## S. S. MAN HERE NEXT TUESDAY AFTERNOON

June graduates of high school, vocational schools and college are urged to apply for their social security account number cards before they graduate. Also students who are not graduating this June but who expect to work during their summer vacations should obtain their cards before classes end. Seasonal workers, who expect to be employed for the first time on jobs covered by social security, should likewise apply early. Many prospective employers will not hire a person unless he has his social security account number card with him, and many a good job has been lost this way.

The importance of the account number lies in the fact that wages can only be credited thru the use of the account number. Since the money recorded in a person's social security account is used to figure benefits, the more money credited in the account the higher the benefits. Thus, if for any reason wages are reported without an account number or with an incorrect number, then these wages may not be credited to the account.

A representative from the Lubbock social security office will be in O'Donnell next Tuesday, May 18 at 4:30 p. m. at the post office and will be glad to assist in matters pertaining to social security.

## TV RELAY TOWERS SET FOR AREA

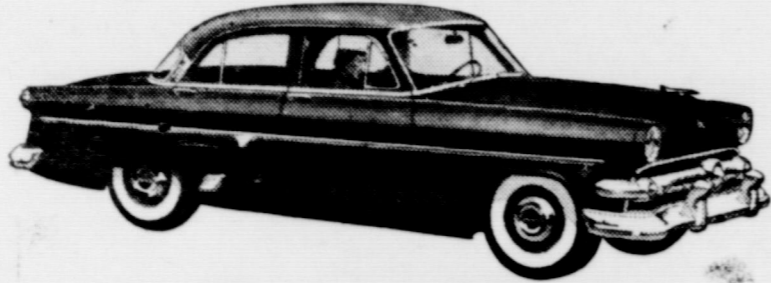

**Galena Opens Homes To Public for a Day**

GALENA, Ill.—This little town, once the El Dorado of the west, recently opened its pre-Civil War homes to the public for a day. Galena is one of the most picturesque towns in the U. S.—artists flock here and are seen almost any day on Main street daubing away.

The town boasts of eight of the finest examples of pre-Civil War homes. Two of the homes were once residences of U. S. Grant, and the town is full of Grant lore. The state-owned mansion that the people of Galena presented to Grant after the Civil War is always open to the public.

Galena is a hill town, situated on the Galena river. Before it became filled with sand and earth, the river was a great water high-  
way. Many great river boats and packets tied up at the docks, bringing passengers and freight up the Mississippi from New Orleans.

Pre-emergence sprays were used last year by cotton farmers in 39 Texas counties and on 11,000 acres. Post-emergence sprays on 7,400 acres in 21 counties. Demonstrations have shown that chemicals can be successfully used to reduce the cost of producing cotton.
