**NAME TWO COMMITTEEMEN FOR FSA PURCHASES**  
Word was received here today by Jack Welch, Lynn County Farm Security Administration Supervisor, that a committee of two farmers has been appointed by Secretary Wallace to assist in carrying out the FSA Tenant Purchase program.  
Those named by the Secretary of Agriculture are: B. J. Emanuel and E. J. Cooper. A third member will be appointed at a later date. These men will assist Mr. Welch in administering the Tenant Purchase program which provides for making a 40-year three per cent loan to a limited number of Lynn County tenants for the purchase of farms. These loans are available only to farm tenants or farm laborers.  
One of the main duties of the committee will be to investigate applicants and recommend those which they believe should receive loans. Basis for this recommendation will center largely around the character, experience and the farming ability of the applicant.

**CITY TAKES MEASURES TO PREVENT TYPHOID EPIDEMIC**  
Mayor B. M. Haymes and members of the city council are this week joining with local physicians and county health authorities to prevent an outbreak of typhoid here. These measures were begun Wednesday promptly after one case of typhoid was found in a Mexican family residing near the business district.  
City sewage disposal plant is being coated with oil to prevent the breeding of mosquitoes, and all residents are asked to take precautions concerning breeding of flies in lots, hog pens, and privies.  
While taking these preventive measures, city officials and physicians point out that there is no immediate danger of an epidemic, but that such moves are merely in the nature of precautions. The recent heavy rains caused unusually free breeding of mosquitoes and flies, which are always a danger, and it is to the best interests of the territory as a whole to cooperate in this manner.

Berryhill will therefore not be able to conduct services, and for this reason that series of revival services will not begin until July 30th, when the Casey Evangelistic Party of Hot Springs will be here. **Plans Under Way For Rodeo Aug. 11-12**  
**Second Annual Event Sponsored By Practically All O'Donnell Merchants**  
Plans for the second annual Rodeo to be held here Friday and Saturday, August 11-12, are actively under way this week. Messrs. O. L. and Otis Harris, who will stage the show, met Tuesday with the Rotary Club to discuss plans for booster trips and various activities connected with the two days of rip-sportin' fun and thrills.  
While Harris Bros. will have active management of the rodeo performances, O'Donnell business men and residents are wholeheartedly backing the enterprise and plans now being perfected will make this one of the best such shows ever staged in West Texas.  
**Arena Nearly Completed**  
Pens, chutes, and lighting system are practically ready for the show, and will be completed by the end of this week. Floodlights are being installed to effectively light the arena, and a loudspeaker is being set up.  
Seventy-five head of stock will be used by the management during the four shows. Fifteen vicious Brahma bulls, 20 Brahma yearlings, fifteen bucking brones and twenty-five additional yearling are in fine shape to give the boys plenty of work and furnish thrills and spills aplenty for the crowd.  
**New Feature Planned**  
One comparatively new feature is called a yearling scramble. During that event, one yearling will be released with his rider—if he's lucky enough to stay on—from the chute even ten seconds. If the rider retains his mount until the yearling crosses a line sixty feet from the end of the chute, his ride is qualified, but he must also dismount before the calf crosses another line thirty feet from the first. With stock and boys spilling out every ten seconds, this part of the show should be plenty fast. Additional information concerning the rodeo will appear in this paper from time to time.

**LYNTEGAR LINES ARE EMERGED**  
Electric energy was turned into Lynntegar Electric Co-operative lines Monday morning at Sub-Station No. 1, two and one-half miles north of Meadow. Electricity will be furnished by Texas-New Mexico Utilities Co. on contract.  
Distribution lines are being made "hot" at 64 as workmen can make connections in the northwest part of the county.  
Lines are ready for use as far east as the Taboka-Lubbock highway.  
In the meantime lines in the east part of Lynn county and in western Garza county are going up steadily. Dawson and Hockley county residents seeking extension of the lines to include their counties must hurry. Resident Engineer Edward P. Price says, for funds in Washington for these extensions will not be available much longer.

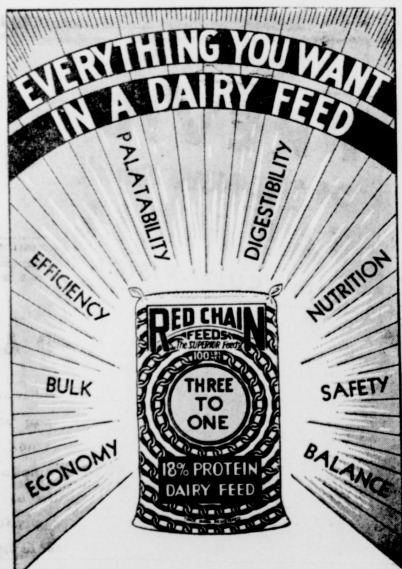
