Another interesting racial sidelight is that the Board of Deacons of the above-mentioned Church in Louisiana voted to accept into membership any and all Negro members. To date no Negroes have united as that race have churches of their own. The next fifty years will prove very interesting . here's a hope we'll be around at 94.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a navy suit with white accessories. She carried white orchid bordered by bridal wreath atop a white leather bound prayer book.


