Mr. Tubb is said to have a pretty good record in coaching in football, basketball and track. The past two years the Eagles have had only an average football team.

Washday for Lamp Shades Makes Rooms Brighter

ROOMS will look brighter when you establish a washday for the lamp shades and light bulbs, the Rural Home editor of nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer advises housewives.

"In the days of kerosene lamps it was part of the weekly housecleaning to wash lamp chimneys," she points out in the farm magazine read by 1,300,000 farm families. "But not everyone realizes that electric lighting calls for a regular cleaning program."

"Your lamp shades will give better service and look much better if they are kept clean."
 Here are her directions for giving lamp shades a real soap and water treatment:

Remove a parchment or paper shade from lamp; go over it with a cloth rung quite dry from rich suds. Then go over the shade with a cloth wrung out of clear water. Finish by wiping it with a dry cloth. Examine the shade to see if bindings are glued or sewed on and if there are ornaments that might not be wash-



able. These should be cut off before washing.

Make up a tub of good rich, lukewarm suds. Plunge the shade up and down in the suds. Rub obstinate spots gently with two well-soaped fingers. After the shade is bright and fresh looking, give it several rinses of the same even lukewarm temperature.

Stand the shade to dry on a bath towel, away from sunlight or direct heat. You can hasten drying by blotting the shade between the palms of your hands with another bath towel. When the shade is partially dry, reverse its position.

Don't forget, too, that electric bulbs should be cleaned regularly. Do not try to wash the electric bulbs in their sockets. The best way is to remove the bulb from the socket and wipe with a soft cloth wrung out of soapy water. Hold the bulb by the metal end while wiping the glass with the soapy cloth. This minimizes the risk of wetting the metal part. If the metal part of the bulb does get wet, be sure not to screw it back into its socket until it is completely dry.

Wish You Wouldn't's Apply to Parents, Too

SINCE turn about is fair play, any list of "Wish you Wouldn't's" for teen-agers should be accompanied by a few "Don't's" for parents, too. Emily Miller points out in nationally-circulated Capper's Farmer. Discussing the teen-agers' viewpoint, she writes:

"Seems as if 'I wish you wouldn't' is the preface to a good many statements by the older generation. 'The way you dress, eat, walk, talk — gadrooks — nothing seems to please them.

"But before you get too huffy and cast their admonitions to the breeze, slip into a huddle with yourself. How deep you may find the grace to admit that a lot of so-called characteristic adolescent behaviorisms are not calculated to make the populace love you. And that just because simply everybody acts a certain way is not sufficient reason for anybody as special as you to follow suit."

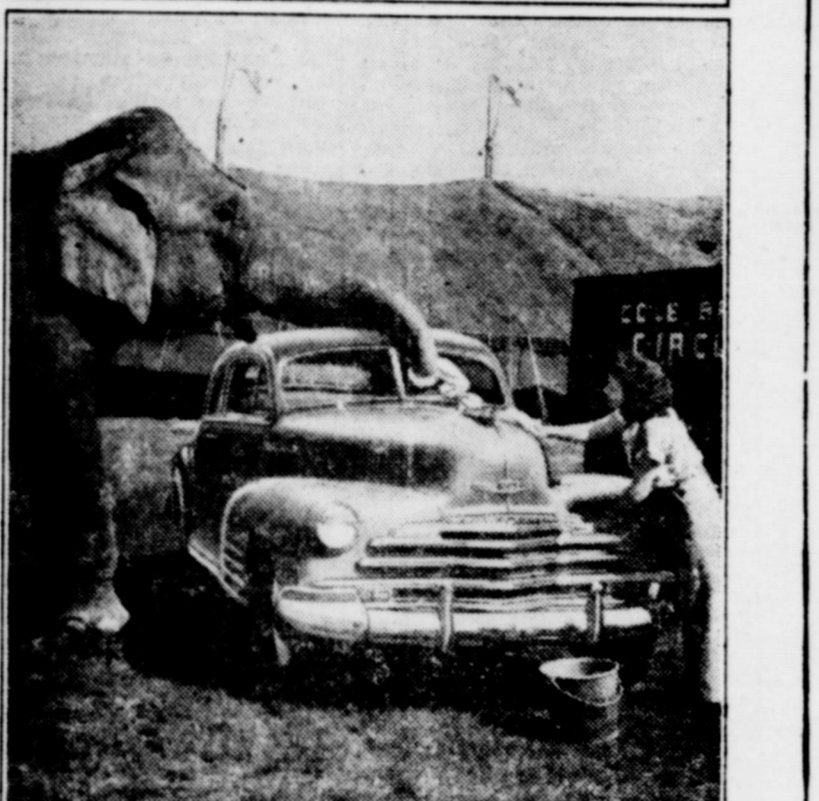

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
Increase Milk With Electrical Deicers

Higher Production Can Be Secured With Control

Of all the problems which live-stock farmers face during the winter, one of the most annoying is the task of preventing ice from coating the surface of their stock tanks.

An adequate year-round water supply is essential to enable dairy cows to continue top milk production and to maintain economical gains on beef cattle and hogs. A pressure water system will do the job most of the year, but what about those freezing months farmers now are facing?

The following results of tests conducted by Purdue university help in approaching the problem: There is



no advantage in actually warming water for stock; the maintenance of an ice-free drinking hole is sufficient; water under pressure eliminates the necessity of having large capacity storage tanks.

Given these findings, agricultural engineers have turned to electricity as a means of overcoming winter stock tank worries. Research has shown that electric heaters, with wattages rated as low as 300, are capable of keeping ice-free holes open in small tanks without difficulty. Among newly developed electric stock tank heaters, operating at low cost, is a device which is designed to float on the surface of the water. It consists of a hollow metal disk, encircled by a heating element and containing a thermostat. Tests show that it can keep a recommended drinking hole open in temperatures far below zero.

In 1867 Thomas S. Hall invented the automatic electric block system and the first installation was on the New York and Harlem Rail road. The wheels of the locomotive strike a lever pivoted to the rail & this in turn sets the signal at danger until the train is out of the block.

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SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of two new sections to be known as Sections 17 and 18 providing a special fund for the payment of Confederate pensions and providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning; providing for a five cent reduction in the maximum allowable state tax on property; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS —

SECTION 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sections 17 and 18 which shall read as follows—

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven (7c) cents on the One Hundred (\$100) Dollars valuation heretofore permitted to be levied, in Section 51 of Article 3, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two (2c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organization or militia provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate hereinabove levied.

"ALSO THERE IS HEREBY levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Five (5c) Cents on One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings, or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning; and the governing board of each of such institutions of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institutions as hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear in-

terest not to exceed three (3) per cent per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise not to exceed ten (10) years from the first (1st) day of January of each year in which such funds are allocated or re-allocated to said respective institutions; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to period of thirty (30) years from the date of the adoption of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five (5c) Cent tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds hereby authorized; provided further that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"Funds raised from said Five (5c) Cents tax levy for the ten (10) year period beginning January 1, 1948, are hereby allocated to the following institutions of higher learning, and in the following proportions, to wit—

Not later than June 1st of the beginning year of each succeeding ten (10) year period, the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, based on the average long session full time student enrollment for the preceding five (5) year period of time, shall re-allocate to the above designated institutions of higher learning then in existence, all funds to be derived from said Five (5c) Cent ad valorem tax for said ten (10) year period; and all such designated institution of higher learning which participate in the allocation or re-allocation of such funds shall not thereafter receive any other state funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Five (5c) Cents ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of other State funds. This amendment shall be self-enacting. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose."

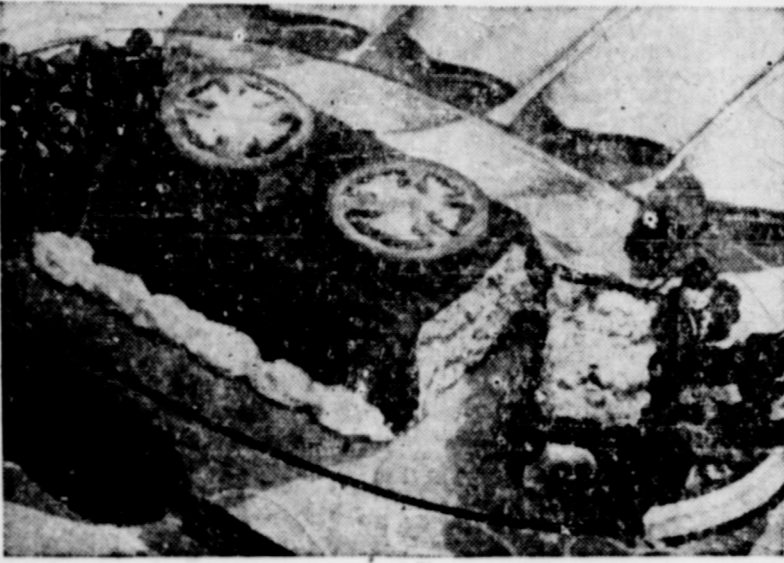
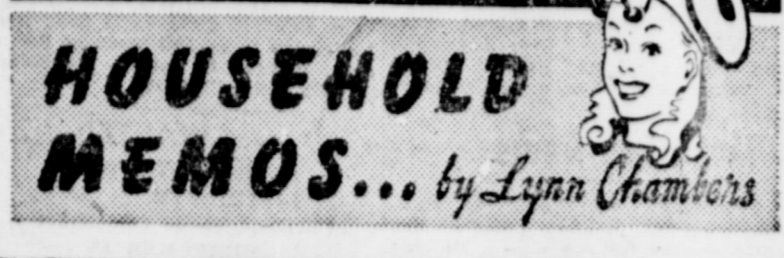

Spring Luncheons

Now that spring housecleaning is over and we are proud of our shining, spic and span homes, it's time to return obligations for luncheons which have piled up within the last several weeks. There is truly no season during which it's more fun to entertain than these lusciously warm days when garden foods are plentiful.

If you want to carry luncheons off successfully, plan light in-season foods. Use sufficient fruits and vegetables to keep the menu seasonal, and let your table decorations carry out the theme.

Lamb chops and chicken, asparagus and strawberries, and a few other foods are reigning favorites. Around them you can build a luncheon menu that will be both eye-appealing and tasty. Plan to do most of the cooking ahead of time so you won't be flustered by the time the guests begin to come in.

If you want to serve a nice meat dish you might like to start off with a stuffed lamb chop, follow it with a tomato aspic or tossed salad and asparagus, then top off with strawberries and cream.

*Stuffed Lamb Chops.
4 double-thick lamb chops
2 canned peaches
1 cup crushed pineapple
1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
1/4 cup butter or substitute

Brown lamb chops in skillet on both sides. Toss together finely chopped peaches, pineapple, bread crumbs and butter. Pile on top of chops which have been placed in a casserole. Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven for 20 minutes.

Asparagus Vinaigrette. (Serves 4)
3 tablespoons vinegar
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1/2 cup salad oil
1 tablespoon minced parsley
1 tablespoon chopped pickle
1 tablespoon minced chives
1 bunch asparagus (1 pound)

Combine seasonings, add vinegar and salad oil. Beat until thick and smooth. Add remaining ingredients and let stand for 1/2 hour. Clean asparagus and cook in boiling salted water until tender. Heat sauce and serve over asparagus.

A luxury luncheon for special guests uses both chicken and ham in the main dish. However, you can keep the rest of the luncheon cost down by serving simply a tossed salad and a rhubarb compote for dessert.

Chicken DeLuxe. (Serves 4)
4 thick slices ham
4 breasts of chicken, cooked
4 tablespoons melted butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups rich chicken stock and milk combined
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Whole sautéed mushrooms

Arrange breast of chicken on top of ham slices. Melt butter, blend in flour and seasonings, then add chick-

en stock and milk. Cook until thick and smooth. Cover chicken and ham with sauce and top with mushrooms.

Rhubarb Compote. (Serves 4 to 6)
4 cups cubed rhubarb
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
2 whole cloves
Juice, pulp and grated rind of 1 orange

Combine all ingredients and place in baking dish. Cover and bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven for 40 minutes or until rhubarb is tender. Serve warm or cold with cream and crisp cookies.

A more economical luncheon, but one just as pretty, consists of this salad loaf done with aspic and crabmeat. This is delicious served with hot biscuits and topped off with pineapple sherbet with fresh strawberry sauce.

Crabmeat Party Salad. (Serves 6)
Part I: Aspic
2 tablespoons gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
2 1/2 cups hot consommé
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon white pepper
1/4 teaspoon celery salt

Soften gelatin in cold water. Add hot consommé, lemon juice, white pepper and celery salt. Stir until dissolved. Pour into an 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 by 2 1/2-inch loaf pan enough of the aspic to make 1/2 inch deep. Chill until firm. Place a smaller loaf pan or container within the 8 1/2-inch loaf pan; anchor firmly with weights or tie in place. Pour remaining aspic in the space between the two pans. Chill until firm. Remove inner pan by loosening aspic with a small knife. Chill for 10 minutes and fill center with the following:

Part II: Crabmeat Filling
1 tablespoon gelatin
2 tablespoons cold water
1/4 cup cream or top milk
1/2 cup real mayonnaise
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon onion, minced
1 1/2 cups crabmeat, flaked
1 cup celery, chopped fine
1/4 cup parsley, chopped fine
Tomato slices
Watercress

Soften gelatin in cold water. Add cream and heat over hot water until gelatin is dissolved. Add real mayonnaise, lemon juice, salt and onion. Add crabmeat, celery, parsley and mayonnaise to gelatin. Pour into center of aspic mold and chill until firm. Unmold and garnish with slices of tomato and watercress. Serve with additional mayonnaise.

Variation: Pour aspic into ring mold, and crabmeat mixture into a smaller mold to fit in center of ring mold. Or, use chicken or tuna in place of crabmeat filling.

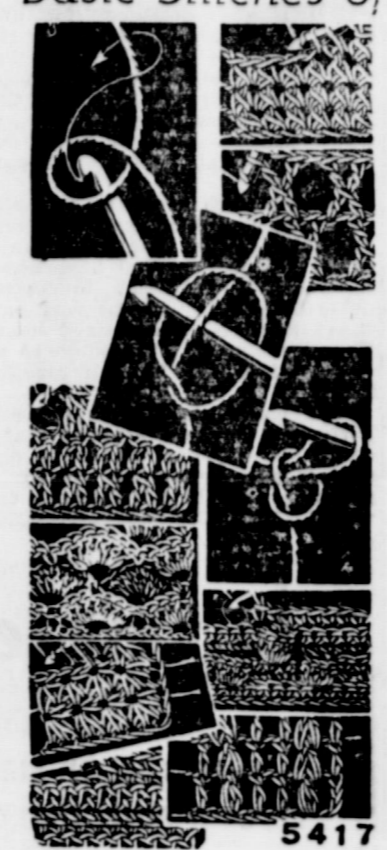

WARNING GIVEN ON NEW DRUGS

It is an unfortunate fact that some people are willing to risk their health -- possibly even their lives -- by prescribing for themselves and taking a drug that they have read about somewhere and which has been termed a "miracle drug", the State Health Department said.

"Although such drugs as penicillin, streptomycin, thiouracil and sulfa drugs have been of great value in combating diseases that have heretofore been very difficult to control, nevertheless, they can be very dangerous products in untrained hands. They were never intended to be used promiscuously for self-medication."

If a pharmacist refuses to sell a particular drug and explains that it cannot be supplied without a physician's prescription, the purchaser should not become provoked.

That pharmacist is giving sound public health advice and is also complying with the law. The State Health Officer declared that self-medication is never advisable, and even "miracle drugs" should be taken only when a doctor prescribes them.
