FIRST LINE OF DEFENSE

Austin — Your general state of health can be a first line of defense against illness, particularly now that the season of infectious diseases is here. Resistance to complications of colds, flu and other illnesses is influenced by how you eat, sleep, exercise and relax before you get sick.

Food means different things to different people but the net effect is the same — food not only supplies energy to the human machine but also provides materials to renew body tissue. Good nutrition is largely a matter of getting enough of the right foods. And since this is true, it is a good idea to take a look at your eating habits. Your regular diet should be built around:

A daily serving of meat or fish, about four eggs a week, some cheese, at least two glasses of milk daily, two daily servings of raw or slightly cooked green or yellow vegetables, two servings of fruit, and some potatoes, bread, or other grain products. Desserts, candy, and beverages such as soft drinks and coffee are not essentials but they are sometimes pleasant additions.

Other items in your diet can be extensive or as limited as you wish provided you watch for the "spoon in mouth diseases" leading to overweight.

Over Inch Of Rain

A thunder storm Saturday nite netted 1.12 inches of rain here Saturday nite according to Ben Moore, Jr., local weather recorder. The rain slowed the harvest but by mid-day Monday the hands were back in the fields. Damp drizzly weather last week also limited pulling to about three days. Week end business was excellent with the grocery firms being especially crowded.

As of Tuesday morning 5,478 bales had been ginned here to make the harvest about 15 percent complete. With open weather this week the crop should be 30 percent over by Saturday. Cotton production as well as grain production is running well ahead of earlier estimates.

Urge Care Of Streets

In order to protect the newly paved streets, it has become necessary to refer back to an ordinance wherein \$25 fee will be charged for cutting into the pavement. WESTERN RANCH DINNER

- 1 cut-up frying chicken (about 3 lbs.)
- 1 1/2 cups Pot Evaporated Milk
- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 teaspoons paprika
- 1/2 cup shortening
- No. 2 1/2 can cling peach halves
- 1 can oven ready biscuits
- 1 cup water

Turn on oven and set at 425 (very hot). Dip chicken in milk, then roll in mixture of 1 cup flour, the salt and paprika. Melt shortening in 1 1/2 x 9 x 2-in. pan. Put chicken into pan, skin side down. Bake 50 min. chicken and move to one end of pan. Arrange peaches. Separate biscuits and put into other end of pan. 15 min. longer, or until biscuits are light brown and hot plates.

Gravy: Mix 1/4 cup flour into drippings left in pan. Add water gradually. Boil and stir 2 min. Stir in 1 cup milk, but do not boil. Add salt and pepper to taste. Serves 4.
