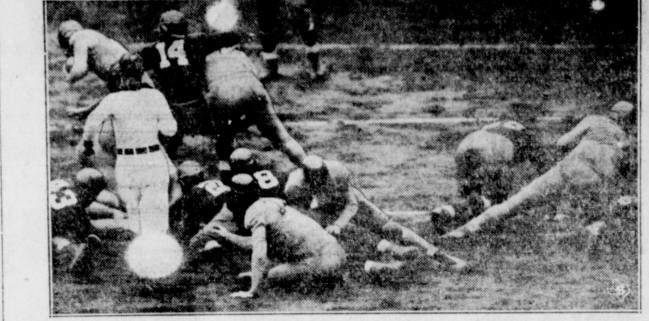

This motto might well be displayed in every home in the State, as many people indisposed jump at conclusions as to what is the matter with them, go to a drug store for a bottle of advertised medicine. For a time they feel exceedingly clever but later they may discover that instead of getting better, they have become sicker. Eventually the physician is bound to be called, in some instances too late.
 There is no desire on the part of the Texas State Department of Health to insinuate that all, or the majority who use patent medicine to cure their ills, will suffer greatly by so doing. The point is that there are a sufficient number of self doctors who pay a big penalty for their practice to place every one on guard against it.
 The body is the most wonderful piece of mechanism in existence. To tamper with it in any particular without due professional knowledge is running a great risk. When one's car is not working properly, you do not take it to any one but a mechanic who knows how to repair cars. It is remarkable that a person thinks less of the service his body needs in comparison to his car. If one is sufficiently ill to feel the need of treatment, it should be sought in its professional form. Avoid self doctoring.

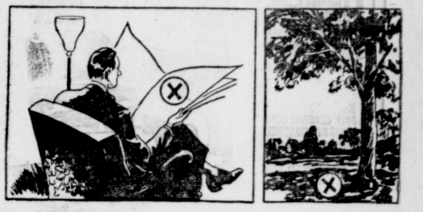

L. B. Mathews, 63, farmer residing near Draw, took his own life last Wednesday afternoon by shooting himself in the left temple with a .22 calibre single-shot rifle.

Mr. and Mrs. Mathews and two grandsons who live with them went to the field Wednesday morning to pick cotton. Shortly before noon Mr. Mathews, who was not feeling well, went to the house. Mrs. Mathews and the boys having taken their lunch to the house until about sunset. They found the body on the kitchen floor. A note on a nearby table was addressed to his wife instructing her in the method of handling their government cotton and other financial affairs. It was concluded with "goodbys."

County Judge W. E. Smith, County Attorney Truett Smith, and Deputy Sheriff F. E. Redwine went to the home for investigation. Judge Smith gave a verdict of suicide. Financial reverses were thought to be the cause. Mr. Mathews had apparently been dead about three hours when found.

Mr. Mathews was born in Alabama June 15, 1871. He is survived by his wife and two step-grandsons.
