\$75,000 Fire Monday Hits McBride Elevator

\$125,000 Of Grain Is Partial Loss

To Rebuild

A spectacular, raging fire early Monday morning severely damaged the huge O. C. McBride and Sons grain elevator in the north part of town. Damage to the elevator alone

The alarm was given by an unidentified Latin worker driving past who relayed the fact to Shack Blocker, local groceryman, who who turned in the alarm at about 6 a. m. When the fire was noticed the blaze was reaching skyward from the housing of the motorlift in the tower of the building. Shortly after arrival of the O'Donnell Fire De-partment, the flames ate eastward toward the main storage bins resulting in the eventual loss of the upper one third or so of the elevat-or. The Tahoka Fire Department an swered a call for help.

The initial tower and a part of the elevator was built in 1944 unde the firm name McBride and Swoce later being O. C. McBride and Sons. In 1949 the structure was added to, and only recently a new grain ware house, undamaged in the fire. was built.

Where public facilities are not available, or not accessible owners are required to dispose of sewerage by private methods Mr. V.. M. Ehlers, Chief of the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering suggests that those thinking of buy ing a lot contact their local health department to make certain sewerage and water can be provided on particular lot. This would avoid a great many difficulties on part of the buyer who fails to consider the matter until the lot has been prchased or the home built.
