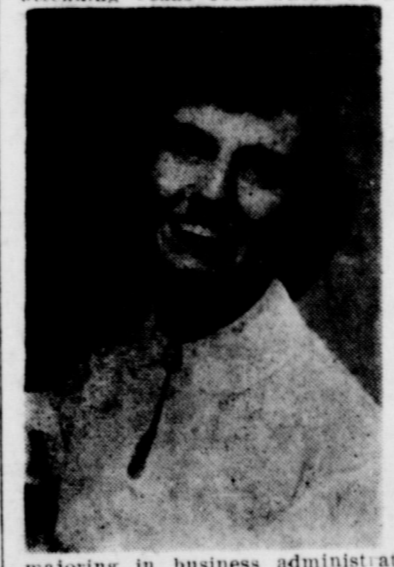
Engagement Is Told

Liquor Board Issues Church Drink Permit

COLUMBUS, O.—The state liquor department issued a beer and wine permit to the St. John Cantius Catholic Church in Cleveland, it was learned recently.

The permit to serve high-powered beer and wine by the drink was made out for the bar in the church recreation center.

Msr. Francis Duda, pastor, said that only bowlers would be served by the bar. "It is not for the public, the Monsignor said."

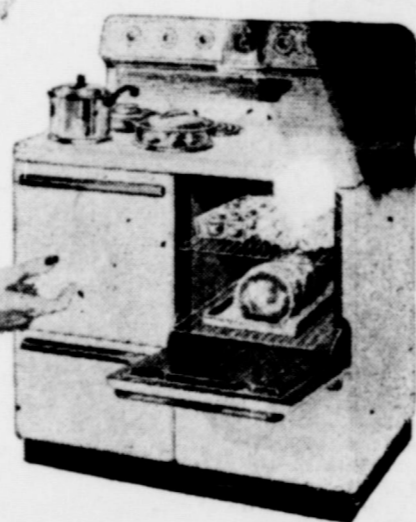

Mail Early For Christmas

Postmaster Hal Singleton believes that with a three-cent stamp your Christmas cards will win more friends and influence more people than if they are mailed with a two-cent stamp.

"First-class postage," he explained today, "is the best Yuletide insurance you can get. With it your greetings will be processed and delivered quicker. And they'll be forwarded, or returned, if it becomes necessary."

"This eliminates any worry about whether or not your season's greetings were received. Your own return address on the envelope will help others keep their address books up to date. Then, too, Christmas cards sent with three-cent stamps may carry written messages, a custom everyone enjoys."

None of these postal privileges are authorized at the third-class rates. Moreover, Christmas card envelopes smaller than 2 3/4 x 4" or larger than 9" x 12" require cancellation by hand, and must carry first-class postage.

Postmaster Singleton urges everyone to tie their Christmas cards in two separate bundles, with each address facing the same way. Then postmark sheets should be used.

"ALL FOR LOCAL DELIVERY" and "ALL FOR OUT-OF-TOWN DELIVERY." These helpful tags are available at the Post Office, without cost, and will shorten delivery time greatly.

Parcel cost, of course, should be mailed even earlier. The Postmaster recommends December 5 for out-of-state gifts, and December 10 for those with local addresses. But the better.

Size and weight limitation for parcel post very according to place of mailing and destination. In some cases, packages cannot exceed 72 inches in length and girth combined nor 20 pounds in weight. In others, the limits are up to 100 inches combined length and girth and 70 lbs. in weight.

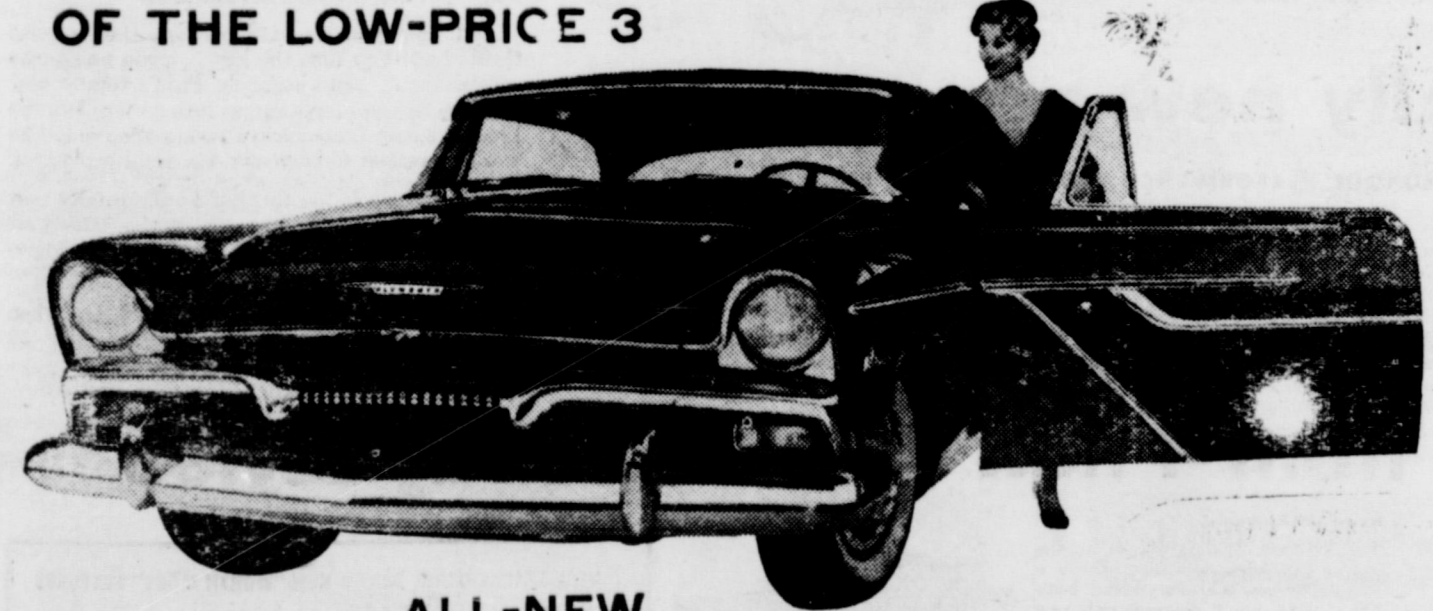

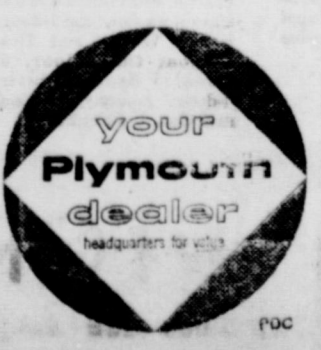

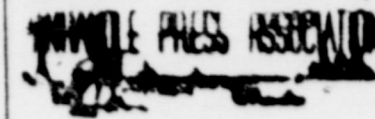

Curves Eliminated Between N. C. Towns

OLD FORT, N.C.—The re-location of a road between here and Ridgecrest is taking the hairpins out of a mountain trail, but the job itself is a hair-raising one.

With an army of bulldozers, tractors, trucks and other earth-moving machines, construction crews are making war against a mountain. In jeeps that scamper over ravines, like mountain goats, engineers direct the operation by radio-telephone.

The road-building project is based on the "leveling off" principle, which means filling in the valleys, as well as cutting through the hills. And in making the necessary "fills" and "cuts," workers must cope with the movement of millions of cubic yards of stone and soil, frequently working at angles that defy the law of gravity.

In the words of one engineer, "The project would be next to impossible were it not for jeeps, which we use for operating in all advanced positions, and for the many trips we must make to and from the field office." The radio-telephone system of communications was also rated as "vitality essential."

When completed this fall, the new road will replace an eight-mile section of U.S. 70, which has 98 dangerous curves and a bad accident record. The new highway will have two 22-foot lanes, no hazardous bends, only 19 curves of the easy-to-take variety, and it will reduce the overall traveling distance by a good two miles under the old route.

The construction firm of W. E. Graham & Sons, Cleveland, N.C., called the road re-location project the biggest ever undertaken on this side of the Mississippi. Pointed out, too, was the fact that the new road will have 10-foot shoulders and a drainage system utilizing heavy-duty culverts up to 54 inches.

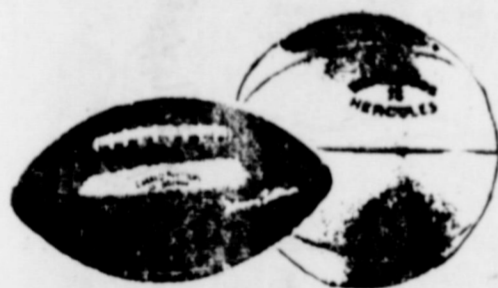

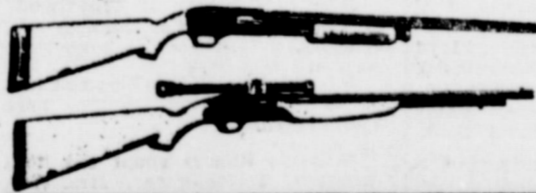

In Car Mishap

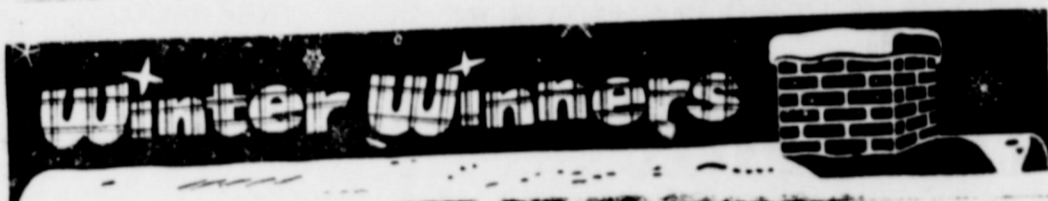
