Workers and self-employed men nd women under 65 who have een totally disabled for at least six ths and who have worked in s covered by social security for ubstantial time may benefit n an entirely new provision in Social Security Act," Mr John Hutton, manager of the Lubbock exas social security district office t Room 202 Veterans Adm. Bldg.

This amendment applies equally those who are now disabled and those who become disabled in future. Similarly, some reti ed orkers who are now receiving onthly social security checks may favorably affected if they are still isabled as the result of a disallity which began before they

This does not mean that cash ayments based on disability are ow possible under the social securprogram," Mr. Hutton cautioned does mean, however, for the st time, that periods of prolonged disability will not count against ome wage earners or self-employpersons in figuring the amount of their monthly wage on which old age and survivors insurance paynts are based.'

Mr. Hutton explained that under e social security law in effect be-re the 1954 Amendments the erage monthly wage had to be gured from a specified starting ate until the worker became 65 or Those who could not work a long period of time because were disabled had their avege earnings deduced by these perds of no earnings or of low earn-gs. In addition, the months of disility also had to be counted guring whether or not the individal had worked sufficiently long in bs covered by the social security w to be eligible for any old-age or urvivors insurance benefit.

"Under the new law, average earnings and eligibility requirements will not be effected by the period of disability," Mr. Hutton period of disability," Mr. Hutton said. "In effect, this means that he amount of the social security at death or at 65 would not be impairby inability to work during ngthy disability periods."

Qualification for use of the "dis-bility freeze" depends on these

#### Life After 40

From a health standpoint. life after forty begins to be more complicated for the average individual. According to information from the State Department of Health, principal health foes confronting people in middle life are heart disease, cancer, kidney disease, high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, apoplexy, diabetes and arthritis.

Middle aged people of today are healthier than were those of preceding generations, and the present generation, when they reach middle age, should enjoy even better health than their parents of today

Medical care in middle life has two important phases. The first is going to the doctor at regular intervals for a complete physical checkup, whether or not there have been symptoms that suggest the need for medical attention. The second is prompt attention to any illness which may mean the difference between prompt recovery and .con-tinued good health and prolonged invalidism. It is difficult which of these phases is the more

It is logical that men and women who faithfully pursue the habit of regular health examinations and who follow the advice arising from them tend to live longer, more satis factorily, and freer from disease than those who simply take chance and go to the docter only when pain or disability forces them to give up their normal activities. Many diseases of middle age respond to treatment in early stages whereas if neglected until later

#### TAX QUIZ

The purpose of filing a declaration of estimated tax is to provide a basis for paying currently any income taxes due over and above any tax whih might have been withheld from such income as salaries and

Every citizen or resident of the United States shall make a declaration of estimated tax if it can be reasonably be expected that gross income will bring them within the following requirements:

1. Single individuals (not heads of households or married persons not entitled to tile a joint declaration of estimaedt tax) - These individuals must file a declaration of estimated tax if it ca be reasonably be expected that gross income, regardless of source, will exceed \$5,000 or if it can be expected that income from soures other than wages subject to withholding will exceed \$100 and total gross income will exceed the sum of \$600, multiplied by the number of allowable exemptions, plus \$400.

2. Heads of households or surviving spouses (applicable only to surviving spouses for first two years succeeding spouse's death) - These persons must file a declaration if it can reasonably be expected that gross income, regardless of source, will exceed \$10.000 or if it can be expected that income from sources other than wages subject to with-holding will exceed \$100 and total gross income will exceed the sum of \$600, multiplied by the number of

allowable exemptions, plus \$400. Married individuals (entitled to file jointly) -These persons must file a declaration if the combined income of both spouses can be expected to exceed \$10,000 or if it can be expected that income from sources other than wages subject to withholding will exceed \$100 and total gross income will exceed the sum of \$600, multiplied by the number of allowable exemptions. plus \$400

When determining whether you must file a declaration, you should exclude from gross income all income that is specifically excluded form tax, such as social security benefits, interest or municipal bonds, and military mustering-out

Declaration of estimated tax are filed on Form 1040-ES with the District Director of Internal Revenue in the district where you re-

Declarations of estimated tax for the calendar year 1955 are required to be filed by April 15, 1955 In the case of a farmer who derives at least two-thirds of his gross income from farming, a declaration of estimated tax may be filed and the full amount of the estimated tax may be paid on or before January 15 of the year 1956 in lieu of the time prescribe for other tax-

#### Spiderweb Business **Proves Profitable** In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.-Such precision devices as gunsights, astronomical instruments and survey nstruments require crossed hairs." Mrs. Nan Songer supplies spider webs with which the "hairs"

are made. Her business goes back to her hildhood when, because of her frail health, her parents encouraged her to be out-of-doors as uch as possible. She became inerested in insect life-first moths and butterflies, then crickets, and nally spiders.

By 1939, when 37, she had been experimenting with extracting the silken web from spiders for several years. The government was quiring whether the web would produced commercially.

Human hairs had been utilized or years in gunsights, bombsights and periscopes, but were susceptible to extreme temperatures. They ontracted and broke in the subero cold of the stratosphere-and sagged in high temperatures. An extremely fine, sturdy and elastic strand was needed-and the spider web was the answer.

Using fine needles, Mrs. Songer draws the silk from one of the spider's spinnerets and reels it on metal frame for shipment.

There are many excellent and graphic ways to prove the rotation the earth. There is the Foucault pendulum. There is the centrifugal effects of the earth's rotation, hich accounts for the uphill flow of the Mississippi River, and there the apparent rotation of the

The first proof of the earth's rotation was furnished in 1679 when the English physicist Hooke verified a prediction made by Sir Isaac Newton. Newton held that, f the earth rotates, a body on ts surface will not be traveling as ist as a body in the top of a high for the latter body will be

farther from the axis of rotation. He computed that at the equator ball dropped from a 400-foot tower will land more than 14 inches east of the point where it would have fallen if the earth were not

This rotation of the earth produces other effects as well. The Earth is not spherical but has an 'equatorial bulge'', just like people. That equatorial bulge makes the axis of the Earth wobble, so that the north pole is not always pointed to the same part of the sky. Because of this slow change, n about 14,000 years the bright star Vega will be the pole star, instead of the present Polaris.




