### Six Giant Pumps **Will Aid Coulee**

### Plan to Water 400,000 Acres Of Dry - Farmed Land And Sagebrush.

GRAND COULEE, WASH .- Six water pumps-most powerful and ever built-are planned to be installed to pour out a life-giv-ing stream over 400,000 acres of sagebrush and dry-farmed land in south central Washington.

As work is rushed on Grand Coulee dam's irrigation system, two California firms have begun manufacture of the pumps, a job they bid on jointly. Costing \$1,062,975, the giants will be built by the Pelton Water Wheel company of San Fran-cisco and the Byron Jackson Pump company of Los Angeles.

They'll be driven by 65,000-horsepower electric motors, Commission er of Reclamation Michael W. Straus said. Each pump will be capable of lifting 12,000 gallons of water per second to the height of

#### Co-operated in Design.

In designing pumps of such unprecedented size, the bureau had the help of the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena. Its engineers worked with those of the bureau at Denver in conducting the scientific research, experimentation and laboratory tests required in perfecting the designs.

The six pumps, forming a battery, will be installed in a plant built on a rock shelf of the canyon wall, upstream from the dam. Each pump, with its motor installation, will be approximately 50 feet high. Ten of them operating simultaneously for 18 minutes could pump the equiva-lent of a gallon of water for every man, woman and child in the United

The first two pumps are scheduled for delivery early in 1948, and the remaining four later that year. Because no pumps approaching the size of the Grand Coulee equipme have ever been constructed, the manufacturers will build a reducedscale model which will undergo extensive hydraulic tests. Performance of the model as indicated in the tests will be used as a basis for approval of the pump designs.

### War Halted Work.

The pumps will be an integral part of the water distribution system for the Columbia basin project now being developed by the bureau of reclamation to harness the Pacific Northwest's mightiest river for irrigation, power production and flood control.

A million acres of arid land will be irrigated with water stored in the 150-mile-long reservoir of the dam when the project is completed. Work on the irrigation system was stopped by the war, but the bureau now has launched an expanded construction program aimed at providing facilities for the irrigation of the 400,000 acres by 1950 or 1951.

Grand Coulee was nearly completed in 1942 and its partially completed plan helped tremendously in the power output for war industries.

#### British to Train Young Women Police Careers

LONDON. - Since there is no Sherlock Holmes around to clear up current crime mysteries, Englishpolice authorities have resorted to there will be less meats, poultry and new methods in an effort to check the postwar crime wave.

One method calls upon attractive young women to train in the Criminal Investigation department college for employment as qualified 'plain clothes' detectives, sniffing out crime in the English provinces. "Plain clothes" is a deceptive term, since these female crimechasers, who receive the same pay as police women, will get a special clothing allowance, with coupons.

Twenty-one English girls already have entered the C. I. D. college, with dozens to follow. Before entering the college, the future girl detectives must serve an apprentice. ship as a uniformed "flatfoot," helping old ladies cross roads and protecting school children.

### Various Disasters Hit 185 Japanese Workers

TOKYO. - Two mine explosions and a railroad accident left 185 Japanese dead, missing, or injured. At least 7 were killed and 93

injured by an explosion of 2,000 pounds of dyanmite at a mine cable terminal of the Chugai Mining company near Nagano.

Kyodo News agency said 44 persons were missing after an explosion in a pit at the Tagawa coal mine in Kawasaki, on Kyushu.

A Nagoya repatriation train crashed into the rear of a standing train at Ninomiya station killing 7 and injuring 34.

### Westinghouse Boosts Its

Output of Appliances NEW YORK -- Westinghouse Electric corporation has attained about 50 per cent of its prewar production rate on refrigerators and is exceeding its former ou'put of electric irons and roasters, Gwilym A. Price, president, said recently.

The electric appliance division is turning out approximately 1,000 refrigerators a day and about 3,000 of the smaller units daily.

### 2,000 Aliens Daily Sneaking into U.S.

### Riffraff of Many Countries Finding Their Way In.

MIAMI, FLA.-Thousands of aliens have poured into this country illegally since close of the war. They still are pouring in at the rate of 2,000 a day.

This is the estimate of United States Attorney General Clark, who said in a statement that of the 60,000 who entered this country unlawfully in a month 30,000 were arrested by the immigration and naturalization services, better known as the border patrol.

The aliens picked up in the last six months, either unlawfully in this country or attempting to enter, included criminals, stowaways, smuggled aliens and the riffraff of many

In the Southeast, with its long coastline and proximity to islands of the Caribbean, the number of aliens arrested has jumped 800 per cent in recent years.

Deserting seamen of every na tionality form the largest group of illegal entrants in the southeastern states. Large numbers of aliens of many nationalities also ship in from Agricultural workers, brought into the country by the war man power commission, who desert their jobs form another large group.

In 1938, the border patrol apprehended 803 aliens in the Atlanta district, which includes eight southeastern states. In the last six months the number totaled 3,138. It the present trend continues, more than 6,000 will be picked up in this district alone this year.

The border patrol has increased its staff in the Southeast from 50 agents in 1938 to 110 now.

These men patrol 60,000 miles a month in the area between the eastern boundary of Louisiana and the northern boundary of South Carolina. This area ranks next to the Mexican border in the number of aliens arrested.

### Find Uranium Ore in Krupp Plant Ruins

ESSEN, GERMANY.-British military government authorities disclosed that three-quarters of a ton of uranium ore, an ingredient of the atomic bomb, had been discovered in the devastated Krupp munitions works here.

These officials expressed the opinion that the Krupp firm used uranium oxide experimentally to produce a special hard steel for warheads on projectiles. The ere, found in a shed which was blasted by heavy bombs, has been shipped to England. Its retention in Germany is forbidden under the Potsdam agreement.

#### Still Less Food for 12 Months, Anderson Says

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Americans are in for a slimmer diet during the next 12 months compared with amounts they ate in the past

This advance picture of the nation's food supply was provided recently by Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson.

Taking into account present production prospects and military and foreign demands, Anderson said eggs, wheat products, dried fruits and dry peas, but more canned fruits and juices and more canned vegetables and vegetables juices. The supply of food fats and oilsnow far short of demand-is expected to be about the same.

The secretary looked only six months ahead in forecasting supplies of dairy products. He predicted a very short supply of butter, and about the same amounts of cheese, canned milk and dried milk as were available in the same period last year.

#### Death of Famous Flier Is Blamed on Rift

LAS VEGAS, NEV .- Alex Papana, 40, renowned flier and former personal pilot to King Carol of Romania, apparently died a suicide because of his wife's divorce plans, Clark county authorities said.

Papana's body was found in a desert ravine, 15 miles southwest of here. Two suicide notes were found in the pocket of his blue jacket. Search for Papana started when

his coupe, containing a note ad-dressed to "Jean," was found parked on the Las Vegas-Los Angeles highway. The body was found about three miles from the car.

### ANALYZE YOURSELF

In some cases of mental ills. the psycho-analyst can be of great assistance. It has become the fashion, however, for discontented, unhappy people to turn to psycho-analysis as the great cure-all of the age. It is nothing of the sort, says Miss Norris. It has a limited use. Patients must be co-operative. The practitioner must be skilled and sympathetic. Improvement often takes a long

Most people do not need the services of a psycho-analyst so much as they need common sense and a little soul-searching, continues Miss Norris, Generally the cause of the difficulty is well known. It may be extravagance, or jealousy, or a desire for dominance. In any case, the psychoanalyst can do little more than point the trouble. He cannot make the necessary changes in the individual's character or circumstances.

Often a husband and wife can solve their imaginary mental problems by a frank talk. Whether the difficulty arises over money, or relatives, or some personal fault, the solution can be found by bringing it out into the open. There is seldom any use going to a high-priced psychoanalyst. Better solve your own problems, concludes Miss Norris,

your money problem on a sensible basis, and then both of you stick to your bargain, and with the money saved on the psycho-analyst go to dinner and the theater together.

A secondary great cause of married distress is jealousy. "Jon't give each other cause; that is the simple cure, and that is all the scientist can say. But if there is cause, a psycho-analyst can't cure it. If the grass-widow in your husband's of fice really has matrimonial designs on him, having the situation analyzed won't heip. After the most skillful handling, the facts will remain the same; he is making love to another woman.

Jealousy was the basic trouble with a man I knew, according to the expensive psycho-analyst he consult-The analyst told him that he had been jealous of his father and mother, his sisters and brothers, his teachers and associates. This did not, however, help him with his wife who shortly afterward justified his jealousy by going off with another

Jealousy is a sin, and so are unkindness, domestic injustices, extravegance, waste, penurlousness nagging, drink-all the other ills to which marriage stands heir. Sin is cured by grace, not by analysis. Drinking and gambling husbands know what's wrong, without long luxurious talks about it. Scolding, wasteful wives are perfectly aware why there are always storms over the household bills. Mothers and lathers who quarrel before the children, know why Joan is nervous and shy, and Tom completely unmanageable. It would save some of them a lot of money if they looked into their own hearts before laying them bare to a complete stranger.


Braille Translator

According to Scott Chambers. president of New Castle's City Plan commission, "this tended to change the sense of values of the people, who became more interested in getting than in giving, more in what they had than what they were." There were fewer music and art teachers in the town's schools in 1940 than in 1904.

Scan Civic Needs.

So, in 1942, there was held a civic clinic in the form of public meetings whereby more than 1,000 people helped to figure out what their town needed. Better housing, more adequate parks, auditorium, new hotel, airport, community cen-ter, physical and moral clean-up were on the list.

It all spelled a job for a planning mmission. Speakers were engaged civic group meetings. Reports of the talks were carried in ocal papers. The mayor named a commission. Members read good books and pamphlets for self-education and employed the services of qualified architects. All the forces went to work for a New Castle that "would give its people both the op-portunity of an industrial city and the charm and ease of life in a small town."

#### Foresee Future Growth.

The program is based on analysis of problems and outline of purpose. While some of it is being carried out, the rest still is in the planning stage. With more than a dozen substantial manufacturing firms to fts credit, the city looks to brisk business and well-balanced growth in the years ahead.

A place where parking facilities are adequate is being substituted for a business district where traffic jams the streets. Quarters that will permit good health and induce good citizenship are replacing blighted areas and local public works projects are part of a general scheme for community developments. There is no leaf-raking in new goals for New Castle.

JESUS AND HOME RELATIONSHIPS

LESSON TEXT-Exodus 20:12: Mark 9-13; Luke 2:51, 52; Epheslans 6:1-4. MEMORY SELECTION—Honor thy famer and thy mother; that thy days may be ong upon the land which the Lord thy God iyeth thee.—Exodus 20:12.

Home-that place so dear to the heart of each one of us-is even more precious in the sight of God. He is concerned about our homes and those who live in them.

Right relationship between children and parents have much to do with the peace and prosperity of a community and a nation. Experience has demonstrated that to be true, but even more basic is the fact that it is in accord with the promise of God.

One of the sad breakdowns in modern life is that of proper honor and obedience to parents by children. In all too many homes God's order has been reversed and instead of honoring and obeying their parents, children (both young and old) have taken the place of "boss," and mother and father must obey if they want peace and rest.

The problem of juvenile delinquency, or perhaps we should say more correctly, parental delinquency, is right on our doorsteps now. That means that the need for our lesson is both great and acute. The future happiness of hundreds of thousands of children and the present welfare of thousands of neglected and boss-ridden parents will depend on the intelligence and faithfulness with which this lesson is taught in our churches, and the honesty of heart with which we all receive its truth.

I. The Responsibility Stated (Exod. 20:12). "Honor thy father and thy moth-

er"-how good, and substantial, and those words sound. We are told by Paul that this is the "first commandment with prom-ise" (Eph. 6:1-3). The Lord was not making a bargain with man, or seeking to draw out obedience by a prize, but there is obviously a great reward in the observing of this com-

mafidment. Then too as the children of God we are such) through Jesus Christ, the first and most important consideration to come before us is, What is the mind and will of the Maker of us all regarding this matter of the relationship between parents and children? His words are plain: we are to "honor" our fathers and our mothers.

The word "honor" carries with it great many things, but perhaps the three outstanding elements are respect, obedience and affection. But men do not wish to follow God's direction, so we see next

II. The Responsibility Evaded

(Mark 7:9-13). Such an important commandment naturally held a high place in the thinking of the community. To vio-late it involved a measure of shame which men sought to avoid. So the Jews of Christ's day devised a scheme which made it possible for a man to appear to be very religious even as he deprived his parents of the honor and help to which they

were entitled by the law of God. The man who did not wish to support his aged and needy parents could entirely evade that God-given responsibility by declaring that his property was "Corban"; that is, dedicated by a vow to God. Thereafter no matter how great was the need of his parents they could receive nothing, and yet he could keep it and use it for himself.

Thus do men make "the word of God of none effect" (v. 13) through their traditions. The method differs but the spirit persists even in our day.

Jesus made short work of such trickery and evasion. He declared their man-made creeds and traditions to be simply a means of making the command of God of none effect. Once more he condemns that formal religious observance which serves as a cloak for sin and

III. The Responsibility Fulfilled (Luke 2:51-52; Eph. 6:1-4).

The manner in which children should be obedient to their parents and honor them in the home is beautifully exemplified in the life of our Lord, living as a boy in Nazareth. In the home the growing youth finds the best place for normal, well-

rounded development (v. 52). There is no substitute for the home. The words of the Holy Spirit through Paul in Ephesians 6:1-4 stress the same truth and enlarge


upon it. This matter of honoring and obeying parents "is right," says Paul. It is the Lord's way, but it is also that which commends itself to every right-thinking person.

There is tremendously important truth on the other side of the picture. Parents are not to provoke

their children to anger, to disre-spect or disobedience.

May God help us who are parents that we may take to heart this part of our lesson. Our children are our most valuable possession.





Here's Meat for Your Table

Choice Ways with Meat

The large amounts of cattle butchered recently mean more meat on your table, and for many of us, it will mean rounding up those delectable, mouth-watering recipes that make meat so good to eat. There's not meat to waste, but

you'll be able to find a variety of cuts with which I'd suggest you do your very best. Cook it

carefully so as not to shrink it or dry it out. Season it well and you'll give the family something to cheer about.

First we'll start off with some very flavorful beef recipes. One uses sour cream which will make rich, delicious gravy along with the meat, and the other uses good seasonings which will do the most for the cut of meat.

\*Swiss Steak in Sour Cream. (Serves 6 to 8) 3 pounds round steak (2 inches

Flour, salt, pepper, fat 2 onions, sliced

15 cup water
15 cup sour cream
2 tablespoons grated cheese
14 teaspoon paprika

Dredge steak with flour and season with salt and pepper. Brown on both sides in hot fat. Add remaining ingredients, cover pan closely and simmer slowly until meat is

tender, about 21/2 hours. Beef a la Mode. ounds beef rump roast

i pound fat salt pork Pepper l clove garlie, chopped Salt, cayenne, flour

2 onions, sliced 4 tablespoons bacon drippings 1 bay leaf

Cut deep gashes in beef. Slice salt pork very thin, rub with pepper and place in gashes of meat. Rub meat with garlic, salt and

cayenne and dredge with flour. Brown onions in bacon drippings, remove onions and place meat in kettle. Place onions, bay leaf and parsley over the meat. Cover and cook slowly until well browned on one side. Turn and brown on other sides. Add vegetables and cook un-til well browned. Add boiling wa-ter, cover closely and simmer for 3 hours or longer, adding more water if necessary. Serve meat with vegetables and gravy.

You should be able to find plenty of pork on the market, and there's no more tempting way of preparing pork chops than with apple stuffing. Here's how it's done:

LYNN SAYS:

Pan-Broiling Meat: If you don't have a broiler and want to broil meats, use a heavy, pre-heated frying pan. Do not use any fat in the pan, except when broiling ground meat. Brown meat in the hot pan on both sides. Season only after it is browned, otherwise the salt will draw out the rich juices.

Never add water or cover the pan for pan broiling. The idea is to make it as close to oven broiling as possible.

When meat is browned, turn down the heat to finish cooking. Turn occasionally to cook evenly, and keep pouring off the fat as it accumulates so that the meat will broil rather than fry.

Fork Chops With Apple Stuffing. (Serves 6)

6 thick pork chops

1 slice salt pork, diced
½ cup bread or cracker crumbs
2 teaspoons finely chopped parsley
3 tart apples, diced
¼ cup chopped celery
¼ cup chopped onion

i cup sugar Salt and pepper

Have pork chops cut one to two inches thick, with a pocket cut from the inside. Fry salt pork until crisp, then add celery, and onion and cook until tender. Add diced apples, sprinkle with sugar and cover. Cook slowly until they have a glazed appearance. Add bread crumbs and season. Stuff into pocket of pork chops. Season chops with salt and pepper and brown on both sides in hot skillet. Reduce heat, add a few tablespoons water, cover and cook slowly until done, for about 11/2

Braised Veal Steak.

(Serves 4) pounds veal steak egg, saghtly beaten

tablespoons milk cups crushed cereal flakes 4 tablespoons fat 1 small can mushrooms

Have steak cut one inch thick cut into pieces for serving. Dip into mixture of egg and milk, then in cereal flakes. Brown in hot fat and cover with mushrooms and their liquid. Cover tightly and cook slowly until tender, about 45 Thicken the liquid for minutes.

Place the rolls in a greased pan, add tomatoes, water and sufficient stock to half cover the rolls. Cook in a moderate (350 degree) oven or

> Lamb en Brochette. (Serves 6)

until rice is tender.

2 pounds lamb steak 3 tablespoons cooking oil 6 tablespoons lemon juice onion, minced 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 pound mushrooms

Cut lamb into 1-inch squares. Combine oil, lemon juice, onion and salt and pour over lamb and let stand several hours. Drain lamb and place meat on skewers alternately with mushroom caps. Place 4 inches below moderate broiler heat and broil 12 to 15 minutes, turning several times.

Remember that uncooked meat will keep safely only a few hours unless you put it in a refrigerator or very cold place. Ground meat needs colder storage and keeps a shorter time than unground meat. Leftover cooked meat also needs storing in a

cold place.
