Then came Woodrow Wilson who demanded that the country be set free from conditions he thought "made monopoly not only possible, but easy and natural." The Underwood law which brought the import duties down from 37 per cent to 27 per cent, was his answer. Under Harding they went up about 35 per cent, reaching an all-time high under Hoover.

It has been an exciting contest. Although Cordell Hull as secretary of state managed, with Roosevelt prestige, to pull them down again, they were still 1 per cent higher than the Fordney-McCumber act raised them under Harding. Under the agreements negotiated by Secretary Hull, our exports increased, but foreign competition for various reasons did not take advantage of the situation to any great extent. There was no avalanche of "cheap foreign goods" to contend with.

The Democrats in the pre-Wilson era always were banging away on this issue and there were many ful debates. The low tariff ad vocates had to resort to all sorts of means to get a hearing because they were backed by no special interests Their "client" was the vague and anonymous American consumer.

The high-tariff pleaders were able to present their cases armed with the best legal talent available, whole libraries of statistics and a thorough knowledge of the particular industries they represented. And they had another great advantage in the number and geographically diverse industries fighting for protection for their particular product.

Enough special interests needed enough help from other special interests so that log rolling was easythere was usually a majority for everybody's gismo. That is why the only practical way trade agreements can be reached at all is to have them negotiated like any other international agreement, through the state department, which has no regional strings to tie it down.

Right now the consumer is being heard from in no uncertain terms, and any argument for lower prices

That is evidenced by the speed with which congress tackled the anti-inflation suggestions presented both by the President in his message of November 17 calling for a 10-point program and those offered by Senator Flanders of Vermont and other Republicans.

Despite considerable influential opposition, the Democrats took for granted that at least four out of the President's ten points had a good chance to be adopted. In fact one, authority to ration certain foods, already had been suggested-by a Republican-Senator Flanders.

None of these points involves tariff cuts, however, and those cuts already made under the Geneva agreement are still largely academic because most foreign countries aren't in a position now to produce for export to any great extent.

Next session we can expect them

So far there have been almost as many complaints from supporters of the reciprocal trade agreements act as from its opponents. Its most enthusiastic backers charged that it had not been pushed hard enough, that the state department had not used all of the power which it had for fear of arousing the animosity which would cause its repeal.

At present, those favoring a freer flow of trade are in a better position to urge their cause because it is evi-

Laborites Keep Power; Ask Oil, Coal Ration

LABOR TEST:

Clean Slate

In Great Britain the Labor party had been worried over the outcome of the by-election in the southern town of Gravesend.

Richard Acland, a rich baronet, was carrying the Labor party's banner against Frank Taylor, an exfurnace stoker, the Conservative candidate. A seat in parliament was not the only thing at stake. The election was of major importance as a test of strength between the two parties.

It was a hard fought battle, and Acland, the Laborite, was elected to Parliament by a majority of 1,675 votes-a clear cut defeat for the Conservatives. The British people, the Labor party announced, retained their confidence in their government.

Nevertheless, the 1,675-vote margin of victory was considerably smaller than the 7,056-vote Labor party margin that had been piled up in the same district in 1945. Labor was still in the driver's seat, but clearly had lost something of its original strength. However, the party had kept its slate clean; it had not lost a single by-election since it first was swept into power.

Perhaps one reason for the Labor party's continued popularity was that, despite all else, it was doing a good job of distributing equally what food and other goods were available in Britain. The food rations of the poorer people were approximately the same as those of the rich, and that fact continued to carry a lot of weight with the mass of voters.

OIL RATION:

Anti-Inflation

When President Truman, in his celebrated "10 points against inflation" address to congress, asked for limited authority to impose ration and price controls on basic commodities, it was taken for granted that they were food commodities

First indication that this might not be a correct interpretation of Mr. Truman's proposal came when the department of interior asked congress for power to fix price controls and rationing on coal and oil as part of the anti-inflation pro-

Oscar L. Chapman, undersecretary of the interior, told the house banking and currency committee that grave shortages and price advances were threatened in the two

There was no way of telling, he said, whether such controls actually would have to be imposed, but he insisted that the government should have authority to do so, just in case.

It is not probable that congress will give the government power to control oil and coal, but the incident serves to reflect the current point of view of the administration that a return to wartime rationing and price controls is the quickest and most effective way to buck in-

President Truman disclosed the policy first in his speech at the open-ing of the special session of congress. The interior department's request for control of coal and oil probably was a planned follow-up. in the St. Louis Cardinals.

If the President put congress on the political spot in his message to the special session, he most certainly did so in June, 1946, in January, 1947, and again in June, 1947. The President hit a raw spot because, as with most of us, congress does not like to be reminded of its sins of omission.

Insurgent Republicans

Despite Sen. Robert Taft's powerful position as chairman of the GOP steering committee and of the congressional joint economic committee, he may find determined opposition to his stand against some of the President's recommendations.

For instance, stocky, bald and bespectacled Sen. Ralph Flanders of Vermont, who has been called 'America's most enlightened industrialist," may oppose Taft's policies. Senator Flanders, as chair-

man of a subcommittee of the joint economic committee, has investigated prices and already has declared "we have not found any alternative to some measure of controls at least on the basic item of food." Another insurgent against the Taft

leadership in the senate, this time on the question of universal military training, undoubtedly will develop in the regular session. Taft is staunchly opposed to UMT.

Control of Insects Vital in Gardening New Insecticides and Combinations Effective

Good gardeners and vegetable growers have learned that insect control is as important as good seed, weed control and water.

New insecticides, new combina-tion dusts and better "sticking" agents have made vegetable and garden dusting more popular and effective.

The duster should be able to reach the under side of the leaves in most crops. Many insects feed on



Type of hand duster effective in

the under side. In the control of blights and other plant diseases complete coverage is important.

For the average garden, a hand plunger duster is adequate. This duster should have a long discharge tube with upturned end for underleaf dusting. Larger gardeners and commercial acreages are more effi-ciently dusted with crank or knapsack dusters. Good dusting equipment is more efficient and effective in control of insects and plant diseases than make-shifts.

Potato yields have been in-creased 40 to 60 per cent in University of Wisconsin tests by spraying or dusting DDT at 10-day intervals. Leaf hoppers, flea beetles and po-tato beetles were controlled. Bean beetles, cabbage worms and most common insects are controlled by
