

Executive Says Back-Seat Driver Has Good Points

Back-seat drivers got a pat on the back recently from a leading motor vehicle executive.

L. S. Harris, executive secretary of the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators, said a great safety service by asking that car passengers could "perform

questions requiring an answer."

Pointing out that his statement also included drivers' mates, Harris said: "This doesn't mean I'm in favor of nagging wives, but simply that an occasional query from the back seat frequently helps to keep a day-dreaming driver alert and avoid accidents. If the driver fails to answer, he either needs to stop and take a breather or let someone else take his place behind the wheel."

Recommends Coffee Stops The motor vehicle official recommended that motorists make fre-

quent coffee stops in the interests of highway safety. "Pulling off the road every couple

of hours for a wake-up cup of hot coffee has saved more than one life," he said. "Uninterrupted driving, like prolonged work of any kind, builds fatigue or drowsiness to a point that can be fatal. The tired driver is less vigilant, loses the ability to judge speed and distances, reacts more slowly to emer-gencies, and is less able to resist the glare of headlights."

He cited recently compiled figures of New York University's safety center to point up the importance of coffee stops to alert driving, particularly on long trips. The center survey revealed that the average driver makes from 20 to 50 decisions an hour-many of them of the splitsecond variety

Five Safety Rules In extremely congested areas like New York City, "a driver is always less than a second away from an accident," according to the Center

report. Harris listed the following five safety rules as important to safer summer motoring:

1. Start your trip when rested, not after a hard day's work when fatigue has already set in.
2. Keep plenty of fresh air in the car as an anti-drowsiness pre-

3. Make a coffee stop at least once every two hours; walk around; stretch your limbs.

4. Engage in light conversation with the passengers. 5. In case of doubt as to your physical condition, pull off the road or go to a hotel and sleep.

She immediately afterward is-sued a royal command that she be addressed not as "queen", but as "king" and always as "his ma-

She was a vigorous, brilliant, and strong-minded woman who came forth on state occasions clad in the garments of a man. She wore the short kilt and sandals and the great war-helmet of the Pharaohs and even attached to her chin the Pharach's long false beard.

- Nobel Prize Winner Says the Moon Is Just a Lump of Dust

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—That moon that means so much to lovers and poets is nothing but a large lump of dust. At least that's the opinion of No-

bel Prize-winning chemist Harold C. Urey who theorizes that the moon was formed from accumu-lated dust particles.

Urey's new book upsets the idea held by most scientists that the moon is a torn-off fragment of the earth, lost ages ago when the earth was molten. His theory is that the moon was independently born from a cosmic dust cloud.

Putting first things first, he adds that the surface of the moon was formed over three billion years ago or at the end of the formation of the moon's core.

Urey is one of the few men w knows both the chemistry and the astronomy on which this knotty problem hinges. It seems that in the past, few astronomers have known enough chemistry and few chem-ists have bothered to look up from their test tubes.

Urey also has something to say about the origins of the entire solar system.

In the very beginning, he says there was a cloud of cosmic dust from which the sun and a churning disk of gas and dust was formed. The dust particles, called plantesimals, contained enough water to allow crystallization.

All this, Urey says, took place at extremely cold temperatures. His view differs sharply from the popular notion that the solar system began under conditions of extreme heat.

Condensations of the dust formed embryonic planets. This was fol-lowed by a period of very high temperature during which chemical changes formed the cores of the

Urey concludes that things were wrapped up nicely when the temperature took a sharp drop and left the earth and the moon in their present form.

Kills Self Because He Loves Brother's Wife

SAN PEDRO, Calif. - Dean Dickey, 18, had been in love with his brother's wife for a year.

Dean made the headlines last year when, twice in a week, he tried to kill himself-once by swallowing liniment, again by in-

haling gas.
He told police the reason was a secret love for Laurita Dean, wife of his brother, Alivin, 23.
"I didn't know," Alvin said at

the time. "Dean didn't say a word. He hardly came near me." The youth recovered, and joined the navy. His family thought his young-love crush was

Back in port, he visited the home of a sister, Mrs. Blythe McKee, and her husband, Wesley. They chatted late and then

The McKees were awakened by a shotgun blast. They found Dean dead. Police Detective W. A. Halloway quoted McKee: "I think Dean killed himself in despondency over thinking he still loved his brother's wife."

The pilot was Lt. Com. William H. "Buck" Rogers, Austin, Tex. The plane was a Skyraider Guppy with a total crew of three.

Rogers jockeyed his ship onto the port catapult of the aircraft carrier Valley Forge and blinked lights for

Something went wrong with the catapult. Suddenly the Skyraider began skidding down the ice-coated deck of the carrier with no help from the still-cocked catapult. Rogers tramped on the brakes and cut the power.

The plane didn't stop, so he turned on full power. The plane dropped of the bow of the ship and hit the water with a thud.

It bounced into the air, and started flying.

Rogers eased the craft along eight inches above the waves until he could gain altitude. Then he and his crew completed their mission.

Fatten Near Market

For six summers, King Ranch steers approaching market age have been shipped by rail from south Texas rangeland to meadows 30 miles southwest of Philadelphia beside Buck and Doe Run, a tributary of Brandywine Creek.

There, burying their noses in grass, they have gained as much as 300 pounds per calf in 150 days, May to October. Then, shipped to market, they leave the autumn meadows to the huntsman.

The three-year drought, however, has caused King Ranch cattle population to dwindle from 85,00 to less than 60,000. The Buck and Doe Run farms have this spring received their first shipment calves less than a year old-a full year younger than usual. They will be grazed for more than a year instead of for five months, putting a large part of 10,000 fox-hunting acres on a year-around cattle graz-

ing basis. Uninitiated travelers rolling through the countryside near Union-ville, Pa., do a "double take" on seeing green pastures where cherry-red beef steers are herded by Texasstyle cowboys complete with lari-

ats, chaps, fancy boots, and spurs.
Actually, "Hi Yi Yippy" is not
part of the lingo of these eastern cowpokes any more than it is on the 900,000-acre King Ranch itself. The Buck and Doe Run hands are mostly eastern Pennsylvania farm natives newly trained to ranch work riding Texas quarter horses and wearing western ranch clothes because they are practical for the purpose. Spanish-speaking vaque-ros drive the herds in south Texas, but do not take kindly to transplant-

Hardy Breed

Buck and Doe Run Farms at present handle about 5,000 cattle. Texas rangeland outside the drought area has been leased for current King Ranch emergency use. Farms on Long Island, in Illinois, Oklahoma, and elsewhere near major-stockyard cities, have for years been fattening skinny steers close to the market for King and other

cattle-raisers. of the King Nine-tenths producing Shorthorns and fever-recattle are of the handsome red Santa Gertrudis breed, developed by that ranch since 1923.

County Has Trouble Paying the Preacher

The preacher is the Rev. Bill Allison, who ministers to the spiritual needs of convicts, open meetings of county administrators with prayer, and is largely responsible for the reform of many Georgia

badmen. Fulton County couldn't get along without its dynamic chaplain—but, just now, dwindled county departments are practically passing the hat to make up his \$375 monthly paycheck.

Before a plan of improvement lopped Fulton County's five prison work camps to two, the Fulton department of public Works paid Mr.

Now that the chaplain's incarcerated flock has shrunk from 700 to the 400 men at Bellwood and Ben Hill work camps, with a correspond-ing decrease in the budget of the Fulton county public works depart-ment, that department assumes only 40 per cent of the minister's salary.

Fulton County Manager A. E. Fuller, like any good deacon or elder in a country church concerned about the parson, has been "stirring up the congregation to get together the preacher's money."

Flood Control Was An Issue as Far Back as 2500 B.C.

CHICAGO, Ill.—Flood control was an issue as far back as 2500 B.C. in ancient Babylonia. Efforts to achieve it seem to have been attended with some successes and

Following are some notes from labels on exhibits in the Hall of Babylonia at Chicago Natural History Museum, prepared by Richard A. Martin, Near-East archaeologist on the staff, who participated in surveys and excavations of the Kish area in Babylonia on museum expeditions some years ago:

"In Babylonia high water came in the spring during the growing season when flooding the fields would be disastrous. This led to the development of perennial irrigation with a complicated network of canals both to supply arable land with water when needed and to divert the high water season runoff into nonproductive areas. The canals served also as waterways for the transport of goods. The canals were state operated and taxes were imposed for their maintenance.

"Remains of some of the main canals that supplied the Kish area have been found. Today, in the same area, modern irrigation canals follow the courses of the ancient ones. That many of the canals closely paralleled each other is due to their constnt silting. When piles on either bank become too high conveniently to shovel out the silt, it is easier to dig a new canal alongside utilizing one bank of the old.

"To control the floods of the Euphrates and Tigris and still supply the irrigation canals with water, barrages were constructed in the river channel or at advantageous spots, and sections were opened by earth locks and dams.

"During times of political up-heaval these control points were left unattended, the natural silting of the river blocked the restricted openings, and a new channel would be cut by the river."

Among exhibits from Kish at the museum is a flood stratum deposit of a type found in dwellings of the early Dynastic period (3000-2500 B.C.). It was 36 feet below the surface of the mound excavated by the museum expedition, and ten feet above the present water table. On the surface of this clay deposit are the remains of fresh water fish left behind when the water receded.



Flood Control Was An Issue as Far Back as 2500 B.C.

CHICAGO, Ill.-Flood control was an issue as far back as 2500 B.C. in ancient Babylonia. Efforts to achieve it seem to have been attended with some successes and

Following are some notes from labels on exhibits in the Hall of Babylonia at Chicago Natural History Museum, prepared by Richard A. Martin, Near-East archaeologist on the staff, who participated in surveys and excavations of the Kish area in Babylonia on museum expeditions some years ago:

"In Babylonia high water came in the spring during the growing season when flooding the fields would be disastrous. This led to the development of perennial irrigation with a complicated network of canals both to supply arable land with water when needed and to divert the high water season runoff into nonproductive areas. The ca nals served also as waterways for the transport of goods. The canals were state operated and taxes were imposed for their maintenance.

"Remains of some of the main canals that supplied the Kish area have been found. Today, in the same area, modern irrigation canals follow the courses of the ancient ones. That many of the canals closely paralleled each other is due to their constnt silting. When piles on either bank become too high conveniently to shovel out the silt, it is easier to dig a new canal alongside utilizing one bank of the old.

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
