"Taxpayers receiving tax blanks an dinstructions by mail should not misplace or discord them. should save them for use in filing their returns since the supply of insrtuction pamphlets is limited,"

A study of the new tax forms shows a few changes which make the return easier to complete. A new tax table for married taxpayers filing jointly eliminates the compli cated computation on the return for figuring tax on split incomes.

Farmers who file and pay estimated taxes by the Jan. 15th dead-line may also obtain the forms at district and local offices. post offices have a supply of tax forms.

DO YOU HAVE MITES?

A tiny eight-legged creature so small it can not be seen with the naked eye can make a red-eyed insomniac out of a sound sleeper or send a strong boy or girl into spasms of itching misery.

The next time Johnny comes scratching at his wrist or ankles, think of the "scabies mite." as State Health Department calls this permicious little skin borer.

The mite bores into human skin to lay its eggs, leaving a raised zigzag track near the skin surface to mark its course. Evidence of its presence is often first seen between the fingers, around the wrists or ankles. If left untended it will spread over a large body area. bringing intense itching as it goes.

Scabies is spread when a young female mite leaves one person's body and bores into the skin another. Sometimes the transfer is made during a handshake. Sometimes it spreads thru whole families from a small lesion on one child's hand. The treatment for scables is well known and effective and can be prescribed by the family doctor.

Children with mites should be excluded from school until they have recovered. This is very im-

Cobb. who is married and resides at 4604-B Boston, is a approaching his 30th birthday. He was born and raised in Gaines County where his family settled in 1905. He is a veteran of World War II and a recent graduate of the University of Texas Law School in Austin and is now practicing law in Lubbock.

In 1952, Cobb was elected to the Texas House of Representatives from the 99th Representative District composed of Andrews, Dawson, Gaines and Lynn Counties. He was re-elected in 1954 without opposition. As a Democrat he has always supported the party and has never been cross-filed.

In 1953, Cobb supported a pay in crease for school teachers which was finally passed in 1954. During the 1955 Session of the Legislature, he sponsored and supported measures designed to tighten the management and at the same time extend the Veteran's Land Program. He also served as Chairman of the House Sub-committee that drafted legislation which substantially increased the incorporation re quirements of insurance companies

He states he has never accepted any fee or retainer in connection with Legislation or for appearing

before State Boards or Agencies. Cobb is planning a very active campaign during which he is eager to discuss and give his views on any issue. A card addressed to him in care of the Lubbock National Bank Beilding will bring a personal res

He feels that his two terms in the House of Representatives coupled with his inherent knowledge of the District, well qualify him to capably represent this eleven county district in the State Senate.
