



In order to better serve the people of this community, it has become necessary for the Home Telephone and Electric Company to ask for a rate increase. An application was made to the City Council for permission to increase telephone rates, and this application was granted by

In order to efficiently serve our patrons, with mounting expenses, higher wages, and high cost of equipment, we had no alternative other than to ask for this increase. It was not made because of any selfish desires on the part of the company, or any individual connected therewith, but was necessary in order to maintain the present system, and to improve and offer more efficient service. We feel that the members of the City Council, in approving our application, were doing what they thought would be to the best interest of the people of Baird, and what they thought was proper and was the only action that would be fitting under the circumstances. If it had not been necessary for the rates to be increased, the Home Telephone and Electric Company would not have asked for same. This company is still operating under rates which were established in the 1920's, while the telephone companies in other cities and towns have already increased their rates.

The company plans to install a modern system, which means the purchasing of new equipment, and the replacing of the present cables and telephones. The system planned would provide automatic ringing and lamp supervision, and all the patron would have to do would be to pick up the receiver and ask for the number, and the operator would plug the number and it would commence ringing, and ring until either the party answers, or the party ringing hangs up. This will require all telephones to be replaced, all cables replaced, new pole line construction, and new switching equipment.




