
# RHEUMATISM IS COSTLY SICKNESS



STRESSES NEED FOR TYPHOID PREVENTION TYPHOID PREVENTION Dr. A. M. Gosch, health supervisor, spent a short time at the finder office Twesday affernoon, and asked that the following article concerning ty-phoid prevention measures be print-ed at this particular time, hince Ce-tober is notorious as being the 'best' month for that disease. If ealso inquired into the mosquito situation, and epon learning that we islul have more of the pests than we need, decided to return early in next week and look for other place. The article mentioned above fol-lows:

The article mentioned above fol-lows: October--the month of typhoid fever-Unless extraordinary precau-tions are taken immediately many, many cases and deaths from this dis-case will occur. It is often a common belief that typhoid fever comes from decay-ing animal or vegetable matter, or from damp basements; cowes and pigs, or other animals. However, this is a false theory. Typhoid fever only comes from human beings who are suffering with this disease, convales-cents, or those who have had typhoid fever and who continue to carry the germs in their bodies. The last men-tioned are called typhoid carriers, and are the cause of the many cases that occur each year. Naturally all persons do not be-come typhoid carriers; only four per-tern is a boing a disease car-rier, and gene about hiergular work, umminful of the fact that he may carcrate typhoid germs, which may be discovered by laboratory examina-tion. These little organisms excreted by These little organisms excreted by

discovered by laboratory examina-tion. These little organisms excreted by the carrier become a mence to the human race and may cause any hum-ber of cases of typhoid fever with-out being detected. Here is where the typhoid fly gets in his dirty work by contaminating milk and food with these bodily wastes. If these bodily wastes are deposited in an open surface privy they are likely to be washed by rains into wells and other sources of water upply and nay be carried by the filthy for from the surface privy, where millions of file feed, to our food in the dining room or kitchen. Unless the typhoid carrier is not extremely careful, after every visit to the top of the food supplies. If he is employed in a dairy, cafe, or road fountin, the danger of infec-ing food products is very great. Here the carrier is not any a me-nace to his own family but to the en-tive commity. No typhoid patient should be dis-missed from medical observation un-taboratory and pronounced free from typhoid germs.
