Harvest Near End

The current cotton crop for
O'Donnell is estimated at being
96 percent complete. Lynn coun-
ty ginnings is currently at 45,000
bales with much cotton on the gin
yards. Over the area ginnings to-
tal 10,000 bales. In Borden coun-
ty where the rains fell just right
it has not been uncommon for dry
land cotton to hit as high as a
bale to the acre and in some in-
stances to run as high as a bale
and a half to the acre.

Early grain fell short of the
average but late grain hit an av-
erage for normal harvest.

Cotton trucks are parked over
town and it is estimated that 1,000
bales remain to be ginned. Har-
vest is nearly complete west of
town but a substantial amount of
cotton remains in the fields to-
ward Draw and into Borden coun-
ty.

O'Donnell looks like a snow
storm with much of the cotton
lint covering the town.

Poll Tax Payments Are Still Lagging

Poll tax payments in Lynn county reached 739 through Tuesday, but this is far below what they should be. Of this number, 99 have been paid since December 31.

J. P. Hewlett Is Candidate Again

J. P. Hewlett announces he is a candidate for re-election as county superintendent of Lynn county subject to action of the Democratic Primary election in May.

Mr. Hewlett says he had not intended to run again, but he has several projects now underway he would like to see through to completion. County superintendents of Texas are submitting a plan to the state legislature for grouping of counties for administration of affairs of the county superintendent's office.

Mr. Hewlett has been county superintendent since late in 1959, and says he feels he is acquainted with the complicated details of school affairs, working with local superintendents and the state agencies.

He has had more than forty years experience in the school business, and was superintendent at Southland four years and at Wilson 12 years before being appointed to fill out an unexpired term as county superintendent.

"I am deeply grateful for all the past favors from the people of Lynn county," he says, "and will sincerely appreciate your consideration and vote for this office."

New Car Tags Available Feb. 1

New 1966 vehicle license plates will go on sale February 1 at the county tax office, and have white letters on black backgrounds.

The 1966 plates will bear the letters GMA, GILN, GHP, GHT and GHS, and after each such three letters the numeral will range from 10 to 999, states George McCracken, county assessor and collector.

Commercial plates will be LN 4470 to 5774 and farm plates will be 8F 3400 to 4949.

Mr. McCracken told The News a grand total of 10,177 vehicle licenses were issued in Lynn county last year, a slight drop from 10,400 the year before.

In categories, the total licenses issued for 1966 follow: Passenger cars, 4,042; commercial trucks and pick-ups, 1,110; farm trucks and pick-ups, 1,269; truck trailers, 61; motor scooters and motorcycles, 31; commercial trailers, 504; and farm trailers, 3,160.

Texas license plates are manufactured by inmate workers at Huntsville unit, Texas Department of Corrections, who completed the job of turning out the 13,237,689 plates for 1966 in record time at 11:10 a. m., Dec. 29. Already, the prison is preparing to start work on 1967 plates.

SCS Sponsoring Essay Contest

Essays should be 300 words or less. Further information can be obtained from any of the District Supervisors or the Soil Conservation Service. Information on the contest has been given to all schools in the district.

Water Depletion Credit Possible

Added income tax benefits may be in store for those producers who own irrigation water rights in the Ogallala formation for the taxable year 1965, says John J. Seibert, Area Farm Management Specialist, of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Lubbock.

Representatives of the Internal Revenue Service and the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District are currently developing "guidelines" which an eligible taxpayer may use when filing a claim for the depletion allowance. They say it is doubtful that these guidelines will be established and published before February 15, when farmers who have not filed an estimated return must have their completed tax forms filed.

Therefore eligible farmers who are planning to claim an irrigation water depletion allowance for 1965 may elect to file an estimated return by January 15. This would give these taxpayers until April 17 to file their completed 1965 return, Seibert said. By this date, there is a good possibility that depletion "guidelines" would be published. This would allow farmers to include in their completed tax returns any eligible depletion allowance and enable this allowance to be within these established "guidelines".

There is no substitute for complete and accurate records, emphasizes Seibert. This is particularly true where cost basis, annual depletion rate, and thickness of water bearing strata are used in determining the annual depletion allowance. Guidelines are just part of the total picture cautions the farm management specialist. If questioned, farmers would no doubt also be asked to substantiate the information used in arriving at their cost bases—value used as "water rights." This would also be true for the thickness of the water-bearing strata.

Farmers who elect to file for water depletion allowance in 1965 will want to keep in close communication with their account, water district representatives, or other individuals who are keeping abreast of regulations governing water depletion. Utilizing official rulings may save embarrassing questions and may also result in more income tax savings.

Don Saverance, local ASCS office manager, will be succeeded this week end by Wallace Dove, 34, who comes here from Iowa Park, Wichita county.

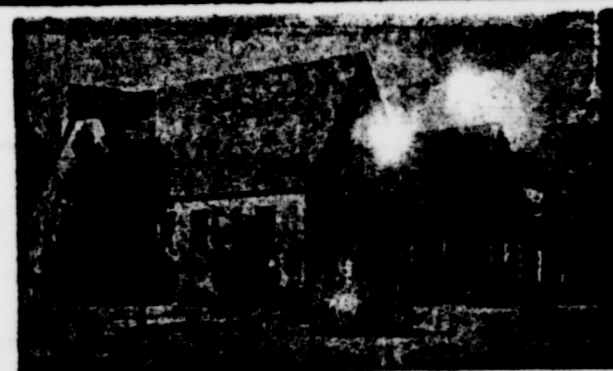
Saverance goes to Abilene as ASCS office manager of Taylor county, the county in which he was reared.
