

Therefore eligible farmers who are planning to claim an irrigation water depletion allowance for 1965 may elect to file an estimated return by January 15. This would give these taxpayers until April 17 to file their completed 1965 return, Seibert said. By this date, there is a good possibility that depletion "guidelines" would be published. This would allow farmers to include in their completed tax returns any eligible depletion allowance and enable this allowance to be within these established "guidelines".

There is no substitute for complete and accurate records, emphasizes Seibert. This is particularly true where cost basis, annual depletion rate, and thickness of water bearing strata are used in determining the annual depletion allowance. Guidelines are just part of the total picture cautions the farm management specialist. If questioned, farmers would no doubt also be asked to substantiate the information used in arriving at their cost basesvalue used as "water rights." This would also be true for the thickness of the water-bearing strata. Farmers who elect to file for water depletion allowance in 1985 will want to keep in close communication with their account, water district representatives, or other individuals who are keeping abreast of regulations governing water depletion. Utilizing official rulings may save embarrassing questions and may also result in more income tax savings.
