Veterans News
 Four important tips to 200,000 veterans who have approximately 2 billion of the new Korea GI insurance were released today by the Veterans Administration.

First, VA said, don't send cash through the mail when paying premiums. Use a check or money order payable to Veterans Administration. Your canceled check or money order stub will serve as a receipt for your records. If you send cash it may be lost or stolen and you thus will run the risk of losing your policy.

Second, get into the habit of paying premiums when they are due. Although the law allows a "grace period" of 31 days during which the policy remains in effect even if a premium due is not paid, you should consider this provision an emergency privilege and should use it only for emergencies.

Third, be sure you have named the beneficiary or beneficiaries to whom you want your policy paid in event of death and in what manner. This information should be recorded with VA.

Fourth, if you are paying premiums monthly, you should take the advantage of paying your premiums quarterly, semi-annually or annually.

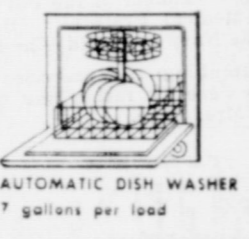
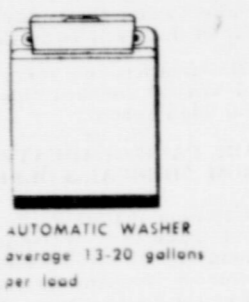
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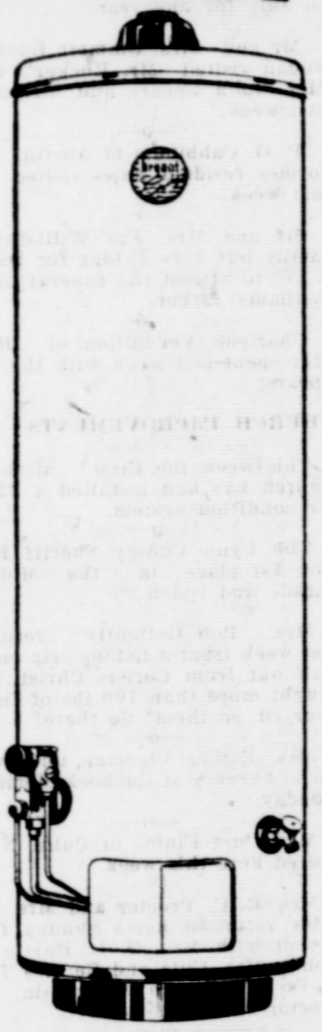

AMISH CAPITAL This Town Has More Buggies Than Autos

ARTHUR, Ill.—On the streets you'll find more horses and buggies than automobiles. The hitch-rack is used every day in the week except Sunday.

For this is the home of one of the larger sects of Amish people in the country. Approximately 1,500 Amish live on the farms nearby. They are prosperous, friendly. They've never gotten in trouble, and mind their own business.

But strangers stare at them because the men are whiskered, wear homemade clothing and flat black hats. The women dress just as severely, and keep their heads covered. They dislike the automobile, and use the horse exclusively.

Hitch Rack Rules

Arthur has entire streets where the hitch-rack reigns. Signs are posted, prohibiting autos to park in these areas. The highways near Arthur are filled with the black-topped buggies of the Amish farmers.

Strangely the Amish have preserved many Old World traits, and yet form a harmonious segment in the area surrounding them. For although Arthur is known as "Capital of Amishland," there has never been any friction between these people and their non-Amish neighbors. They are extreme pacifists.

Make Own Clothes

Mention of the word Amish generally brings to mind a vague mental picture of queer, Quaker-looking people who ride in horse-drawn vehicles and wear plain clothes of their own making.

For nearly a century the Amish lived happily in Pennsylvania, then land shortage drove some of them farther west. Following the Civil war new settlements were made in Canada, Ohio, Indiana, Iowa and Illinois. Since then, many of the sects have modernized and accepted present-day living standards.

But the Amish in the Arthur community are strictly "old order." Although Lancaster county in Pennsylvania still is considered the mother community of the Amish sect, the followers at Arthur are perhaps the purest Amish in existence, and stubbornly resist the inroads of modernization.

Only adults are permitted to join the Amish church, for they believe that each person should be convinced in his own mind that he desires to accept the principles of faith, such a decision not being considered childish.

Builds Own Home; Beats Housing Shortage

BERLIN, N.H.—One way to beat the housing shortage—if you have the time and talent, backbone and brawn—is to go out in the woods and start building your own house with your own hands.

That's what Bob Hughes, Berlin artist and high school art instructor, decided to do about two years ago, and if all goes well, he hopes to move in with his wife and two children before long.

The 38-year-old jack-of-all-trades has been building the new house almost single-handed during summers, weekends, and any spare time he can find.

The front door will have 15 panels of thick pine, recessed and carved by the gifted young artist-teacher-marionette maker into the 12 signs of the zodiac, with three panels for another design. The front hall will be paneled in pine, some a foot and a half wide. The stairs are huge solid oak blocks.

Bob Hughes is his own architect, designing the house himself and working from his own set of blue-prints. It is a combination of modern and traditional. The living room has a large picture window, composed of twelve panes which saves the expense of a single sheet of plate glass, and has the advantage of individuality.

The kitchen will be done in white ash, and has a laundry shoot down into the basement.

Looking tanned and rugged, with a crew cut, dungarees and G.I. shoes, Bob didn't think he was doing anything particularly remarkable in building his own house. Although he was aboard the first landing craft to hit the coast of Normandy on D-Day, he knows he is not the first amateur to build a home for his family in this area. And he pointed out that he didn't dig the cellar-hole and has no intention of installing the furnace and plumbing.

Small Town Anything But Slow and Quiet

FARMINGDALE, N. Y. — Some people can't reconcile the idea of a small town with the idea of speed. But when they visit Farmingdale, their conception of a small town is likely to be blasted from their heads by the roar of man's latest symbol of speed—the jet airplane. This is the home of the Thunderjet.

And as the community must keep pace with the speed of progress that is being made in jet plane performance.

Less than 10 years ago the first American-built jet got off the ground, and a 15-minute jet flight was quite a performance. But now Thunderjets are racking up records of more than a thousand combat hours in Korea, they are spanning the Atlantic and Pacific and making double coast-to-coast flights non-stop, carrying heavy loads.

Today's single-engine, single-seat Thunderjet can fly faster and farther than many of the multi-engine, multi-manned light bombers of World War II, and they pack as heavy a wallop.

That is the symbol of speed this small town, often confused as small towns are in public thinking with places of drowsy tranquility, must live up to.

Artists Found Home In Mountain Town

LITTLETON, N. H. — Tucked away on a back country road in this White Mountains community, a group of artists have "found a home" for summer activity in New Hampshire and have named it Rock Pool. They have converted and rebuilt old farm buildings into studios and an art shop. During the season skilled instructors demonstrate the arts of ceramics, sculpturing, painting, wood-cutting, and silver-smithing. The visitor to Rock Pool can watch the entire process of creation. For instance, in ceramics the clay is mixed, shaped, baked in the kiln, glazed and decorated in an individual studio with the most modern and complete equipment.

Each artist also holds classes in his own medium and students can take the art of jewelry making, or take a sketching class with a professional model, or "throw" a vase on the electric wheel.

A new idea in the art world, each of these artists is self-sufficient. Owner Bill Gordon has long been interested in arts, and artists in Boston, and it was his idea to convert Rock Pool into an art center. He provided the lodgings and equipment and then turned the project over to the artists, who in return, give a percentage of their summer's intake back to make the project self-sufficient.

Of his project, Director Gordon declared, "It is inspiring to have this new colony here in New Hampshire, and there couldn't be a more logical spot for an art center than this peaceful and scenic countryside with its natural offerings of beauty to the artist."

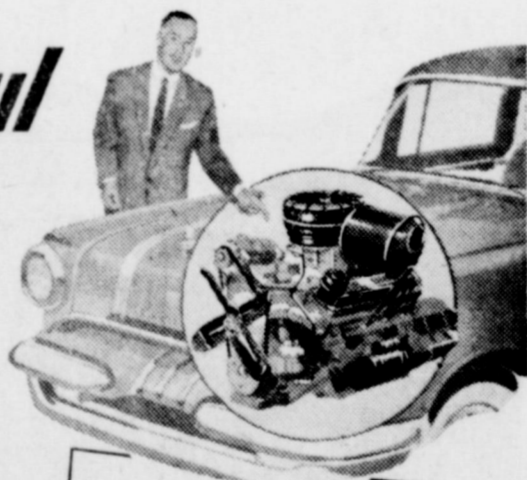

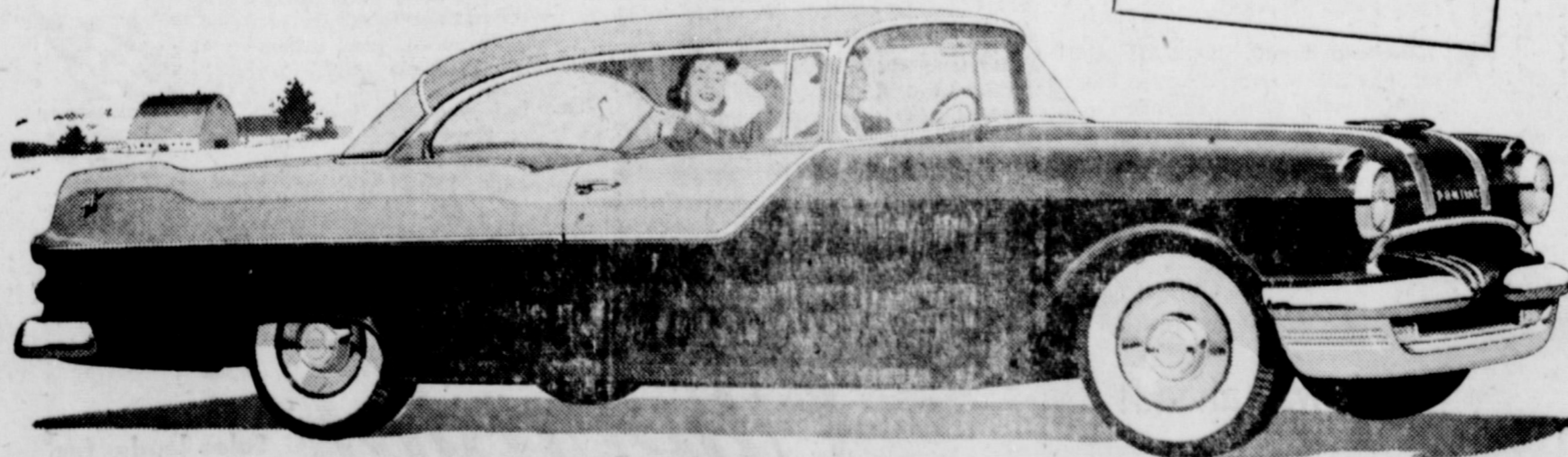

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VA Quiz

Q-I am taking on-the-job training under the GI Bill. Although I have not completed my training, my employer has increased my pay so that now I am receiving the beginning wages paid to a fully-trained worker. Does that mean my GI allowance will be cut off?

A-Not necessarily. Your GI allowance will not stop, so long as it is established that you are still a trainee in all respects except pay.

Q-Is it possible to collect GI unemployment pay at the same time I am enrolled in school under the Korean GI Bill? Since I am in school, I am not working.

A-No, it is not possible, under the law, to obtain GI unemployment allowances while you are enrolled in training under the Korean GI Bill. Although you may not be working you are drawing monthly GI training allowances from the Government.

Q-I am entitled to increased disability compensation pay by reason of my dependents. What does VA consider as the effective date of those increased payments?

A-The effective date of increased payments because of dependents is the date on which VA receives evidence establishing entitlement to the extra pay.

Q-A veteran-friend of mine who had been getting a pension somehow failed to send VA his annual income questionnaire. As a result, his pension has been stopped. If he now sends the questionnaire to VA, and if his income is below the legal maximum, will the payments be resumed?

A-If he returns the questionnaire within one year from the date it was originally sent to him, he will receive his pension payments all the way back to the date they were cut off. If he waits longer than one year, the payments will begin as of the date of receipt of the questionnaire or the date a new claim is filed. All this presupposes that the veteran's income is below the legal maximum for a pension.

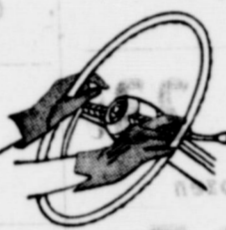

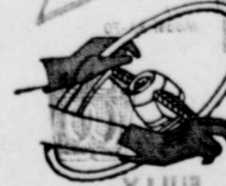

CARE OF EYES IS EXPLAINED

Though cataracts are considered a rather common affliction of older people, there is no longer any reason to fear them, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. Many think that once cataracts appear they are doomed to either blindness or an ordeal of surgery which may destroy what sight is left. Such notions have no basis in fact.

An advancing cataract brings on a dimming of the vision, and, in before his eyes, or sees double. If some cases the individual sees spots a cataract is left to develop long enough, it will appear as a faint grayness in the pupil of the eye. With complete development, the grayness will turn to dead white. Cataract is not a disease but a clouding of the lens of the eye.

Cataract can be well under way before the patient notices any visual defect. In such cases, only a physician or eye surgeon can discover the condition in time to arrest the process. When the fogging moves to the center of the pupil, the individual becomes conscious of a reduction in vision. The cataract is now well on its way. Its growth may be hastened by ill health, focal infections, overwork or neglect of one's health. Another contributing factor is defective vision resulting from astigmatism, and neglecting to use properly fitted glasses to correct such defects. Eyestrain, conscious or unconscious, can play a major role in cataract formation.

Cataracts which are the result of some infection or injury can be prevented. Cataracts resulting from aging cannot as yet be prevented. The important thing to know about cataract is that doctors can keep it from being incapacitating. Cataracts can be removed when they first appear. They need not interfere with a person's work, or embarrass him in any way—they can often be curbed. Cataracts should be treated early, before important skills are lost or unnecessary years are spent in frustration. Without fear of blindness, disfigurement or unbearable discomfort, a person can put himself in the hands of a good eye surgeon, when cataract begins to cause trouble.

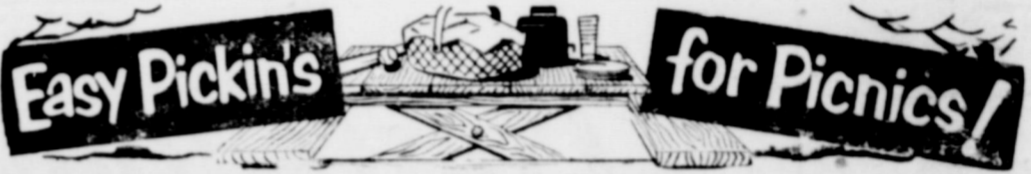
