WASHINGTON BY GEO. MAHON

West Texans will be interested in the annual appropriations bill for the Department of Agriculture. There will be a storm of protest over the provisions of the bill, and I shall join with others who are interested in agriculture in seeking to prevent unwarranted reductions in certain programs for agriculture.

Funds for agricultural research have been slashed. This seems to me to be false economy at its worst. Re search and development in weapons and airplanes played a major part in our military victory. Agricultural research should play a major part in promoting peace time agricultural prosperity.

Funds for soil conservation and cooperation with soil conservation districts have also been greatly reduced. This does not make sense to me. I think we need greater emphas is on soil conservation, and I shall support an amendment for the ex pansion of this activity

The bill drastically reduces the funds for the AAA payment pro-gram. The President requested three hundred million dollars for this purpose in 1947 and producers have proceeded with the 1947 crop on that basis. As I see it, Congress in fairness is bound to follow thru on this program for the 1947 crop, and any changes proposed for the 1947 crop could not be made to apply before the 1948 crop year. How

ever, the bill as now written slashes funds for the 1947 AAA program The bill provides for drastic, and to my way of thinking, unjustifiable cuts in the Farmers Home Admin Istration program. I hope funds can be restored.

Certain economies of administrat

ion are contained thruout the bill and these savings should be made. People interested ie rural electri ficatiot will be pleased to know that at this writing the bill contains the full amount requested by the President for the expansion of the REA program.


Higher Production Can Be Secured With Control

Of all the problems which livestock farmers face during the winer, one of the most annoying is the task of preventing ice from coating the surface of their stock tanks.

An adequate year-round water supply is essential to enable dairy

cows to continue top milk production and to maintain economical gains on beef cattle and hogs. A pressure water system will do the job most of the year, but what about those freezing months farmers now are facing?

The following results of tests conducted by Purdue university help in approaching the problem: There is



no advantage in actually warming water for stock; the maintenance of an ice-free drinking hole is sufficient; water under pressure elimi-ates the necessity of having large Capacity storage tanks.

Given these findings, agricultural

engineers have turned to electricity as a means of overcoming winter stock tank worries. Research has shown that electric heaters, with wattages rated as low as 300, are capable of keeping ice-free holes open in small tanks without difficulty. Among newly developed electric stock tank heaters, operating at low cost, is a device which is designed to float on the surface of the water. It consists of a hollow metal disk, encircled by a heating ele-ment and containing a thermostat. Tests show that it can keep a rec-ommended drinking hole open in temperatures far below zero.







Watercress Soften gelatin in cold water. Add cream and heat over hot water until gelatin is dissolved. Add real mayonnaise, lemon juice, salt and onion. Add crabmeat, celery, parsley and mayonnaise to gelatin. Pour into center of aspic mold and chill until firm. Unmold and garnish with slices of tomato and watercress. Serve with additional mayonnaise.
