



ANADARKO, Okla .- The American Indian Exposition here was rainsoaked 12 hours after the Jemez Apache Indians completed a rain dance under a clear sky.

Chief Juan Gachupin and his 14year-old daughter, Leonora, performed the rhythmic, stamping dance while two braves chanted and beat a tom-tom, before 10,000 delegates from 35 tribes and 6,000 palefaces.

Another performance was scheduled. The rain threatened to reduce attendance and slow down athletic

Two years ago, the Kiowa In-dians performed a "forbidden" pagan sun dance over the angry opposition of tribal leaders. It was followed by rains so heavy that they nearly washed out the expo-

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
