Or, for example, the largest General Motors dealer in America, depends only incidentally on national advertising. His record of sales has been built largely through persistent, specific advertising in local newspapers.

TOUGHER VEHICLE INSPECTION SLATED FOR TEXAS MOTORISTS

The Texts Department of Public Safety reminded all motorists of the new motor vehicle inspection period and that laws relating to vehicle inspection have been changed.

Monday, August 28, will start the new period of inspection from all vehicles operated and registered in this state except trailers and semi-trailers whose gross weight and that of a load carried is 4,000 pounds or less.
