T. B. IS STILL A MAJOR ILLNESS

Tuberculosis, many years ago the nation's lealing cause of death, is losing out because of man's fight for better health. Once the leading death in Texas, too, tuberculosis now ranks ninth in Texas as a cause of death, says Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, Last year all forms of tuberculosis killed 1.070 Texans while twenty years ago with a population of hirds of our present present populatin there were 4,020 deaths.

Tuberculosis usually attacks the lungs. The disease is spread from person to person, through germ-laden droplets or sputum discharged by an infected person. It can be spread through kissing, breathing air containing tuberculosis germs, and through handling objects used in common with tuberculosis persons. Children are easily suscept ible to tuberculosis infection as they are to other disease germs.

Tuberculosis victims have a good chance to recover, if the disease is found in its early stages, and a physician's instructions for treat-ment are carefully followed. The outlook is becoming more encouraging as time goes on, but we cannot rest while the disease is taking

Often, tubeculosis does not show any noticeable symptoms until its victim has become extremely sick.

TAKE TIME TO TAKE STOCK OF YOUR HEALTH

If you have not had an audit made recently of your physical assets and liabilities, go to your doctor now and have it done is the advice of the State Health Officer to all grown-ups in Texas. It is quite as important to check up on your physical resources as it look intto the state of your financial possessions. By regular care under your physician's direction, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid the accumulation of destructive liabilities

Each of us starts with a certain amount of physical capital. Merely s a business proposition, it worthwhile to conserve it to the best of our ability. In infancy and childhood our physical resources, as a rule, are safeguarded for us. As we grow older, the responsibility for doing so rest upon the individual. The critical period may come in middle life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing returns in the way of physical well being. A large number of the deaths reported each year in Texas is due to the degenerative diseases of middle age,

Nearly all of these diseases have slow beginnings, and their onset can often be recognized in the course of a thorough physical exam ination before they have gained serious headway. In the majority early detection of menacing condit with a readjustment of physic al expenditures and a better budget ing of activities, under a physician's direction, will help to shift slance from unfavorable to the favorable side of the ledger.

A. Generally, each farm trainee is expected to train on a farm he owns or manages. However, two veterans may train on a single farm if conditions are favorable enough to assure successful training and eventual self employment for each.

Q. I am entitled to 36 months of training under the Korean GI Bill. Does that mean my GI on-the-farm "training course can last for months?

A. Not necessarily. The length of your farm training program will de pend on how long it will take you to reach your objective. Your pro gram is tailor-made to fit your own needs and experience; it may

shortened to take advantage of the farming you already know.

Q. May I take on-the-farm train

orean GI bill?

A. No. Under the law, GI farm training must be taken on a full time basis.

Q. I ar taking Korean GI farm training. My school has just inform ed me that it has extended the length of the course beyond that which has been approved by VA. Will I get GI allowance payments for the extension?

A. No. GI allowances, under the law, may not be authorized for ex-tensions beyond the period requir-

Farmers' May Retire

In a previous article in this series we told you about farm workers and self-employed farm ers coming under social security many for the first time--on Jan-uaary 1, 1955. Beginning then then earnlings for farmers and farm hands will be counted under Social Security. But no doubt many of you are wondering what you are "buying' when you pay your social security taxes. You are buying oldage and survivors insurance; that is, when your earnings stop because of your death or because of your retirement at age 65 or lager, payments will be made from the fund you helped build up, and will be made to you and your depen-

dents, or to your survivors. Here are the tpes of benefits:

1. RETIREMENT PAYMENTS (1) Monthly payments to you as a retired farm hand or farm-

(2) And monthly payments to your----a. Wife, age 65 or over, Child under 18.

Wife, regardless of age, caring for child entitled benefits.

d. Dependent husband. SURVIVORS' OR DEATH

 Monthly payments to your-a. Widow, age 65 or over. Widow, regardless of age. if caring for child entitled to Child under 18.

d. Dependent widower, age 65 e. Dependent parent, age 65 over.

(2) Lump-sum payment to your-a. Widow or widower, or b. To the person who paid bur-

ial expenses. Benefits for a retired worker run from \$30.00 per month to \$108.50 month, depending on the amount of your past earnings from employment employment of self-employment covered by the Social Security Act. Family benefits may run as high as \$200.00 per month.
