Baird Pioneer Mrs. Wristen Dies

Mrs. Emma Wristen, one of Baird's oldest pioneer citizens, died at Callahan County Hospital at 9:30 p. m. Thursday, Dec. 21, after a lengthy illness.

Mrs. Wristen was born Emma Betcher in Germany on March 15, 1871. She came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. August Betcher to the United States as an infant. They lived in New York City a number of years before settling in South Bend, Ind. From Indiana they came to Texas in 1878, when Mrs. Wristen was seven years of age, along with other pioneer families who established Colony Hill, a German colony near Abilene. They later lived in Callahan County, where Dudley is now.

Mrs. Wristen was married to the late E. M. Wristen pioneer merchant of Baird, in 1889, at the home of her parents at Eagle Cove, now known as Dudley.

They lived in Abilene several years, then moved to Baird in 1892 where Mr. Wristen operated a grocery store for his father. He later bought the business and they lived continuously in Baird from that time.

Mrs. Wristen died in 1951. Mrs. Wristen was a longtime member of the First Methodist Church here and was awarded a certificate as a Life Member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Funeral services were held at Godfrey Funeral Home with the Rev. Albert Cooper, pastor of First Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in Ross Cemetery at Baird by the side of her husband.

Mrs. Wristen is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Ross Williams of Houston, Mrs. C. N. Brown of Big Sandy and Mrs. John Owens of Abilene; two sons, Fred and Harold Wristen of Baird; one sister, Mrs. Olvena Cutbirth of Seagraves; two brothers Otto Betcher of Jal, N. M., and Henry Betcher of Dudley; seven grandchildren; 24 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

Harlem Stars To Appear In Baird

MOST POSTAL RATES TO TAKE INCREASE JANUARY 7, 1968

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect January 7. Postmaster John Towler reminded postal customers today.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," the Postmaster declared. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 states to any American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world, and to Canada and Mexico."

The Postmaster pointed out that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspaper and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars. "Occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category. These heavier pieces of first-class and air mail subject to the single rate schedule will be delivered by the fastest available means of transportation.

A flat rate of 80 cents will be charged for all mail in this category up to one pound. For all mail weighing more than one pound, the present air parcel post rates will continue to apply, except that the postage on matter weighing between one and five pounds will change at

half-pound intervals rather than one pound intervals.

Postmaster Towler said that the new rate structure will mean a reduction of postage on some parcels.

Another rate change that will effect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate.

He emphasized that the new rate on unsealed greeting cards will not go into effect until January 7 and until then they can be mailed at the old rate of four cents.

The Postmaster also noted that effective January 7 special handling will be available on third class parcels weighing between eight and sixteen ounces. Special handling has not been available on these parcels since 1958, when packages weighing between 8 and 16 ounces were transferred from fourth to third class mail.

There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail cash on delivery or insurance, Postmaster Towler said.

"We have an ample supply of one-cent stamps on hand for those people who have five-cent stamps and need one-cent stamps to make up the postage required under the new rates."

Higher rates will go into effect Jan. 7 for all categories of second class mail, bulk-rate third class mail, controlled circulation mail, and the educational materials category of fourth class mail. Mailers using these classes who need information on the new rates should contact the local Post Office.
