THE WOMAN WHO WORKS

In this new order of things, with
women, both married and single,
broadening their business activities, a
very serious problem arises. It is the
problem of what, when, and where to eat.

Breakfast is always a hurry-up meal
for the men but much more so for the
woman who goes to business. Lunch-
eons, of course, are taken in the
lunchrooms and restaurants in the
business districts and are no problem.
But how about dinners? Shall they,
too, be restaurant meals or can they be
so planned that business women may
enjoy the home cooking of which they
are so fond? Take away the element
of haste and anxiety and in its place
put carefully thought-out menus, well
planned and easily prepared, and home
dinners will again regain their high
favor with the working housewife.

One of the big worries is frequently
with the milk. Did it come? Is it
fresh? Is it frozen? Has the milk-
man been paid? Are the bottles
washed and set out? However, there
is no cause for worry about milk. Why
not keep a dozen cans of evaporated
milk in your pantry? There are large
cans, equal to a quart of milk and
smaller cans that will meet the lesser
needs.

For evaporated milk is just pure
fresh milk with more than half the
water missing. This water can be re-
placed in a jiffy, if you so desire or
you can use it as cream if rich and
creamy foods are desired.

Here are a few recipes that may be
used by "The Woman Who Works"
for forming her plans for self help
and good home cooking.

Scalloped Ham and Potatoes.
1 pound smoked ham
1 green pepper
6 medium potatoes (may be
omitted)
1 1/2 cups evapo- rated milk
Flour
diluted with

Cover the bottom of an oiled baking
dish with sliced, raw potatoes. Sprinkle
with flour and pieces of ham 1/4 inch
square. Repeat until dish is full. Fill
dish 1/2 full of diluted milk. Bake un-
til potatoes are tender.

Eggs en Casserole.
6 hard-boiled eggs
1/2 cup evaporated milk
2 tomatoes
1/2 cup water
2 tbsp. butter
1/2 cup grated cheese
2 tsp. flour
Buttered crumbs
2 tsp. salt

Cut hard-boiled eggs in half and ar-
range around the edge of a greased
casserole. Slice tomatoes in center of
dish. Make a white sauce of the milk,
water, fat and flour. Add cheese and
stir over a low fire until cheese is well
mixed and smooth. Pour over toma-
toes and eggs. Cover with crum-
bles and bake twenty minutes in a mode-
rate oven.

THE PENCIL MAKES A FARM PAY BETTER

Farm Accounting Reveals Losing Methods and Points Way to Bigger Profits.

(From Banker-Farmer)

A farm cannot properly be called successful unless it pays a fair rate of interest on the investment and returns fair wages for the farmer's labor. Agriculture is considered by all odds the most important industry in the world, and yet in no other industry is the business end so neglected.

It is common to find a farmer with an investment of fifteen to twenty thousand dollars, yet does he keep books? Perhaps he may jot down a note now and then of an important deal, but this is of no value in an analysis of his business as a whole. No other industry, however small, is carried on without books of some sort.

Farming is a business and to be successful must be conducted in a businesslike way. The business man's mind should have indelibly printed upon it two questions: What profit is my business making? How can that profit be increased? To know the latter, one must find out the former; and to find out about profits requires the keeping of books.

It is not necessary for a farmer to have a course in bookkeeping. Almost every agricultural college in the country has issued a simplified farm accounting book which it sells at cost, and only a few minutes are required each day to jot down the day's happenings.

Accounts Increase Profits

Instances number a thousandfold where farmers have profited by knowing their business. Accounts kept by nineteen farmers in Illinois led them to improve the organization and operation of their farms in ways that added approximately \$650 to their average net income in 1922, the seventh year they had kept accounts.

An Iowa farmer found at the end of the first year he kept books that crops fed to livestock brought more money than when sold outright. His figures showed that his cows were poor; compared with other farms in the state, he found the number of acres cultivated per man on his farm, as well as the number of acres per horse, were below average. He rented more land and replanned his fields, so that the crop areas per man and horse were increased. He sold some of his scrubs and bought good cows. The second year his income from the farm, after paying all expenses and interest on the money invested, had been increased over \$350.

Costs Can Be Regulated

"I have discovered," says one farm bookkeeper, "that the kind of man you have on a job, as well as the particular team, often makes quite a variation in the cost of performing certain tasks. I have learned from the pages of my book that if I could have increased the yield of my wheat field by two bushels and my corn by five bushels I would have realized a substantial profit from them."

While the farmers may not be able to fix prices on their products, they do have a voice in determining the costs of production. To reduce this cost they must first know what the costs are.

The number of farmers who are keeping books on their business has increased remarkably in recent years, but the number of businesslike farmers is woefully small when listed alongside the sum total of the farmers in the country.

Inventory Is Indispensable

The basis of any system of farm accounting is the annual property list or inventory. It is the starting point of the farm records. One must take into consideration decreases or increases in the value of all property owned to gauge the progress of the business. Lacking facts as to the value of his property, no business man can form an accurate estimate of how he stands financially. Increased cash may be due to property which was sold, or increased debts may be due to improvements made. If a farmer is falling behind, the inventory will emphasize this fact. Often when a man is discouraged and thinks he is making no progress, his inventories will tell him that he is better off than he thought.

At the end of each year a financial statement is drawn off. This is the farmer's rating and no farmer with a good financial statement need fear walking into a bank and asking for a loan.

BANKERS HELP

A bank in Monrovia, Ind., tests seed corn for farmers. A basement room was fitted out last season for the purpose and 25,000 ears were tested for fifty-six farmers. One-fourth of the seed tested last year was unfit for seed. This year the percentage will run even higher. The work is done under the supervision of the high school agricultural teacher. He reports that the community will have a surplus of seed corn this year.

The banks of Conway, Ark., have offered prizes for the most marketable sweet potatoes produced on one acre of land. A first prize of \$150 is offered, along with three district prizes of \$50 each. The county agent and the banks are working out the details. The County Bankers Association will help to employ a full time county leader this year for boys' and girls' club work in Calhoun, Cherokee and Buena Vista counties, Iowa.

FEEDING BABY DURING SUMMER

Milk is recognized as the ideal food for young children. It should be carefully guarded during the warm summer months, to insure its freedom from germs or bacteria that might cause harm to the child. Because of its nature, it is, under certain conditions, a breeding and propagating ground for germ life and may soon become unfit for use unless it is handled with the utmost care and vigilance. Perhaps the ideal way to obviate this risk is through the use of evaporated milk. This milk is only pure milk with sixty per cent of the water removed from it and is absolutely sterile. It is of double richness but may be modified by the addition of water, which will return it to its original volume with a greatly enhanced food value.

Evaporated milk is sterilized and has a high nutritive content. This causes it to be a very excellent food for the young child and the infant. In fact, many of the leading pediatricians of the country advocate its use after the child is deprived of its mother's milk. A formula, evolved by these pediatricians, through experimentation, is as follows:

From Sixth Week to Third Month.

Milk, evaporated 6 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Boiled water 26 ounces

Seven feedings in twenty-four hours; 4 to 5 ounces at three-hour intervals during the day and four-hour intervals at night.

From Third Month to Fifth Month.

Milk, evaporated 7½ ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Boiled water 29½ ounces

Six feedings in twenty-four hours; 5 to 6 ounces at three-hour intervals during the day and a feeding at 14 p. m.

From Fifth to Seventh Month.

Milk, evaporated 10 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Boiled water 29 ounces

Five feedings in twenty-four hours; 6 to 7 ounces at four-hour intervals, the last feeding to be given at 10 p. m.

From Seventh to Ninth Month.

Milk, evaporated 11 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Boiled water 25 ounces

4 to 5 ounces at four-hour intervals during the day. Last feeding at tea at night.

From Ninth to Twelfth Month.

Milk, evaporated 12 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Barley water 34 ounces

3 to 5 ounces at four-hour intervals during day. Last feeding at tea at night.

Caring for Books

Books kept in glass-fronted bookcases are subject to attacks from bookworms, moths, etc., in greater degree than if on open shelves. To preserve your books from these pests sprinkle the shelves occasionally, say once every six months, with half an ounce of camphor, half an ounce of powdered bitter apple (well mixed together). Do not keep books in a very warm room. Gas light affects them very much. Russia leather bindings in particular.

'Messers' and 'Moppers'

The world is divided into the people who make the messes and the people who mop them up. Ninety per cent make the messes and 10 per cent are served out with mops. I was reading a novel called "Keddy" the other day. I'm told it's the best picture of modern Oxford that has ever been done. And from cover to cover there isn't a single mention of such things as lectures, reading, examinations, tutors, or anything of that sort. It's really masterly the way everything trivial like that has been eliminated.—From "Blackwarston," by Mrs. Hicks Beach.

Orphan's Pathetic Dreams

That the dreams of orphans in institutions center about their one common experience, the loss of parents and home, is the result of an investigation by Dr. Kate Gordon of the University of Southern California. Of 105 children questioned, 80 admitted dreaming and the dreams of fully half of these may be expressed in the typical statements "about mother" or "father came to get me." The dreams of another 16 per cent suggest fear of various sorts, as of tonsil operations. These fears may be regarded as "negative wishes." About eight children, or 9 per cent, dreamed of toys, candy, money, etc., while a lesser number dreamed of religion.

Doctor Gordon's research seems to support the psychoanalytic view that dreams are one way people live out wishes which are unfulfilled in reality. And from a practical standpoint it indicates that institutional life does not appeal to the child as a substitute for the intimate care of parents.
