FRIDAY SUGGESTION CREAMED SALT CODFISH IN POTATO RING

3 tablespoons fat 3 tablespoons flour Dash of pepper 2 cups milk 2 1/4 cups shredded salt codfish (10 ounces) 2 shelled hard-cooked eggs, sliced 3 cups hot mashed potatoes

Melt fat in saucepan, stir in flour and pepper. (No salt is needed because of the salt fish used.) Add milk gradually, while stirring, and cook until smooth and thickened, stirring constantly.

Shred codfish by pulling it apart with two forks or cutting it with scissors. Freshen it following manufacturer's directions. Drain, cover with cold water, and simmer 15-20 minutes or until tender.

Menu Suggestions With Creamed Salt Codfish in Potato Ring, serve lemoned green beans (cooked or canned beans seasoned with lemon juice, butter or margarine, salt, and pepper); also sliced pickled beets. For dessert, have crisp molasses cookies and spiced applesauce made by adding 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon and 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg to 2 cups applesauce.

SUGGESTED MENU FOR EGGLESS THURSDAY

BRAINED LAMB SHANKS AND NOODLES 3 lamb shanks 1/2 cup flour 3/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 2 tablespoons fat 1 cup sliced onions 1 small green pepper, seeded and sliced 1 1/4 quarts boiling water 1/2 pound wide noodles

Have butcher cut each shank into 3 pieces. Combine flour with 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Roll meat in this mixture, and brown thoroughly on all sides in the hot fat. Then add onions and green pepper, and brown slightly. Add boiling water, remaining 2 teaspoons salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper, cover and simmer for 1 hour. Then skim off excess fat; add noodles; cover, and continue cooking about 20 minutes or until noodles are tender. Serve shanks in center of platter with noodles and gravy around them. Serves 3-6.

SUGGESTED MENU FOR MEATLESS TUESDAY

SALMON LOAF 1 1-pound can salmon (or 2 cups any flaked, cooked or canned fish) 2 cups soft bread crumbs* 1/2 cup milk 1 egg, well beaten 1 tablespoon minced parsley 1 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons melted fat Drain salmon, reserving liquor. Remove skin and bone and flake the fish. Combine with remaining ingredients and turn into greased loaf pan, 7 1/2 x 3 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches. Bake in moderately hot oven (375° F.) 40 minutes, or until firm in center. Serve with a tasty hot sauce made by stirring 2 tablespoons catchup into 1 cup medium white sauce just before serving. Use the reserved salmon liquor as part of the milk in making the sauce. Serves 4.

*If very dry bread crumbs are used, more milk will be needed to make a moist loaf. With thick slices of the hot Salmon Loaf, we suggest scalloped potatoes and baked Acorn squash, and, for dessert, a tart refreshing lemon-flavored gelatin with cut-up fruit molded in it.

SUNDAY SUGGESTION

Two-day menu planning that looks ahead to Monday's satisfying Peace Plate is part of today's good eating suggestion from home economists of the Citizens Food Committee's Consumer Service Section. Roast Stuffed Shoulder of Lamb—a meat cut in line with the food conservation program—has a Vegetable Stuffing that spares bread and contributes special flavor with food values. Sharing the roasting pan and the meat's fine flavor are Pan-Roasted Potatoes. Try a salad of diced canned pineapple and sliced raw cranberries tossed with broken-up lettuce leaves and your favorite salad dressing. For Sunday dessert, serve chocolate or vanilla ice cream.

ROAST SHOULDER OF LAMB WITH VEGETABLE STUFFING 1 medium onion, diced 1/2 cup celery, chopped 2 tablespoons green pepper, chopped 1 cup raw carrot, grated 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1/2 teaspoon thyme 1/2 teaspoon paprika 1/2 cup melted fat 1 1/2 pounds shoulder of lamb, (cut with "pocket" for stuffing)

Combine first 10 ingredients. Fill pocket of meat with stuffing. Fasten together with skewers or tie securely with cord. Brush shoulders with oil. Season with 2 teaspoons additional salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Roast in moderate oven (350° F.), allowing 45 minutes per pound. Serves 4 to 8, with leftovers.

PAN-ROASTED POTATOES: Pare 8 medium potatoes and boil 10 minutes. Arrange around roast in roasting pan and bake 60-60 minutes, or until tender, turning occasionally and basting with fat in pan. Plan so that the meat and potatoes are done at the same time.

LOOKING AHEAD

Great Teacher, Experience!

They thought that industrial strife would be over. High production, harmony, and peaceful work—these would be rosy ahead. No longer would the coal mines be operated for profit! That ghastly dragon, private enterprise, had gasped his last in a free election. From now on, the coal mines would be operated for the use—for the benefit of the public. Labor government had taken possession of the mines and would be in charge of operations.

Since labor was the government, said brain-trusters in the party, all would be harmony. Of course there would be no more strikes in the coal mining industry. Labor would have no cause to strike against a labor government which was operating the mines solely for the welfare of the nation. This kind of fanciful thinking was popularly done in England when the British government took possession of the coal mines in January, 1946.

Learned The Lesson

The English people have had to learn an important lesson from the experiments in socialism. The lesson is: You can't change economic fact and law by switching political power over to another group through elections or revolutions.

What is the English experience? On September 3, 1947, the Associated Press reported from London that 50,000 miners were on strike. This action closed 46 mines in the spreading strike called "England's worst labor disturbance in the years." Coal had become so scarce because of the strike that 2,400 industrial plants employing 120,000 men warned the government they would be forced to shut down unless they could get coal.

This present strike is most ominous. England is in a crisis of dire proportions—certainly the worst since peace came. Yet, despite the crisis, regardless of the labor government and the fact that it manages the coal industry, the great, spreading strike occurred. Labor government has not been able to keep workers from striking. Britain's program of nationalization has not resulted in cooperation from labor.

Free Work Is Best

A long time the world has been plagued with ideas that are substitutes for work. There will always be men who can make such ideas sound pretty good. But the ideas are just as false as are the men who want the political power required to put some paper "plan" into effect. There is no substitute for the opportunity of honest work, under the kind of free economic system we have in America. Why some political system calls for all the economic power it can get, you may be sure that the common man is going to lose out. One of the first powers sought is the power to control industry.

In a country that speaks our language and enjoys our same civilization, a government that manages industry has brought forth no solution for industrial strife. Government management of industry has made conditions worse. It has brought less efficiency in England, to the tune of 60 million less tons of coal a year. Do we want high wages (which come only with efficiency and high production), and do we want industrial peace and national prosperity? Then surely we want no part of government management of American industries.

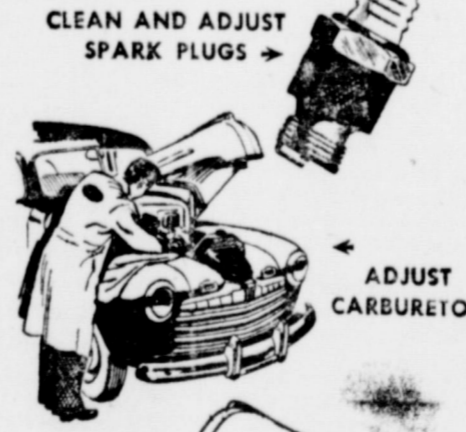

Control of Insects Vital in Gardening

New Insecticides and Combinations Effective

Good gardeners and vegetable growers have learned that insect control is as important as good seed, weed control and water.

New insecticides, new combination dusts and better "sticking" agents have made vegetable and garden dusting more popular and effective.

The duster should be able to reach the under side of the leaves in most crops. Many insects feed on

the under side. In the control of blights and other plant diseases complete coverage is important.

For the average garden, a hand plunger duster is adequate. This duster should have a long discharge tube with upturned end for under-leaf dusting. Larger gardeners and commercial acreages are more efficiently dusted with crank or knapsack dusters. Good dusting equipment is more efficient and effective in control of insects and plant diseases than make-shifts.

Potato yields have been increased 40 to 60 per cent in University of Wisconsin tests by spraying or dusting DDT at 10-day intervals. Leaf hoppers, flea beetles and potato beetles were controlled. Bean beetles, cabbage worms and most common insects are controlled by dusting.

SATURDAY SUGGESTION

A little hamburger goes a long way in today's substantial Peace Plate suggestion from home economists of the Consumer Service Section, Citizens Food Committee. In fact, the course-in-one dish, Texas Hash, serves 8, and three Variations make this a "Must" for the recipe book.

With hearty Texas Hash, serve mixed green pickles and baked potatoes, not forgetting to rub a little fat on skins before baking. For dessert, treat the family to frosted spice cake.

TEXAS HASH

- 2 large onions, sliced
- 2 green peppers, cut fine
- 3 tablespoons fat
- 1 pound hamburger
- 2 cups canned tomatoes
- 1/2 cup uncooked rice
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Cook onions and green pepper slowly in hot fat until onions are yellow. Add hamburger and fry until mixture falls apart. Add tomatoes, rice, and seasonings and mix. Put in large greased casserole, cover, and bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 45 minutes, or until done. Serves 8. To serve 4, divide recipe in half.

Variations:
1. Instead of rice, use 1 cup uncooked spaghetti, macaroni, or noodles.
2. Substitute 1 cup chopped celery stalks and leaves for green pepper.
3. Use 1 teaspoon paprika instead of chili powder.

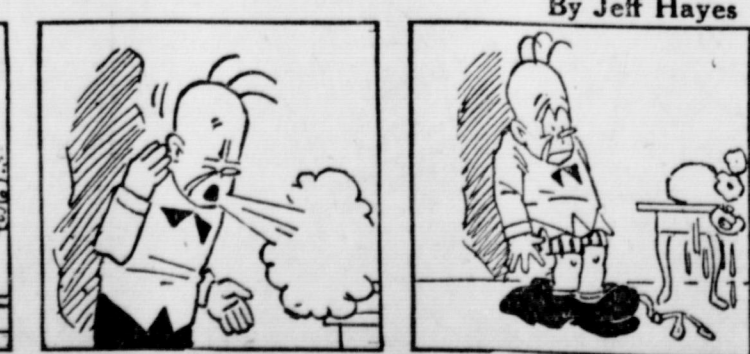

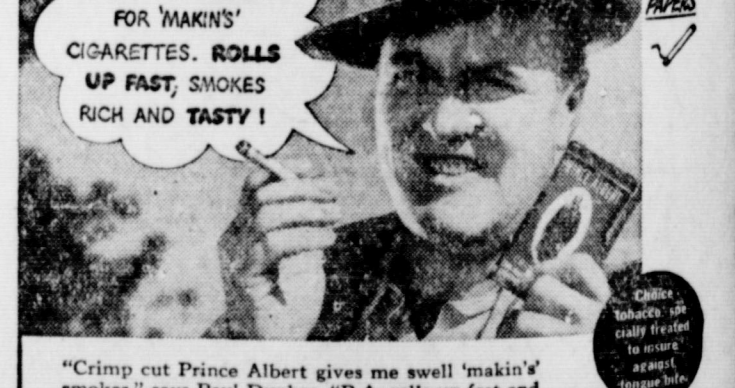

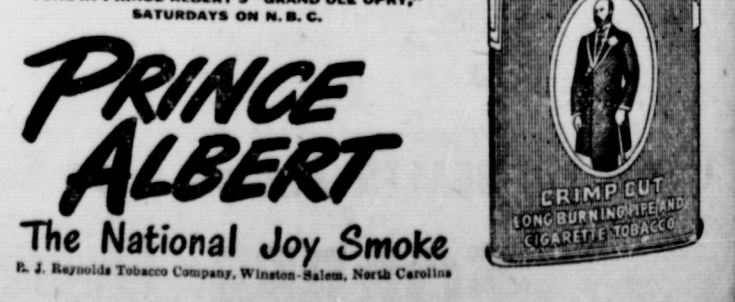

Make Extra Gifts By Baking Goodies In Home Kitchens



Cookies make a wonderful holiday gift! Wrapped as glamorously as these, they'll solve many a last-minute gift dilemma. Set a box under the tree as an extra gift, or take a box of them to your neighbor.

These are extra-wonderful days in the kitchen, for there's a hustle and bustle of activity, warmth and cheer, mysterious smells of something good and the swish of gay and cheery wrapping paper and ribbons. Yes, we're getting ready for Christmas. But it's not just the holiday feast we're preparing for, since kitchens also may be put to work to make those wonderful home-made presents every home-maker appreciates so much.

Of particular interest are cookies and candies. You'll want to make some of your own for the holidays, so why not whip together an extra batch and give some to neighbors and friends? There's no better way of expressing warmth and cheer than something made by deft hands and a heart-load of good wishes.

Henrecies.
(Makes 2½ dozen 2-inch cookies)

- 1/2 cup butter or substitute
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups cake flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup ground nut meats
- 1/2 cup whole bran

Blend butter and sugar; add beaten egg yolks and flavoring. Sift flour, baking powder; add nut meats. Combine with first mixture. Chill. Form dough into egg-shaped balls. Roll in whole bran which has been crushed slightly. Place on greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderately hot (400 degree) oven for 10 minutes. Note: Whole bran may be added to the cookie dough instead of rolling cookies in whole bran.

Chocolate Drops.
(Makes 2½ dozen 2-inch cookies)

- 1/2 cup butter or substitute
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1½ squares chocolate
- 3 tablespoons water
- 1/4 cup sour milk
- 1 cup whole bran
- 1 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup chopped nut meats

Cream butter and sugar, add egg, melted chocolate and water. Beat well, then add sour milk and whole bran. Sift flour with baking powder, soda and salt and add to first mixture with the nut meats. Drop from teaspoon onto a greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate (375 degree) oven for 15 minutes.

Date Favorites.

- 1/2 cup butter or substitute
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 3 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup nuts, chopped
- 1 cup dates, chopped
- 1 cup powdered sugar

Cream butter and sugar. Mix soda with water and add to the butter-

milk. Add flour sifted with salt and baking powder. Fold in nuts and dates. Pour into a shallow, greased pan and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Cut into narrow slices while still warm and roll in powdered sugar.

***Ice Box Cookies.**

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 egg, unbeaten
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup pecans, cut fine
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Cream sugar and butter well together. Add the egg, flour, cream of tartar and soda. Mix well and fold in nuts and vanilla. Make into rolls about 2 inches in diameter and wrap each in waxed paper. Let stand in refrigerator for 24 hours. Then unwrap rolls and slice about 1/4 inch thick. Bake on an ungreased cookie sheet in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 8 minutes, or until golden brown.

Fudge Squares.
(Makes 36)

- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 1/2 cup butter or substitute
- 1/4 cup light corn syrup
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups quick oats, uncooked
- 1/4 cup chopped nutmeats

Melt chocolate and butter in top of double boiler. Add remaining ingredients, blending thoroughly. Pack firmly into an 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle a few chopped nuts on top if desired. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees) for 12 minutes. When cool, turn out of pan and cut in squares. Store in refrigerator if warm.



Of Yuletide sweets, there are none tastier than home-made candies. With just a few ingredients and tested recipes you can concoct some delectable treats and gift-wrap them for Christmas presents.

Brazil Nut Patties.

- 1/2 cup syrup
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 pound brazil nut meats

Combine ingredients. Cook to 290 degrees or the crack stage. Pour carefully over brazil nuts arranged over a marble slab. Loosen patties before they become too hard to prevent them from cracking.

Maple Creams.

- 1 cup maple sugar
- 1 cup light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/2 pound nut meats

Cook the sugars and water to 240 degrees or the soft ball stage. Add the almond extract and cool to lukewarm. Then beat until creamy. Knead until smooth, form into small balls and place a nut meat into each ball.

Stuffed Marshmallows.

- 1 box marshmallows
- 1 1/2 pound nuts (whole meats)

Lay the marshmallows out on a table and, with a sharp knife, make a gash into the center of each. Push a nut meat (English walnut, pecan, hickory or peanut) into this opening, and press marshmallow closed with fingers. They may be dipped in chocolate if desired.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons
By LOUIE D. NEWTON, D. D.

SCRIPTURE: Revelation 1-7; Acts 16:16-40; I Peter 4:12-19; 5:6, 7.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Revelation 3:7-13.

Courageous Loyalty
Lesson for December 14, 1947

OPEN your Bible to Revelation, and read the first seven chapters. Then you will be ready for Acts 16:16-40, and I Peter 4:12-19, and 5:6, 7. These Scriptures form the basis of a study for Sunday on Loyalty Under Persecution.

Christians are not promised an easy time, but they are assured sufficient grace for every time of need. This lesson, if carefully pondered, will fortify one's faith and send us forth renewed in courage and Christian poise for these days of discipleship.

How a Song Helped
"HUMBLE yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that he may exalt you in due time; casting all your care upon him, for he careth for you." I Peter 5:6, 7. That is a splendid watchword for every boy and girl.

Now, turn to Acts 16:16-30, and see how Paul and Silas, locked in the inner dungeon at midnight, could pray and sing. That is what happens to the Christian who sincerely trusts in God—who acts on the promise that God really cares for his trusting children.

A memory verse suggested for Sunday is found in Proverbs 17:22, and it goes like this: "A cheerful heart is a good medicine." Have you watched some Christian in affliction—how he or she could bless every passerby? It was because that person possessed the "cheerful heart." And each of us may have that precious possession, if we remember Mark 11:22, "Have faith in God."

Happy Behind Prison Bars

PAUL and Silas are pictured as happy in that dark dungeon. There is a statement to challenge every cynic, every doubting Thomas. Only the grace of God can make men happy under persecution. Paul declares in Romans 1:16, "I am not ashamed of the Gospel." Aye, he was not ashamed to preach the Gospel to the little damsel on the streets of Jerusalem, nor was he ashamed to go to the prison for the sake of the Gospel.

Best of all, Paul and Silas were sustained in their sorrowful plight by the consciousness that God was with them—that he always keeps his word. I venture the prediction that the fortitude of Paul and Silas in that night of persecution did more to impress the Christian religion upon Jerusalem than any sermon even the eloquent Paul ever uttered. We, too, can witness for Christ as we face difficult situations.

Courageous Loyalty

LOOK now at Revelation 2:8-11, and 3:14-22, for the example of the church at Smyrna, burdened by tribulation and poverty, but "rich" in the promise that a crown of life awaited them.

It was far more difficult to be a Christian in the first century than it is in the twentieth century. By which I mean that the early Christians were few in number and without any backing of public opinion. They were despised as the lowly followers of the crucified carpenter of Nazareth. Today, Christians are acknowledged as the best citizens in every community.

Even so, there are tests for us—tests that will be too much for human courage and loyalty. If we are true to the teachings of Jesus as they relate to everyday life, we shall need that same endowment which the Christians at Smyrna possessed, else our discipleship will shame the name of our Lord.

The Blood of the Lamb

THE lesson concludes with that dramatic passage in Revelation 7:9-17, in which we behold the great white-robed throng about the throne of God, singing, "Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be unto our God forever and ever. Amen."

Who were they? "These are they which came out of great tribulation, and have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."

Loyalty under persecution is dependent absolutely upon the life-giving power of the blood of the Lamb.

"Fear not, I am with thee, O be not dismayed. For I am thy God, and will still give thee aid."
