### Claude Johnson Killed At Lamesa Last Week

Claude W. Johnson, 44, former O'Donnell Deputy Sheriff but a member of Lamesa police department since last Sept. 15th, was bludgeoned to death while on duty in that town last Wednesday morning at about 2:30. Jack Rogers, age 25, a Lamesa Latin American is in jail at Lubbock charged and billed by the Grand Jury with murdering Johnson; he is held without bail. Johnson is believed to have stopped to question Rogers at Rogers car near Dewey's Store on the square in Lamesa. Rogers had broken a lock on the store and then decided not to go on with the burglary. Johnson evidently thought he was only dealing with a drunk. Rogers stunned the officer with a blow to the head and then cold-bloodedly beat Claude to death with his own pistol.

Rogers made a complete confession and was alone in this crime.

Funeral services were conducted at the First Baptist church at Tahoka Thursday afternoon with Ernest West, minister of the Tahoka Church of Christ officiating. Burial followed in the Tahoka Cemetery. He was born at Bonham July 5, 1896 but the family moved to Winters and he grew up in that area. He moved to Tahoka in 1927 and lived there 2 years returning to Tahoka in 1932. Except for 2 years at Ruidoso, he lived in Lynn Co. since. He was wed April 3, 1939 to Velma Crouch Wells. In addition to his wife, he is survived by a daughter by a previous marriage, Mrs. Elmer Herrin of Ft. Worth, two brothers, six sisters.

Mr. Johnson was our deputy sheriff in O'Donnell in 1945-46 resigning that office to make the race for sheriff. In the election he polled a very large vote in the south end reflecting the high esteem he was held here. Claude was one of our most efficient peace officers universally liked by all who knew him. He was strictly fair and impartial and his cruel death shocked our community as few recent events have done. On behalf of all Claude's friends here the Index offers sympathy to the heart-broken family.

# Billion Dollars Cut From ECA Fund By House Foreign Relations Group; Truman Plans Speaking Campaign

## FOREIGN AID: Billion Lopped

Whether it portended a more realistic view toward European recovery needs, or was just symptomatic of a seasonal purse-tightening effort on the part of some congressmen, there were major headlines in the fact that the house foreign affairs committee lopped a billion dollars off foreign aid requests for next year.

Slashing a proposal made by President Truman, the committee went on to recommend that the existing gap in foreign relief be filled with U.S. farm surpluses.

THAT WOULD make sense to most Americans, probably, except those so energetically and enthusiastically committed to foreign aid without any limit or restrictions, that they brand as narrow isolationists anyone who argues that U.S. welfare ought to be considered along with welfare of other nations.

Paul G. Hoffman, foreign recovery administrator, was unable to say immediately what effect the foreign aid plan slash would have. He said he would prefer to study the proposal and ascertain what kind of farm surpluses the government has in its bins, and whether Europe needs them.

HE SAID he already knows these surpluses include wheat, cotton and tobacco. A house committee member also named these three and added corn, oats, barley, fats, oils and dairy products. No mention was made of the huge surpluses of potatoes and eggs which America also has on hand.

Hoffman, who most likely would end up opposing surpluses in lieu of cash, would be hard put, it appeared, to make the average American believe that a war-ravaged Europe couldn't use, or didn't need, such items as eggs, potatoes, corn, fats oils and dairy products. There are many American families right here at home who would be delighted if they ever had a sufficiency of any of these items.

## RED CURBS: Caution Urged

The federal justice department has warned congress to "move with caution" in acting on anti-Communist legislation, some of which, the department said, would "inflict punishment on named groups without jury trial."

THUS the nation is treated to the ironical paradox of having the restrictions of its own constitution prevent an action designed at preserving and protecting that constitution.

As an example, Peyton Ford, assistant to U.S. Attorney General McGrath, told the house un-American activities committee "it is by no means certain" that the constitutionality of such legislation could be upheld.

AS ALMOST every schoolboy knows, the constitution was kicked around plenty during the days immediately preceding World War II on the pretext that such violations were for the "safety of the nation."

It seems regrettable, then, that a little leeway couldn't be taken by these same patriots when it comes to preserving the "safety of the nation" when war again is openly talked and envisioned.

## RENT CONTROL: Soon to Go?

Federal rent controls soon would be a thing of the past, if a particular action of congress could be construed as an indication—and it was so construed by everyone in Washington.

CONGRESS gave the President a broad hint that there may not be any rent controls after June 30, when it sent him a money bill that included funds earmarked to pay off employees of the rent control agency.

The senate completed legislative action on the measure—a 783 million dollar deficiency bill—to provide extra money for various federal agencies for the year ending in June.

INCLUDED in the measure was four million dollars for the office of housing expeditor Tighe E. Woods. Of that amount, more than two and one-half million was to be used to pay for the terminal leave of employees. The other 1.25 was for operating expenses for which Woods had asked 3.6 millions.

## LEOPOLD: Storm & Strife

The future appeared rugged for ex-King Leopold of Belgium and almost as rugged and surely as uncertain for his troubled country. The fight to restore Leopold to the Belgian throne, which he abdicated when the German hordes overran Belgium, had become a bitter one.

The monarchists won a victory at the polls on a referendum on restoration of the monarchy.

## EASTER SEALS: Help a Child

The generosity of the American people during the 1950 Easter Seal campaign, which ends April 9, will help bring new life and hope to many crippled children.

SIX-YEAR-OLD Russell Miller knows that, as does his family, for Russell, who has had cerebral palsy since birth, is now able to start walking by himself—because of the help and treatment he received through the auspices of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults. He was chosen the "Easter Seal Boy for 1950" because he typifies the thousands of crippled children who have been similarly helped through this organization.

This year's Easter Seal, which symbolizes the conquest of a handicap by a crippled child, shows a small boy abandoning his crutches and starting to walk by himself.

RUSSELL is a handsome boy, with bright and friendly eyes. He is eager to learn and does everyday chores, despite his handicap. At home he is an accepted member of the family and does not expect or receive any special privileges.

But, if it were not for the guidance of medical specialists, the determination of his mother that he would walk and play again like other children, specialized care and other Easter Seal services he received, Russell's resulting rapid progress certainly would never have taken place.

The American people were reminded that during the Easter Seal sale, no job and no contribution would be too small to do its share in helping crippled children walk again.

## PRESIDENCY: All Aboard!

President Truman was getting ready to hit the trail again with his gospel of the need for electing and reelecting Democrats. It was believed his spring and fall campaign tour would match the intensity of his 31,500-mile "give-em-hell" campaign of 1948.

PLANS were for Mr. Truman to hit the road early in May for a rear-platform speaking swing that would carry him into Washington state about May 11 for the dedication of Grand Coulee dam. It would wind up with a "fighting political talk" in Chicago stadium the night of May 15 at a giant Democratic rally.

The trip will include "off-the-cuff" talks to crowds around the railroad tracks to end from the west coast, and plugs for Democratic candidates and Fair Deal measures.

For the fall campaigning, an even longer, more intensive tour is being planned, for then the President will go into a score or more of states to slug it out for Democratic congressional candidates.

MR. TRUMAN'S amazing success at this type of political warfare is the chief reason, surely, why he has decided to engage in it again. Admittedly no orator, the President, nevertheless, did sufficiently well for himself in the 1948 campaign to make it seem logically good strategy to pursue similar tactics this time.

## British Get B-29's

The first of American armed aid to Great Britain was between 70 and 80 B-29's which were started for England in ceremonies at Andrews Field, Washington, D.C. Kentucky's Sen. Virgil Chapman represented the senate armed services committee at the exercises. Defense Secretary Louis Johnson declared that the first four bombers which took off "will be followed by a growing volume . . ."

Everyone Wants  
Admiration

Is wanting to show off neurotic?

Answer: No more so than any other natural instinct—but your way of trying to gratify it may be. Everyone instinctively wants admiration and approval, and accordingly the desire to show off is universal even though in many people it has been so sternly repressed that they are not conscious of it. But to give way to the desire is neurotic when you don't consider whether what you have to display—whether it is beauty, wit, or talent—will be pleasing to your audience. Mature people show off only when they have something to show.

But also had been expected to be models of behavior. Stammering is basically the result of a conflict between what we wish to say and what we think we're expected to say, so that the more afraid a child is to express himself spontaneously, the more likely he will be to stutter.

## KEEPING HEALTHY

# Cancer of Lip, Diagnosis and Care

LIKE MALIGNANT growth elsewhere, cancer of the lip is a grave disease. It is carried to lymph nodes near by and will eventually kill the patient unless it is treated adequately and at an early stage.

Fortunately an ulcer or growth on the lip continually reminds the patient of its presence. It can usually be easily recognized by the physician. Because it can be easily reached it can be treated in a number of ways.

I am quoting freely Dr. C. C. Burkell, Saskatoon cancer clinic, Saskatoon, Sask., in "Canadian Medical Association Journal."

Dr. Burkell presents a review of some 534 cases of cancer of the lip treated in Saskatoon cancer clinics at Regina and Saskatoon, 97 per cent of which were on the lower lip. In one group of 131 cases the cancers had been present from nine months to as long as 20 years, the average being about four years. While some cases of cancer of

the lip, particularly where the adjoining lymph nodes are involved, require surgical operation, where ever radium can be administered in any of its various forms—the results are much to be preferred to surgical operation, which in so many cases leaves disfiguring scars.

The results of treating 534 consecutive cases of cancer of the lip by radium showed that the overall survival of life was 89.5 per cent (about nine in every 10 cases) for five years after treatment.

Dr. Burkell from his review of these cases states:

1. Cancer of the lip can be cured by radium treatment in a very high percentage of cases provided treatment is given early.

2. The choice of method in use of radium is not important provided careful care and planning are used.

3. Radium is not the treatment of choice where neighboring glands are involved.

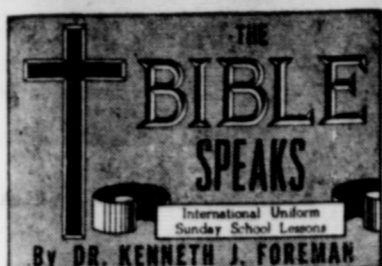

The Man from Mars, visiting our planet at Easter time, would have a hard time guessing what the festival means. Rabbits? New clothes? A day off? The return of spring? Not at all, nothing of the sort. Bunnies and hats are gay; but the right word for Easter is not Gaiety, it is Glory.

## God's Victory

EVEN IN churches you will not always hear the whole truth about Easter. You may hear that it is the festival of Returning Hope, or that it symbolizes new life, or that it stands for the triumph of faith over despair, or that it expresses our belief in immortality. In a way, all these ideas about Easter are true, but if that is all, then we have not yet got down to the truth about Easter.

The fact is—the fact which gives a solid ground for all these other facts—the first Easter was the day when God raised Jesus Christ from the dead. It was the day of God's victory over death, when the gates of death swung backward and the bars of death were broken.

The truth about Easter is that something happened on that day that never happened before and never will happen again. Because never before had the Son of God risen in personal triumph from the grave, and never will that have to be done over again.

If it were not for that fact, Jesus might have been remembered as a long-dead Jewish teacher, a hopeful but mistaken and defeated teacher, a name to be found only in encyclopaedias. But the truth about Easter is that Jesus is not dead, his hopes were not mistaken, he was not defeated, his Name is above every man! He is the Christian's living Lord.

## His Power in Us

THAT STRANGELY TWISTED man Kierkegaard called Christianity "God's attack on man." You could not get that idea from the New Testament.

Marvelous as it is, Christianity is God offering to man the power to rise out of our dead selves, to do for us what we could never have done for ourselves. What has this to do with Easter? Just this: That when the Apostle Paul wants to explain what the power is which God sets at our disposal, what it is like and what it will do, he tells us it is the same power with which God raised Christ from the dead. (See I Cor. 6:14 Eph. 1:19,20; 2:8; Phil. 3:10.)

You see the truth about Easter is that it is the day when the Christians celebrate the most tremendous act God ever performed on this planet, or rather that day when God brought to a climax the whole mighty action of the coming and the life and death of Christ. And that is the power which is available for the Christian.

## A Christian

Is Supernatural

IF ALL YOU WANT of God is to have him do something for you, then you are rather like a baby who keeps crying for some one to bring him more toys . . . but he stays a baby. If your want of God is to have him do something with you, in you and through you, then you are like a child who really wants to grow up.

The Christian is a supernatural being. As C. S. Lewis puts it, we are not God's little toy soldiers, we are intended to be his sons and daughters.

But if the Christ is the "first-born among many brethren" then here is this life those who accept him have access to the same power that wrought in him. And at the end of life we shall not be afraid, knowing that we belong to the same God who raised our Lord from the dead.

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

When preparing both the yolks and whites of eggs for a recipe, time, work, water and egg may be saved by beating the whites first and then, with the unwashed beater, the yolks.

Left-over egg whites should be used promptly, and kept covered in a refrigerator while they await use.

If there is a steel taste to the ice cubes, don't blame the refrigerator. The trouble probably lies in the fact that the trays are harboring food odors. To keep trays fresh and sweet, wash them frequently with soda and warm water, about three tablespoons of soda to a quart of water.

With cut glass back in vogue, here's a cleaning tip: Tackle the dust that's collected in all the crevices with a baking-soda paste and a stiff brush.

Brown spots that inevitably show up on glass baking dishes may be removed by sprinkling baking soda in the dish, filling it with hot water and letting soak for about 10 minutes.

For really good coffee, a clean coffee maker is the first requirement. Brush the pot and all the fittings with baking soda, then rinse in hot water. It's a sure way of getting rid of that invisible film that causes an off-flavor coffee.

## Prepare Woodwork For Repaint Jobs

Proper Preliminaries Make Task Easier

Woodwork in farm homes can be repainted more effectively if proper steps are taken to prepare the surface beforehand.

This conclusion was announced after a study of the subject by the Eagle-Picher company of Cincinnati. Their survey, according to reports, showed that preparing the surface beforehand will always be valuable, whether the work is to be done by a professional, or by the farmer himself.

If the woodwork has been painted before and the paint is in good condition, it should be washed down



In removing this paint brush with a can of paint, it is always best to scrape off any excess fluid to prevent dripping or streaking.

with a few drops of benzine on a dry cloth. This is done to remove any grease. Care should be taken, however, as benzine is inflammable.

Should the present paint on the woodwork be in poor condition, then it should be removed entirely, or at least in the bad spots, with a paint remover. This applies especially to areas with blisters, roughness, streaks or looseness. Any paint left on should be cleaned with benzine.

**Children's Parties**  
"MOM, why can't I give a party like Betty," asks a society inclined five-year old. Why, indeed, mother, since it involves so little and will make such a hit of your little boy or girl with his or her friends?

Youngsters do not need to have a lot of special preparation for their parties. In fact, with their abundant good spirits, cookies or sandwiches and a glass of milk or a dish of ice cream served after school can well be turned into a party.

You need not wonder or worry where your children are if you have refreshments to serve them every so often when they trip gaily home from school to your house.

**IF REFRESHMENTS** are served after school, and thus, before the evening meal, make them light but refreshing, so no appetite for the meal need be ruined. Simple and palatable beverages are an excellent choice, as are small cookies and sandwiches.

**Milk Fruit Shrub (Serves 4)**  
1 cup crushed strawberries with juice  
1/2 cup orange juice  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
Sugar to sweeten (1/2 to 3/4 cup)  
1 quart milk

Combine all ingredients and beat with rotary beater. Pour into glasses and serve.

**Prune Milk Drink (Serves 2)**  
1 pint cold milk  
1/2 cup prune puree  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 teaspoons sugar  
Dash of salt  
Sprinkling of nutmeg

Blend prune puree with lemon juice, sugar and salt. Add chilled milk and stir until thoroughly mixed. Pour into glasses and sprinkle with nutmeg. A tablespoon or two of vanilla ice cream may be floated on top if a richer beverage is desired.

**Fruit Lemonade**  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup water  
Juice of 2 lemons  
Juice of 1 orange  
1/2 cup pineapple juice  
4 tablespoons cracked ice  
4 cherries  
1 1/2 cups ginger ale

Boil together sugar and water for two minutes; set aside to cool. Pour 1/2 cup of the cooled syrup into a shaker or glass jar, add the fruit juices and ice and shake until thoroughly mixed. Fill glasses about half full, add fruit, then ginger ale.

**Hot Malted Egnog (Serves 6)**  
6 eggs, beaten  
1 tablespoon sugar or honey  
1/2 cup malted milk powder  
Dash of salt  
4 1/2 cups milk, scalded  
Dash of nutmeg  
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla

Combine eggs with sugar, malted milk powder and salt. Add scalded

**WITH YOUR CHOICE** of beverages suitable for youngsters, here are cookies which are equally appropriate. All of these are of the simpler variety that are used for keeping the cookie jar filled.

**Sugar Cookies (Makes 90)**  
1 cup butter  
2 cups sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3 eggs, well beaten  
4 cups sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream together butter and sugar. Add remaining ingredients and blend thoroughly. Roll and cut in fancy shapes with floured cutters. Bake in a hot (400°) oven for 8-10 minutes or until golden brown.

**Peanut Butter Cookies (Makes about 150)**  
1 cup butter or substitute  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 cup brown sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 cup moist peanut butter  
2 teaspoons soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons boiling water  
3 cups sifted flour  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream together butter, granulated and brown sugar. Add eggs and blend well. Mix in peanut butter. Dissolve soda in hot water and add to mixture. Sift salt with flour and add to mixture. Put through cookie press or drop by spoonfuls on greased baking sheet and press with fork. Bake in a hot (400°) oven for 8-12 minutes.

**Hermits (Makes 5-6 dozen)**  
1/2 cup butter or substitute  
1 1/2 cups brown sugar  
2 tablespoons sour milk  
3 eggs  
1 teaspoon soda  
3 cups sifted cake flour  
1 cup currants  
1/2 cup nuts, chopped  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind

Cream butter until fluffy, then work in sugar. Add milk and well beaten eggs. Sift soda with half the flour and add to creamed mixture. Add remaining flour to fruits, nuts and spices and work into first mixture. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderately hot (375°) oven for 12-15 minutes. These will keep nicely for a long time.

When broiling chops, serve them with this fruit combination: top pineapple slices with apricot halves and brush with bacon fat before broiling.

Tiny biscuits make a good snack for evenings when they're spread while still warm with cream cheese and deviled ham.

When using canned baked beans, add some extra flavor by mixing in 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 3 tablespoons chili sauce, a dash of Worcestershire sauce and a bit of choned green pepper.

**Record Throgs Eager to Hear 'Noisiest' Band**

**HOLLYWOOD, CALIF.** — The cash register's steady jingle is drowning out the cowbells, doorbells, trolley gongs, ringing anvils, bicycle pumps and tuned flitguns of the world's noisiest orchestra.

Spike Jones, the comic band-leader with the concave face, has made music depreciation an art. And how this clanging, banging and screeching pays off is a wonder to behold:

On tour last year, Jones' outfit commanded \$120,000 for 16 days at the Texas state fair. They got \$12,500 a week in big hotels at Las Vegas, Nev., and St. Louis, Mo. The smallest stops among a hundred cities guaranteed \$3,500 a night, or 60% of the gross. The average, except in the largest spots, was \$5,000 a night. College towns got off with a flat \$3,500. In Milwaukee Spike drew 5,000 to the Coliseum at the state fair park.

Spike's recording of a single number, "Two Front Teeth," sold 1,100,000 copies in six weeks. RCA Victor sent him a golden record, framed, and an extra frame for the second golden record RCA expects him to win with sales of the reissue of the same number.

Jones has just signed with producer Harry Sherman to make a comedy western, Spike's seventh film but his first as the star.

The 1948 tour, 125 one night stands, grossed over \$1,000,000. Spike's junket in 1949 nearly matched that figure although the band "took it easy" by staying longer in some cities.

This is big business for a guy who started with a washboard and a \$10 set of cowbells. The revenue isn't all gravy, however. Spike takes about 40 people on tour, augmenting the band with singers, acrobats and comedy acts. They travel in a chartered train of two pullmans and a baggage car. Spike estimates traveling expenses at \$700 a day.

Salaries come out of the gross, too, and Spike's side men are expensive. They have to be good musicians to kick a piece around the way they do. Jones' travesties may sound like uproar to the uninitiated, but they are very carefully arranged.

His style is corn, but it's sharp. His most steadfast admirers are sophisticates — not hillbillies. Among Spike's fans are conductors Arthur Fiedler and Leopold Stokowski.
