### Six Accidents In February

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of February, according to Sergeant Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in an estimated property damage of \$1,910.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the first two months of 1966 shows a total of 19 accidents resulting in one person killed, eight persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,720.00.

#### Some Postal Rates Increase

Increased rates on money orders, insurance, registered, certified and COD mail go into effect Saturday, March 26, the Post Office Department announces.

The Department says the new charges will reduce annual losses on the five special mail services from \$60 to \$36 million. money order fees will be in-

reased five cents. Minimum insurance fee will be increased from 10 cents to 20 cents and the maximum will be raised from 40 to 60 cents.

The present 60 cent and 75 cent registry fee will be combined in a single fee of 75 cents; for values up to \$100. Present 40 and 50 cent fee

brackets for COD mail will be combined in one fee of 60 cents for amounts up to \$10. There will be no change in the fees covering items valued at more than

The certified mail fee will rise from 20 cents per item to 30


