the wedding.

Mr. Gonzales was discharged from the army at Fort Sam Houston.

He joined the Army Sept. 1948, and enlisted for another two years on the same date last year. Vella Sanchez, 20, his fiance, said he had spent a year in Korea, at headquarters of the Eighth Army.

"He was wounded in the hip and got a broken ear drum," she said. "He has the Purple Heart, from campaign start, the United Nations ribbon, the Korean service ribbon and a unit citation."

### Spare Parts for Body Are Available to Man

NEW YORK—Spare parts for the human body still can't be ordered from a mail-order catalog. Nevertheless, the advance of medicine during the past few years has made available an imposing array of replacements for damaged or ineffective organs.

Following the development of the blood bank, first of the spare-part repositories, ingenious surgeons have found ways to maintain bone for eyes, bone, cartilage, arteries and veins. There are now methods for transplanting whole organs from one individual to another, or for constructing replacement organs from tissues taken from a patient's own body.

Some man-made spare parts, such as the artificial kidney, are already coming into clinical use, while others, among them the mechanical heart and plastic heart valves, are well along in the experimental stage.

### Bone Banks Now Ready For Use in Most Cities

NEW YORK—Several hospitals in New York and elsewhere operate banks for human bone. At the New York hospital for special surgery, one of the first to establish a bone bank, successful grafts have been made with bone stored as long as 22 months. Bank bone has been used in more than a thousand operations.

Bone banks have been able to obtain an adequate supply of bone from amputations and other operations in which bone is removed. Cut into chips or thin strips, the bone is given a careful cleaning and stored in sterile jars in a deep freeze at -13 degrees F. Bone grafts are employed primarily for fractures that refuse to knit, replacing infected bone, in operations for fusing various joints of the spine, and in aiding children born with bones missing.

The grafted bone does not grow but stimulates the growth of the patient's own bone.

### Weather Affects Range Of Shotgun Pellets

BRIDGEPORT, Conn.—The pellets in a shot charge are not always perfect spheres when leaving the gun barrel and departures from sphericity result in shorter ranges. A wind may appreciably increase or decrease the maximum range. The maximum range is greater on hot days and less on cold days.

The calculations do not take into account interactions among various pellets which may increase the range a few feet. Furthermore, no provision is made for the occasionally observed effect of "clustering", that is, the sticking together of several pellets in the shot charge to form a cluster. Although with modern guns and loads this may be of relatively infrequent occurrence, it must be recognized that such a "ball" would travel considerably farther than the other pellets in the charge.

### 'Time for a Change'—U. S. Sides With Men

WASHINGTON—Women spend more money for clothes than men—this old male argument has been proved by a government report.

In a brand-new report on American spending habits, the Bureau of Labor Statistics says "around 10 per cent of the family clothing budget was spent (in 1950) on women's and girls' clothing."

Men and boys? They got "a little over 40 per cent" of the clothing budget. The remainder went to the kiddies.

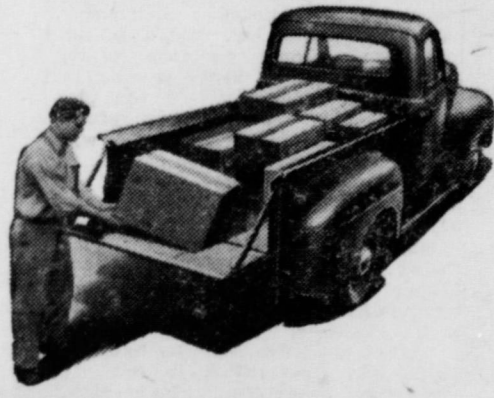

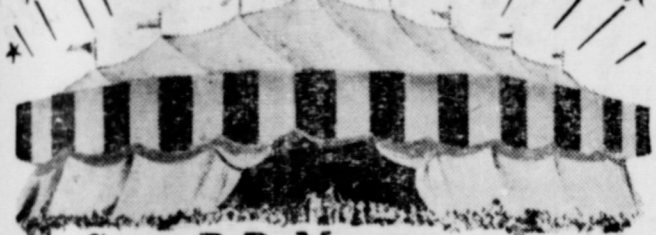

### Most Drinking Starts Before College Days

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drinking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents."

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink."

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor "closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol. Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the women students drink."
