

icy based on collective security. He got rid of Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, putting in his place Lord Halifax, outspoken friend of Nazi Germany, and defied the opposition of the Labor party in parliament.

The earl of Perth, British ambassador to Rome, had conversations with Italian Foreign Minister Ciano and was then called to London for further instructions. It was said Perth and Ciano agreed the following points must be discussed and, if possible, made a part of the London-Rome treaty:

Britain must recognize the Italian conquest of Ethiopia

An Anglo-Italian Mediterranean pact should be arranged to include Italian naval parity with Britain in the Mediterranean, reduction in Italy's troops in Libya, and British assurances that the Suez canal will be safeguarded against closing or air attack

Immediate cessation of anti-Italtories in the Near East in return for which Italy will guarantee not to include anti-British propaganda in its Bari radio broadcasts

Withdrawal of foreign "volunteers" from Spain was to be demanded by Britain, and it was understood in London that Chancellor Hitler of Germany had agreed to that, and that Italy would not refuse, although Mussolini especially wishes that Franco be granted belligerent rights.

France in Tight Place

FRANCE, it was expected, would adopt a course parallel with that of Britain, for, as Foreign Minister Delbos said, she might otherwise find herself isolated in Europe. However Premier Chautemps served notice on Chamberlain that the French would join in the proposed fourpower pact only if protection were assured for Czechoslovakia and Austria. The French secret defense committee met to organize an arms expansion program involving \$855,400,000 and to lay plans for defending the Czechs against German aggression.

The Chamberlain plan leaves out Soviet Russia, an ally of France; and the French also seemed likely to lose another ally, for Poland, it appeared, was about to enter into an agreement with Germany against Russia. Field Marshal Goering, Hitler's right-hand man, was in Warsaw, entertained by President Moscicki, Foreign Minis ter Beck and Field Marshal Smigly-Ridz, head of the Polish army. That soldier and other leading Poles believe war between Germany and Russia will break out before long. They don't like the Germans but fear that if Stalin lost the war Hitler would proceed to grab Poland.

Isolationists Cheered

A MERICAN isolationists saw in the new European developments the eclipse of the internationalism fostered by President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull, and were greatly encouraged in their determination to keep the United States free from foreign entanglements. At the same time the proponents of powerful national defense were elated and the administra- economics since 1935.

McNutt Hullabaloo

PAUL V. McNUTT, high commissioner to the Philippines, came home to report to the President, and as soon as he arrived in Washington his enthusiastic friends staged a big reception for the purpose of booming him as Democratic nominee for the Presidency in 1940. All experienced politicians agree that this is most premature, and in the capital it was felt that it was decidedly distasteful to Mr. Roosevelt, who doesn't wish to be hurried in picking his possible successor. No member of the cabinet except Secretary Roper and no important man of the administration attended the reception.

McNutt said he was not a candidate for any office, but Senator Sherman Minton, Governor Townsend and other leading Democrats of Indiana insist he should be nominated in 1940, and no one doubts that he would like to be so honored.

Chandler in Race

OVERNOR A. B. ("HAPPY") CHANDLER of Kentucky formally announced his candidacy for the senate seat occupied by Alben Barkley, majority leader. He said he would try to confine his fight to state issues, but would not hesitate to take issue with the Roosevelt administration if it interfered in the primaries in behalf of

Green Hits Lewis' Plan

MOVING to stop John Lewis and his C. I. O. from gaining political control of Pennsylvania, the American Federation of Labor revoked the charter of the state federation. 

The glow in Mr. Bryan's own mind was imparted partly by Harvard and partly by the University of Virginia. The elder Mr. Bryan had established a tradition of independence which his son has maintained.

Although the house hasn't and armor have both been improved done anything on it yet, definite action seems probable unless it gets lost in the shuffle. The independent exhibitors have been telling congress that they are under constant criticism, are losing money and losing their show houses. in their purpose.

Testifying before a senate committee in favor of the Neely bill, the little theater men lay all their troubles on "the big eight." They mean the eight big motion picture producers. The big eight owns about all the big chain theaters. Each year the producers make a few good pictures and a lot of pictures which are not so good. They reserve the good films for their "affiliated" theaters and force the rest on the little independent men, according to the latter's complaint.

This is how they do it, the little exhibitors say. The producers draw up a year's contract in which the little exhibitor agrees to take a certain group or "block" of pictures. In the block are listed two or three first-class films, to be made by good directors and competent players. The rest are merely labeled class A, B, C. The contracting exhibitor never sees them. In order to get any good films at all he must take a lot of stuff he doesn't want. Even a variety of news and other shorts, loaded with free advertising for women's wear and summer and winter resorts, goes with the lot. This method of doing business is called "compulsory block booking and blind selling."

For several years the independent exhibitors have been fighting the "BB and BS." They've had several bills before congress, and have lodged numerous complaints with the Department of Justice. But something always prevents action.

Subverts Morals

The neighborhood exhibitors contend that a huge motion picture monopoly subverts the morals of the nation by making racket pictures and sex pictures, when they could just as well make quality film. High-class pictures, they contend, have proved entertaining to the intelligentsia and the rank and file alike.

The "big eight" has two answers to the charges. More or less privately its claim is that the profit it makes from the not so good pictures is necessary to support the high-grade pictures. There would be none of the good if it weren't for the bad, in other words. And publicly, every time the little men go to Washington and start making things hot, the big men announce a new set of reforms, and suggest some more conferences.

Meanwhile in North Dak independent exhibitors' group got a law passed prohibiting the showing of pictures by theaters which be long to the producer that made the pictures. Paramount, which is strong in that region, is suing the governor and the attorney general, but the little fellows are swarming like hornets to help the state win.

Last Naval Resort

Suicide squadrons of high-speed torpedo boats, to be steered by human pilots head-on against enemy ships, are boasted by Germany and Italy. England probably has them too. Buried in Admiral Leahy's testimony before the United States congress in favor of a mightier navy is mention of a \$15,000,000 item for experimentation with small destroyers. The admiral declined to discuss the matter. Naval observers would like to know if this country too will call for a volunteer death squadron.

In time of peace, definitely no. It would be against the glory and tradition of the United States navy. The suicide boats, say navy men, are the unashamed last resort of an inferior sea power. The mere admission of the existence of such devices is the admission of the fear of defeat. Sending men to certain death, for any cause whatever, is a barbarity wholly repugnant to the navy.

And navy men maintain that the torpedo boats are impractical. The United States fleet will fight its battles far out at sea, perhaps 2,000 miles. The sleds could not be used in usually choppy open water. In Europe, where sea fighting will be at close quarters, it's a different story.

But in the heat of war involving us, no one can say what might be done. If an enemy fleet should succeed in reaching our shores, it would be imperative to attack it with the most destructive weapons obtainable. A few dozen or a few score men sacrificed in torpedoes, made more deadly with human minds and eyes, would seem to be a low price to pay for victory in the face of national disaster.



Progress in **Tuberculosis**

DR. JAMES W. BARTON

NYONE who has regular-A NYONE who has regularly visited a relative or friend at a tuberculosis sanatorium learns the names of patients in adjoining rooms and wards, and can see the progress toward recovery or otherwise from week to week. Of course the physician can see the record of each patient-the

range of temperature, the amount of coughing, the amount of daily sputum, the number of times he breathes in a minute, and finally the X-ray whether the tuberculosis process is spreading, healing, or standing still.

Dr. Barton

From the above he is able to tell the patient, or the family, just what to expect-three months, six months, or a year to recovery, or it may be just a matter of months before he passes away, notwithstanding all that can be done by way of food, fresh air, rest, or collapsing the lung by artificial air or by surgery to give it rest.

What should help the patient to fight and family to hope, despite all the other signs, symptoms, and tests, is recorded by Dr. Allan S. Kennedy of Mountain sanatorium, Hamilton, Canada, in the Canadian Medical Association Journal. Dr. Kennedy states that the blood pressure-low or high-will give the physician a correct idea of the progress of the patient.

"It is an accepted fact that active and progressing tuberculosis of the lungs is accompanied by lowering of the blood pressure."

"It is generally believed that tubercesis patients with high blood pressure have very little tuberculosis, or, in any case, tend to heal the tuberculosis more quickly than people with normal or low blood

Response to Cold Tells.

The response of the blood pressure to cold-a test taken every few months, will show whether or not the patient is improving.

Dr. Kennedy outlines the method used on 80 patients to obtain the blood pressure response to coldputting hand and wrist of one side in near-freezing water for 25 seconds-while blood pressure is taken

on other arm. If the blood pressure response is poor-does not increase a definite amount-the patient is not improving; if the response is good the patient is putting up a winning fight against tuberculosis.

For Underweight Child.

Some mothers are naturally distressed when they find that despite the amount and the variety of food eaten by their youngsters they still remain underweight. If the youngster is wiry or resembles one of the parents in being underweight at his age, not much is thought of it, but often there is no history of extreme underweight on either side.

If abundant amounts of meats, vegetables and fruits have been given to maintain body structure and also liberal amounts of bread, butter, milk and cream to provide energy and store up a little fat, with no proper amount of increase in weight, there is something wrong with the youngster and he should be examined by the family physician and dentist.

For instance, there may be a history of thyroid trouble in the family and the youngster may be an early thyroid case. Should this be so, the amount of food eaten may be quite large, yet there will be no increase in weight; the youngster continues to be underweight.

Another cause of underweight is infection of teeth and tonsils. So much of the body's energy is being used to fight this infection that there is not enough left for proper growth aside from any increase in weight.

Sometimes the youngster will play so hard and so long, perhaps stay up so late at night, that he is actually tired all the time and the food eaten is not fully absorbed into the blood.

When the cause for underweight has been removed-fatigue, goitre, infected teeth or tonsils-then what is called the upbuilding diet should be used. This includes all the usual foods-proteins (meat, eggs, fish, poultry, cereals), all the starch foods-(bread, sugar, potatoes), all the fat foods (cream, butter, egg yolks), and the minerals and vitamins (fruits, vegetables, dairy products). The next point is to give increased amounts of the foods known to be fattening; "an extra tablespoonful of butter with each meal adds 300 calories, and improves the flavor of cereals, vegetables, and desserts without being noticeable when used as a seasoning. A tablespoon of thick cream on cereal, or whipped cream on dessert, and of mayonnaise dressing on salad, will add 300 calories more. One or two tablespoons of olive oil at bedtime furnish 100 or 200 more calories and may help relieve constipation.

scription eyeing the fungi with interest. He stopped Jack and told him the species was poisonous and shouldn't be eaten. Then Jack was pretty sure he had his man spotted.

Jack stood talking to the man for a while. They got along great because they had a common interest. Before they parted they made an appointment to go down into the mine on the following Sunday to look for fungi. They took one of the stationary engineers into their confidence and he agreed to lower them down in a mine car.

Down 7,200 Feet Into the Earth.

That Sunday they met at the mine entrance at 10:30 a. m. The stationary engineer-a fellow named Barry-was there, too. They climbed into the car and were soon at the bottom, 7,200 feet below the surface. 'We explored the bottom of the mine for about a quarter of a

mile," says Jack, "with carbide lamps on our hats and wearing rubber coats. The temperature was about a hundred degrees, since the farther you go down the warmer and more humid it gets. When we had been there about twenty-five minutes and had found a few specimens of fungus, we returned to the car for the

'As we got into the car I noticed a copper ingot lying on the floor and wondered how it got there. Those ingots weigh about forty pounds apiece and come in a size that can be conveniently stacked along the ratiroad sidings for shipment. I took the top seat, way up in the front of the car. Fritz took the second seat from the rear end where the bells and buttons which signalled the engineer were attached. The car started moving and went half way up the slope, drawn by the metal cable from above. Then it stopped suddenly. I didn't know it then, but Fritz had halted it with a signal."

He Was About to Brain Jack.

When the car stopped Jack turned to look at Fritz. That move saved his life. For there was Fritz, the copper ingot in his hands, holding it high above his head, ready to bring it down on Jack's own cranium. We are quick to "We cannot" on the basis of appreciation of the power of God operative on our behalf would enable us to say "We can," and having left God out of our thinking we

find that indeed we cannot.

The lesson before us presents two pictures from our Lord's second visit to his home country, Nazareth. On His first visit they had tried to thrust Him over the precipice, and He in all the glory and poise of the Son of God had walked through their midst and gone His way. Now He comes again with His disciples. We then see how His home folk virtually made the power of the omnipotent God impotent because of their unbelief. On the other hand we see the weakness of men made mighty because of obedience to the command of God.

I. The Paralysis of Unbelief (vv. 1-6).

The world, the flesh, and the devil have brought forth a dark list of wicked things, but perhaps the most destructive and distressing of all is the foundation sin of unbelief. When we think back to the underlying reason for any sin or weakness in man it will be found that there is a failure to believe God. Men do not believe what He says about sin and its penalty, nor do they believe Him when He offers them grace and strength for victory.

At Nazareth the unbelief which limited the Son of God revealed itself in two questions-

1. "Whence hath this man these things?" (v. 2).

They could not deny His mighty works so they turn their attack on His person. "Is not this the carpenter?" (v. 3). Essentially this was envy, "the difficulty of acknowledging the superiority over themselves of one of their own number" . . . (Morgan).

We are ashamed of the attitude of the men of Nazareth, but we follow in their footsteps. Heavy among the burdens a Christian worker must bear is the unbelief and ridicule of his own people. Because a man has sold us groceries, or painted our house or driven a taxi in our town we cannot see how he could ever be a preacher or a missionary. Well, he can, and it is such folk that God often calls.

"What is this wisdom?" (v. 2). The wisdom of Jesus was the wisdom of God (John 7:16). But how could they know that? How can we whether it be of God, or whether I speak of myself." In fact, their very dependence on Him for all things sets them free to devote themselves fully to the ministry of preaching and healing. Note that they went "two by
