Dr. McDaniel Elected Mayor; New Officials Now in Harness

The city election last Tuesday brought out 185 voters, which, according to the number of poll taxes paid, was heavier than expected. No effort was made by any of the candidates to stir up excitement in pushing their claims for the honors of the offices and the election passed off quietly.

Dr. D. H. McDaniel received the highest number of votes for mayor, and for the coming year will serve the city in that capacity. T. A. Wimberly was elected city marshal and the following were chosen as aldermen: G. A. Haney, E. L. Sorrels, T. B. Bai-

ley, E. S. Scrimshire, and C. I. Kuykendall. Mrs. H. B. Welch was elected sanitary commissioner. The newly elected officers were inducted into office at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon and now have the reins of government in their hands.

Among the first important measures to come before the new administration is the matter of calling an election for voting boards to build waterworks. A committee has been appointed to circulate a petition for a sufficient number of signers asking that an election be called.

Former Board of Trustees Re-elected

The trustee election for the O'Donnell Independent School District brought out more votes than at any former election, there being 174 votes cast. There being no previous nominations made, the ballots were blank and each voter acted upon his own judgment as to who he favored to fill these important positions, and wrote the names on the ballots. The result reflected the confidence of the majority of the voters in the former trustees as to their ability to carry on the school work which is only in its infancy. E. J. Tredway received 162 votes, J. M. Payne 131, H. L. Hohn 111. The other names to receive votes were: J. W. Gates, D. M. Estes, L. M. Williams, Jeff Musick, Jno. R. Burkett and H. R. Eckols.

On account of R. E. Hardberger moving to Lubbock for the spring and summer, it is supposed that he will resign from the board. If he takes this action the board will appoint some one who will act in harmony with the other members and their plans now in formulation will be carried out.

Wyatts Manufacturing Cultivator Attachment

When J. M. Wyatt and son, began the construction of their blacksmith shop many people wondered why they were erecting a building of such large proportions. This fact was brought out this week when the Index man visited the shop and found that a lot of new machinery had been set up, including a big Moloch power hammer. Upon being questioned, the Wyatts stated that they had made a contract for the manufacture and distribution of the Ward Brothers' knife attachment for cultivators for the entire Plains country, and it was for this purpose that they had constructed the large building and installed the labor-saving machinery.

These attachments are blades which take the place of sweeps on cultivators and a thorough test has shown that they are as far ahead of the ordinary cultivator as the cultivator is ahead of the old Georgia stock. The Wyatts expect to turn them out by the thousands and will have agents in the field and place them on every farm on the Plains.

O'Donnell Schools Win High Honors At County Meet

O'Donnell has once more demonstrated the fact that she has the best school in the county by winning the County Inter-Scholastic meet held at Tahoka last Friday and Saturday.

O'Donnell won 120 points, Tahoka 90 points and Wilson 55 points.

O'Donnell won first places in debating, extemporaneous speaking, spelling, girls' tennis doubles, girls' tennis singles, volley ball, the 440 yard dash and the pole vault. Besides this O'Donnell won a number of second, third and fourth places. Florence Henderson, won second place in the Junior girls' declamation contest, and Carl Betenbough won second in the Junior boys' declamation. Elmo Burkett won second place in Senior boys' declamation.

The debates, declamations, extemporaneous speaking, tennis, volley ball, spelling, etc. will be held Friday the 17th. The track and field events and base ball will be held Saturday the 18th.

Good Rain Covers Part of O'Donnell's Trade Territory

Raining all around and sprinkling in the middle was the way Jupiter Pluvius was dishing out the good old sky juice Tuesday afternoon. To the south, east, west and north the country received around an inch, while in O'Donnell only about one-eighth of an inch fell. The heaviest precipitation was reported on O. L. McLendon's place to the south of town, which received three inches. The rain was light at Newmoore twelve miles west and light fall is reported from the immediate vicinity of Tredway, but intermediate points had good

rains. Lamesa and Tahoka report an inch. T Bar to the northwest reported a good rain, O K to the southwest had rain, Randall to the southeast had an inch, Joe Bailey and Draw to the east and northeast had rain.

The farmers are losing no time in shaping their land for planting, while in some instances planting has started.

All the prophets unite in saying that great gobs of sky juice will be precipitated upon the land beginning on the 12th and continuing for several days and a great crop will be made on the Southplains.

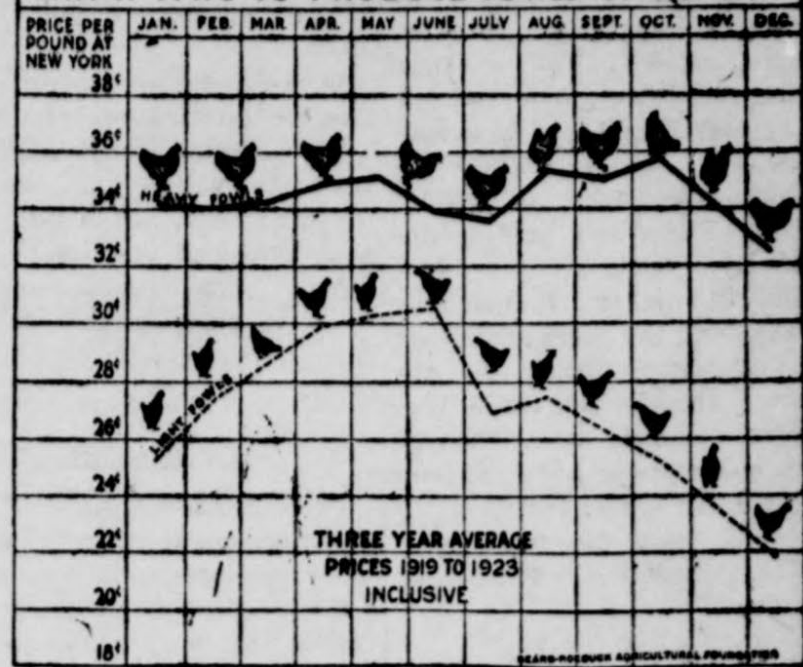

Local Students Make Record In Spelling Contest

In the District Inter-Scholastic meet at Tahoka last Saturday little Alice Busby brought recognition to the Sub-Juniors of the O'Donnell school by spelling 240 words with only one mistake.

This is a record that we are proud of and one that would be hard to beat by a grown up. Her team mate was Oland Yandell who was her close second, misspelling only three words in the contest. Leave it to an O'Donnell boy or girl to make good in any class of society.

WHY IT PAYS TO PRODUCE FOWLS OF QUALITY



It's the extra pound of flesh on the fowl that cheapens production cost and commands a premium price for the poultryman. According to the Sears Roebuck Agricultural Foundation the extra pound can be put on for from 5 to 7 cents, which increases the value of each pound to the consumer by making the entire carcass more plump and attractive, so it commands a fancy price over lighter birds. Heavy hens sell from 5 to 11 cents more than light hens. It's true all down the line—turkeys, ducks, capons, hens and young fry—the extra pound brings the extra dollar.

Over a period of three years the New York market shows heavy fresh-killed milk-fed fowls or hens weighing 5 pounds or over to average from 4 to 11 cents higher per pound than the light fowls weighing 3 pounds. The five-year average for the month of September shows the heavy fowls to average 9 cents over the light weight, the margin broadening during October and November, reaching its height in December, when the heavy fowls range to 11 cents a pound over the light weights.

The average weight of the ordinary fowl as it comes from the farm is 3 1/2 to 4 pounds. The poultryman with the eye for business will add an extra pound or so and receive the top prices. The farmer who takes thin, underfed poultry to market is beating himself.
