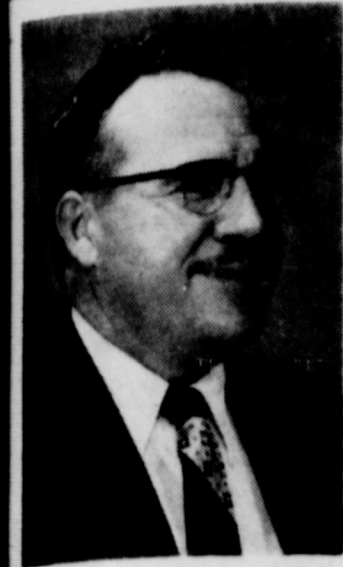


Revival To Be Held At Mexican Mission

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN — Sen. Preston Smith

The week opened here with much speculation on Gov. Daniel's possible veto of HB 727, a retail sales tax that is designed to raise from \$128 to \$150 million a year.

After passage by the Senate, the bill would go to the governor's office. If he did not return it to the Legislature within ten days it would become a law without his signature.

If the Governor returned the bill with a veto, it could be passed into law over his objection by a two thirds vote of each house.

If, however, the sales tax bill should be passed within the last 10 days of the session, Gov. Daniel could kill it with a veto proclamation filed with the Secretary of State within 20 days after adjournment of the Legislature.

The 129th day of the session falls on May 9th. The Legislature can stretch the session into a 20 day overtime period, sufficient time to accomplish what many thought was impossible in one session.

It was predicted by many capital pessimists that one or more special sessions would be necessary before Texas' financial problems were solved.

And, even though things look good now, there are still many doubts in the picture that do not assure the Legislature that it can possibly within this single session —

1. Retire the general fund deficit
2. Balance the books on the two year appropriations with sufficient new revenue.
3. Vote school teachers an annual salary increase.

But the session thus far has progressed rapidly and effectively.

Young Farmers Meet Here

Jack Link, of the Paymaster Seed Farms of Plainview spoke on hybrid sorghums at a meeting of O'Donnell chapter of Young Farmers last Thursday nite in high school ag. building. His topic was "Increase Profit From Grain Sorghum." He touched on the culture, planting, adaption to weather and aid from the grain breeder. After speaking on the possibility of overworking land, Mr Link said that the optimum time generally was June 10-15. The booting stage is very important and he stressed watering, when available, about 5 to 7 days before this stage or during the soft doe stage. He said that the longer it takes a hybrid to mature, the more yield the farmer can expect. He outlined different types of grain sorghums and pointed out good and bad characteristics of each.

The goal of the seed breeder is to help the farmer to plant sorghums with good standability and the type which will give the farmer the best results.

The next meeting will be June 8 and will be on labor. Billy Gardenhire and Shorty McLaurin are in charge of the program. One guest and 17 members attended.

HIGHWAY 87 TO START WORK SOON NORTH OF TAHOKA

Bids for construction of 13.7 miles of paving from a point two miles north of Tahoka to the Lubbock county line on U. S. Highway 87 have been called for by the Texas Highway Commission. This is a four lane divided highway like from Tahoka to Lamesa. Bids will be opened May 20th at Austin and construction will start soon thereafter. FULL FAITH AND CREDIT

Each of our fifty states governs its people by its "local laws." But people cross state borders every day to do business or find new homes.

People make contracts outside their own state, others seek divorces, and some leave to get married. Sometimes a non-resident claims the right to inherit property under

state's laws. It might surprise you, but Texas, like other states, has two systems of laws: "Local law" for the home people and "conflict of laws" to solve some legal problems of people who live or come from other states.

In Texas, for instance, the property a man and wife get (which is not a gift or inheritance) becomes community property. But in Massachusetts, what a husband gets is his separate property. In some law suits a Texas court may need to find out how much property the Massachusetts husband has. When it does the Texas court uses Massachusetts law to decide the point. The choice of law results when you use the rules found in the study of conflict of laws.

Take a practical case: Suppose two Texans crash their cars in New Mexico but sue each other in Texas. Which do they use: Texas or New

Mexico law? The Texas court will decide who is negligent under New Mexico law.

Now suppose a Texas court decides for one party who is then sued again for the same thing in a second state. Well, to make all states treat each other alike, our United States Constitution has the "full faith and credit clause". So the first judgement will bind the parties just as if the new court in the new action had made the old judgement itself.

SOME CANCERS CAN BE CURED

Malignant neoplasms—as cancer is listed in statistical studies—claimed 11,390 Texas lives during 1960 according to State Health Department provisional estimates.

This is a rise of only about 300 deaths over the final 1959 figures. However, the 1960 death rate—per 100,000 estimated population—was 118.4 compared to 117.7 for the previous year.

Only heart diseases caused more deaths in Texas last year. Deaths from cancer begin to take a significant toll after age 40, when the rates begin rising sharply over the earlier years.

The key to cancer cure or arrest lies in early detection, a fact which is repeated continuously to the public over every possible news and information outlet.

However, one leading national organization estimates that only one out of six women have physical examinations each year.

For women, early cancer detection is surprisingly simple, provided proper examination techniques are performed.

Self breast examination can be taught quickly and simply to any woman during a visit to her family doctor. There is an excellent film available from the State Health Department film library on the subject, suitable for showings to women's groups.

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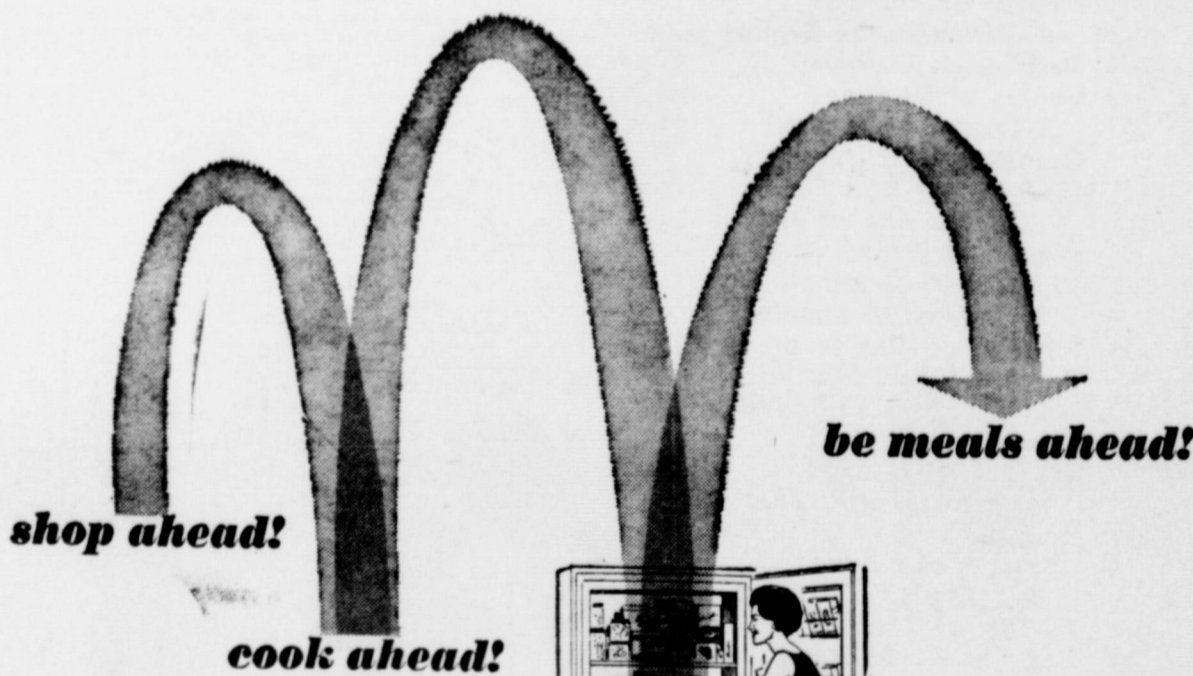

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

Sen. Preston Smith

Every new situation in an elect-

ion seems to give Texas politicians

new and drastic interpretation.

Take the special U. S. Senate el-

ection for instance.

The story of the Pool Bill is a

familiar one to all who are interest-

ed in Texas politics. It is referred

to again only because it is part of

the picture.

Until 1957 there was a wide open

field in the scramble for the elect-

ion to the U. S. Senate, with high

stakes — even by one vote, if that

should be the result — winning the

race.

The Pool Bill was finally passed

for the heat of the 1957 special

election, for the purpose of drawing

the line more clearly between Re-

publicans and Democrats. This was

recognized in providing for a run-

off. The theory, of course, was that

a strong Republican candidate a-

gainst a scramble of Democrats,

would have had the add-on chance

of topping the field. In a runoff the

Democrats could marshal their com-

bined strength.

Now, in the 1961 Special U. S.

Senate race, some Texans are saying

there are no binding party lines

and candidates did not run on a

party platform; that it was an in-

dividual affair; and that no party

loyalty is involved.

This can not be argued when you

consider that the Pool Bill final

passage by the Legislature was for no

other reason than to cut the issue

squarely on a Democrat - Republi-

can issue. And that is what the run-

off is between Democrat William A.

Blakely and Republican John Tow-

er.

It doesn't seem probable that

the Democrat Legislature would be
tempted to come around eventually
to a further change in the election
laws to provide for a Republican vs.
Democrat ticket in the special Sen-
ate or congressman - at - large elec-
tions. This would give the Republi-
can candidate an automatic entry in
the runoff whereas under the pres-
ent law the Democrats could assure
a party victory in the first election

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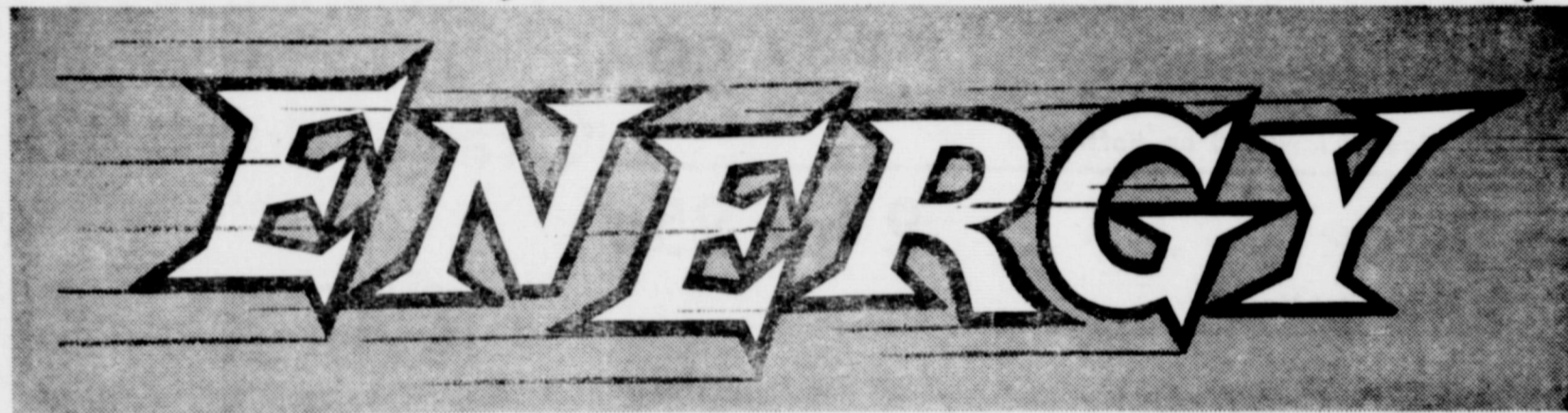
