

Washington, D. C. WASHINGTON .- Whether we are going to have two worlds or one,

one of the battle grounds on which the issue will be decided is Germany. Lines for that battle are forming now between one of the most powerful forces for democschool, and one of the most antidemocratic forces old Germany, the Prussian edu-Baukhage cational system.


When congress meets it must consider the report of the mission of educators who were sent to the American zone by the state and war departments to study education in Germany. They came back with a careful and detailed study, including a description of conditions and a set of recommendations which, if they can be carried out, will have a vital effect in building democracy in Germany.

Perhaps an educational system based on the American model may not be sufficient to democratize Germany but I think it is no exaggeration to state that without such system, democracy never will be achieved in the Reich.

I had the privilege of attending a conference presided over by William Benton, assistant secretary of state in charge of public affairs, at which Chairman Zook and members of the educational mission were present. I came away deeply impressed, not only with the factual data presented-(I was familiar with some of the data)-but also with the importance of the program as a means of determining whether democracy or totalitarianism will dominate western Europe and perhaps the world.

System Mixture of Master, Servant

We know how Germany's history, her political and social institutions, have all tended to create a peculiar type of thinking which has resulted in a caste system with a strange mixture of super-ordination and sub-ordination on the part of the individual German. The superficial and erroneous explanation is that the German is half dominating and half servile. There isn't space here to go into German psychology but there was one point in the educational mission's report which was emphasized by their chairman and echoed by Assistant Secretary of State Benton, which partially explains this phenomenon. It reveals perhaps the greatest single factor that can block democratic evolution in Germany. This factor, the mis-sion says, "has cultivated attitudes of superiority in one small group The Washington Ticker: The big and of inferiority in the majority of the members of German society, making possible the submission and lack of self determination upon which authoritarian leadership has

School Plant Hit Hard by War

This is only one facet of the problem with which the educators who must guide German education will have to deal. There are a great many physical difficulties, too. In the first place, there is a dearth of buildings, of teachers, of equipment.

Many of the school buildings are rubble. Many have been requisitioned for various uses by the military government. In the winter there is the question of heat-this winter probably will be one of the worst-and this is one of the most difficult problems to overcome because of the shortage of coal in the American zone.

As to teachers, more than onehalf of the Germans were dismissed because of their participation in the Nazi setup.

There are few books. There is a paper shortage because there is no machinery to make paper. There is no machinery because there is no steel. There is no steel because there is no coal. And so the vicious circle continues, affecting the whole question of supply and equipment.

There are, on the other hand, some things on the credit side. I can testify to this from my own conversations with a number of the young people, as well as the older ones, who had had at least a glimmering of the world before Goeb-

Molly the Loot **Sleuth Likes Her** Work in Germany Tracks Down Works of Art And Other Valuables Stolen by Nazis.

BERLIN. - It is doubtful whether any person in the American occupational forces in Germany enjoys her work more than does Capt. Molly J. Regan, formerly of Boston and now a loot sleuth.

That's a clipped version of her formal title - art intelligence research officer in the restitution branch of the monuments, fine arts and archives section of the economics division of the office of military government for Germany (U. S.). Her job is to help track down works of art and other valuables looted by the Nazis from countries they formerly occupied, and classify them for restitution to their rightful owners

Recovers Millions.

The department in which Captain Regan works has recovered millions of dollars worth of stolen art in its search through the nooks and crannies of occupied Germany and beyond.

Recoveries and restitutions in a year have included more than a million books and nearly 50,000 works of art, some of them priceless masterpieces. France alone has received 40,000

cultural pieces.

Some of these recoveries have been made in museum basements, some behind false walls in houses, in barns and in sealed salt mines. Captain Regan's part in this vast hunt is not a traveling job. She sits in a small office in military government headquarters here, surrounded by packing boxes and an occasional minor masterpiece.

Not All Big Looters.

One of her field workers shares the cramped quarters with her as she keeps an organized network of

activity going over the continent. Captain Regan advises her department chief of particulars of missing objects and classifies clues as to their whereabouts.

She works with the army's G-2, the counter-intelligence corps, and maintains liaison with representatives of other occupying powers, with United Nations military missions here and with art intelligence in occupied Austria.

The culprits on whom she helps get the lowdown are not all big Nazi looters. She also helps prepare cases against accused members of the American forces.

Bogus Gurrency Ring Is Smashed

Secret Service Agent Given Main Credit for Big Job.

NEW YORK .- A secret service agent, who posed as a West coast racketeer and dope peddler, was credited by the treasury department with smashing a currency counterfeiting ring and "recovering the largest haul of bogus money in 10 years.

The agent, Victor Carli of the Los Angeles bureau, was assigned to the case after the counterfeiters had passed a \$20 bill at a bank.

Working closely with the ring to establish confidence, Carli offered to buy \$110,000 of the \$20 bills at \$7 a \$100. As the deal was consummated in a hotel lobby, other agents closed in and arrested Joseph Soro-ka, 33, alias "Mousey," and Joseph Giarruso, 39, of 13 Foster street, Bergenfield, N.

Two others, Joseph Paternoster, 44, of 95 State street, Newark, N. J., and George A. Larkin, 41, of 20 Court street, Newark, were arrested later in Newark, where Paternoster allegedly printed the bills on presses purchased recently from Larkin.

Arrangements were made for the secret service agent to pick up the bills at Soroka's home and they were brought there from Newark in a carton by Giarruso, according to U. E. Baughman, acting supervisor of the New York secret service of-

fice. Carli protested that the \$7,700 purchase price was "a little too dangerous" to carry around, and persuaded the pair to accompany him to the hotel for the payoff.

At a print shop in Newark, agents found a negative for the back of a \$20 bill and a strip of nine counterfeit ration coupons. The recovered bills are believed to represent practically the entire output of the plant, although one \$20 bill was taken by a taxi driver in addition to the bill passed at the bank.

Soroka and Giarruso were held in \$10,000 bail each by United States Commissioner Garrett W. Cotter on charges of printing and passing bogus bills. Larkin and Paternos, ter were to be arraigned later.

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
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
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

Orders Decrease in Air Forces' Civilian Staff

WASHINGTON .- Army air forces ordered a 20 per cent reduction in the number of its civilian employees. General Spaatz, air forces commander, said the number of employees would be reduced from 163,-000 to 131,000 between October 1 and January 1. He said the reduction will be "across the board" with high

and low salaried employees treated equally in proportion to numbers. War department said reductions by other army branches had been agreed to and would be worked out

in detail Reductions will be made in accordance with President Truman's directive that the army and navy must absorb the cost of 14 per cent salary increases voted by congress to government civilian employees, and also costs of pay increases ranging from 10 to 50 per cent voted military personnel.

Woman Wades In and

Goes Over Niagara Falls

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y .- A woman tentatively identified by state park police as Julia Fink, 56, of Buffalo, N. Y., was carried to her death over the 165-foot American falls.

Sgt. Charles Poole said witnesses reported the woman waded into the rapids about 500 yards above the cataract. Her body was recovered a few minutes later at the Canadian Maid of the Mist landing across the gorge from the falls.

A coat and a purse containing an automobile driver's license made out to Julia Fink, and a wrist watch were found on the Niagara river bank, said Poole.

BERLIN. - Carlo Mariotti, delegate of the International Red Cross in Berlin, said an appeal of German mothers for help in locating teen-age boys reported to have vanished without trace in the Russianoccupied province of Brandenburg since last summer would be referred to his superiors in Geneva.

A delegation of three German men handed Mariotti recently two lists carrying the names of 280 boys, mostly 17 and 18 years old.

The majority of them were reported to have disappeared in July and August, 1945.

Earlier, a Red Cross spokesman disclosed that a delegation of German mothers had appealed for aid in finding thousands of children they said had disappeared from the Russian-occupied province.

The parents maintain, according to the British-licensed newspaper Telegraf and the American-licensed Tagesspiegel, that the children have been taken to Russian camps where they are being schooled in a "new weltanschauung" (philosophy of life).

LIVINGSTON MANOR, N. Y. -Residents of this village heard a funny sounding crash and shouts for help from somewhere up in the

A tiny airplane was tangled in the branches of a giant tree, its three unhurt occupants dangling anxiously some 60 or 70 feet above the ground.

Villagers with ropes climbed the tree and rescued the three, James A. Howlett of Niagara Falls, N. Y., 44; his wife, June, 30, and their daughter, Judith, 4.

Howlett said they struck the tree during a take-off.

\$289,625 is Recovered

For Vets in Job Cases

WASHINGTON. - Veterans have recovered \$289,625 from their prewar employers in settlement of reemployment cases, department of justice said.

The recoveries were made by U. S. attorneys in 230 cases between July 1, 1944, and August 26, 1946, Assistant Attorney Gen. John F. Sonnett said. In many instances the cash recoveries were arranged

without resort to the courts. Sonnett stressed that "in most cases, the veterans have been taken back by their prewar employers without question."





Sometimes brickwork must stop because the bureau controlling glass has not approved and returned the forms for buying windows.

The London press announced while I was there that building contractors were being granted extra gasoline rations because of the additional travel required to get their numerous forms filled out and circulated to wholesalers and retailers, which they found necessary to do in order to complete a building.

All rationing seems to move slowly. For instance, I had to obtain food points to give the hotel for the week I was in London. Upon the advice of the hotel manager that I should report at the rationing office when the doors opened at nine o'clock, I arrived at 8:45 and found a long queue already waiting. Eventually I found myself in a special room for foreign visitors, with only a few of the waiting applicants, and had to wait only about an hour. The speed of the ration clerks reminded me of some of our own paid clerks during the war: it was evident they were not paid by the number of customers they served and that they had no fear of competition.







The church at Philippi though poor and persecuted was loyal and warmhearted. They sent a generous gift to Paul, who was in prison in Rome. He wrote to thank them. and his letter became a real hymn of joy and assurance. It discusses Christian experience, its principle, pattern, purpose and power. Chapter 2 presents the mind of Christ as the pattern of true Chris-

tian living. Nothing is to be done for vain glory (v. 3), but in the spirit of Christ, who willingly gave up his glory with the Father that he might become our Saviour. It has well been said that if he had not done so, we should have been amazed at his glory, but we should never have been saved.

He who might have "grasped" (v. 6, R. V.) his equality with God, laid it aside that as a man he might die for the salvation of lost mankind 8). (v.

Little wonder that God has given him such a high and exalted position (vv. 9-11). One day every tongue shall confess that he is Lord. Hasten the day!

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

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



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PAUL FOUNDS THE CHURCH AT PHILIPPI

LESSON TEXT - Acts 16:11-15; Philipplans 2:5-11. MEMORY SELECTION - I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me.—Philippians 4:13.

Missionary zeal keeps a Christian in action for God. After a time at the church in Antioch, the urge to preach the gospel sent Paul out on his second missionary journey. This time his partner was Silas, because he and Barnabas had separated over taking Mark along, since he had turned back in the midst of the first missionary journey. Timothy took his place (Acts 16:1-5).

Our lesson is of unusual import because it tells us how the gospel first came to Europe, from whence it later came to America. Paul's efforts to continue his ministry in Asia were hindered by the Holy Spirit (Acts 16:6, 7). It was then that he was given a heaven-sent vision of a man in Macedonia crying for help. At once the party set out to obey the leading of the Holy Spirit (Acts 16:9, 10).

I. Paul's Ministry to the Philippians (Acts 16:11-15).

Philippi was an important city, a Roman colony and outpost. Apparently the Jews who had come there to live had not felt any strong desire for religious fellowship, for they had built no synagogue. Certain godly women met on the Sabbath by the riverside for prayer. Here was Paul's opportunity and he took it.

The story of the conversion of Lydia has many elements of special interest. It presents the turning point in the progress of the gospel, which by the grace and leading of God brought it northward to Europe rather than southward into Africa or eastward through Asia. Many of us have heard because of the way Paul was led, and one wonders if Europe and America. might not otherwise have been the "dark continents" rather than Africa and India. We are what we are by the grace of God. He sent us the gospel through Paul that day at Philippi.

Then we note that the first convert was a woman. She was not the last woman to give an attentive ear and a believing heart to the gospel message. The church through all its history has been blessed by the readiness of women to bear and heed the gospel.

The Lord sent his prepared messenger to the place where there was a prepared heart waiting to receive the Word. We may confidently go on the errands of our God, knowing that when he leads he goes before and prepares the way. That does not mean that there will be no trials and difficulties. Paul had plenty of them (see II Cor. 11:23-33). But it does mean that we may go with the assurance of blessed results, in his name, and with the grace to bear whatever comes along the way for his glory. 

II. Paul's Message to the Philippians (Phil. 2:5-11).

Although after Lydia's conversion Paul met opposition and suffered imprisonment (Acts 16:16-40), that was only the beginning of a blessed ministry there.

The church at Philippi though poor and persecuted was loyal and warmhearted. They sent a generous gift to Paul, who was in prison in Rome. He wrote to thank them, and his letter became a real hymn of joy and assurance. It discusses Christian experience, its principle, pattern, purpose and power.

Chapter 2 presents the mind of Christ as the pattern of true Christian living. Nothing is to be done for vain glory (v. 3), but in the spirit of Christ, who willingly gave up his glory with the Father that he might become our Saviour. It has well been said that if he had not done so, we should have been amazed at his glory, but we should

never have been saved. He who might have "grasped" (v. 6, R. V.) his equality with God, laid it aside that as a man he might die for the salvation of lost mankind (v. 8).

Little wonder that God has given him such a high and exalted posi-tion (vv. 9-11). One day every tongue shall confess that he is Lord. Hasten the day!
