S. S. Facts Given

Workers and self-employed men and women under 65 who have been totally disabled for at least six months and who have worked in jobs covered by social security for a substantial time may benefit from an entirely new provision in the Social Security Act. Mr. John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Texas social security district office at Room 292 Veterans Adm. Bldg. said.

This amendment applies equally to those who are now disabled and to those who become disabled in the future. Similarly, some retired workers who are now receiving monthly social security checks may be favorably affected if they are still disabled as the result of a disability which began before they reached 65.

"This does not mean that cash payments based on disability are now possible under the social security program," Mr. Hutton cautioned. "It does mean, however, for the first time, that periods of prolonged disability will not count against some wage earners or self-employed persons in figuring the amount of their monthly wage on which old age and survivors insurance payments are based."

Mr. Hutton explained that under the social security law in effect before the 1954 Amendments the average monthly wage had to be figured from a specified starting date until the worker became 65 or died. Those who could not work over a long period of time because they were disabled had their average earnings deducted by these periods of no earnings or of low earnings. In addition, the months of disability also had to be counted in figuring whether or not the individual had worked sufficiently long in jobs covered by the social security law to be eligible for any old-age or survivors insurance benefit.

Under the new law, average earnings and eligibility requirements will not be affected by the period of disability," Mr. Hutton said. "In effect, this means that the amount of the social security at death or at 65 would not be impaired by inability to work during lengthy disability periods."

Qualification for use of the "disability freeze" depends on these factors:

1. The worker must be totally disabled by a medically-determinable illness, injury, or other physical or mental impairment which can be expected to be of long continued and indefinite duration. This condition must have existed for at least 6 months and he must still be disabled at the time of filing his application for a determination of disability.

2. The worker must have been employed for a substantial period of time in occupation covered by the social security law before onset of his disability. A "substantial period of time" means 5 years of coverage out of the 10 years before the discovery of which time 1-2 years of coverage must have been in the 5 years prior to disability.

"A worker under 65 who believes he qualifies under these conditions should get in touch with his nearest social security office to file an application for a determination of disability," M. Hutton advised.

Life After 40

From a health standpoint, life after forty begins to be more complicated for the average individual. According to information from the State Department of Health, the principal health foes confronting people in middle life are heart disease, cancer, kidney disease, high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, apoplexy, diabetes and arthritis.

Middle aged people of today are healthier than were those of preceding generations, and the present generation, when they reach middle age, should enjoy even better health than their parents of today.

Medical care in middle life has two important phases. The first is going to the doctor at regular intervals for a complete physical check-up, whether or not there have been symptoms that suggest the need for medical attention. The second is prompt attention to any illness which may mean the difference between prompt recovery and prolonged invalidism. It is difficult to say which of these phases is the more important.

It is logical that men and women who faithfully pursue the habit of regular health examinations and who tend to live longer, more satisfactorily, and freer from disease than those who simply take a chance and go to the doctor only when pain or disability forces them to give up their normal activities. Many diseases of middle age respond to treatment in early stages whereas if neglected until later stages they often cause permanent invalidism and even death.

For persons over forty especially the State Department of Health recommends regular physical examinations and prompt medical attention for any and all illnesses.

TAX QUIZ

The purpose of filing a declaration of estimated tax is to provide a basis for paying currently any income taxes due over and above any tax which might have been withheld from such income as salaries and wages.

Every citizen or resident of the United States shall make a declaration of estimated tax if it can be reasonably be expected that gross income will bring them within the following requirements:

1. Single individuals (not heads of households or married persons not entitled to file a joint declaration of estimated tax) - These individuals must file a declaration of estimated tax if it can be reasonably be expected that gross income, regardless of source, will exceed \$5,000 or if it can be expected that income from sources other than wages subject to withholding will exceed \$100 and total gross income will exceed the sum of \$600, multiplied by the number of allowable exemptions, plus \$400.

2. Heads of households or surviving spouses (applicable only to surviving spouses for first two years succeeding spouse's death) - These persons must file a declaration if it can reasonably be expected that gross income, regardless of source, will exceed \$10,000 or if it can be expected that income from sources other than wages subject to withholding will exceed \$100 and total gross income will exceed the sum of \$600, multiplied by the number of allowable exemptions, plus \$400.

3. Married individuals (entitled to file jointly) - These persons must file a declaration if the combined income of both spouses can be expected to exceed \$10,000 or if it can be expected that income from sources other than wages subject to withholding will exceed \$100 and total gross income will exceed the sum of \$600, multiplied by the number of allowable exemptions, plus \$400.

When determining whether you must file a declaration, you should exclude from gross income all income that is specifically excluded from tax, such as social security benefits, interest on municipal bonds, and military mustering-out pay.

Declaration of estimated tax are filed on Form 1040-ES with the District Director of Internal Revenue in the district where you reside.

Declarations of estimated tax for the calendar year 1955 are required to be filed by April 15, 1955. In the case of a farmer who derives at least two-thirds of his gross income from farming, a declaration of estimated tax may be filed and the full amount of the estimated tax may be paid on or before January 15 of the year 1956 in lieu of the time prescribe for other taxpayers.

Builds Own Home; Beats Housing Shortage

BERLIN, N.H.—One way to beat the housing shortage—if you have the time and talent, backbone and brain—is to go out in the woods and start building your own home with your own hands.

That's what Bob Hughes, Berlin artist and high school art instructor, decided to do about two years ago, and if all goes well, he hopes to move in with his wife and children before long.

The 36-year-old jack-of-all-trades has been building the new home almost single-handed during summers, weekends, and any spare time he can find.

The front door will have panels of thick pine, recessed and carved by the gifted young artist-teacher-marionette maker into 12 signs of the zodiac, with the panels for another design. The front hall will be paneled in pine some a foot and a half wide. The stairs are huge solid oak blocks.

Bob Hughes is his own architect, designing the house himself and working from his own set of blue-prints. It is a combination of modern and traditional. The living room has a large picture window composed of twelve panes which saves the expense of a single sheet of plate glass, and has the advantage of individuality.

The kitchen will be done in white ash, and has a laundry shoot down into the basement.

Looking tanned and rugged with a crew cut, dungarees and G.I. shoes, Bob didn't think he was doing anything particularly remarkable in building his own house. Although he was about the first landing craft to hit the coast of Normandy on D-Day, he knows he is not the first amateur to build a home for his family in this area. And he pointed out he didn't dig the cellar-hole as he has no intention of installing a furnace and plumbing.

Community Holds Kid's Traffic School

HARVEY, Ill.—The safety committee of this community held children's traffic school recently at a downtown plot. Students were pre-school age through the third grade, and they were taught to be safer pedestrians.

A miniature traffic pattern was drawn on the pavement with black and white, and small-sized toy automobiles were used to simulate life-sized cars. Boys and girls in turns acting as pedestrians, motorists, and traffic officers.

They were aided in reading traffic lights, railroad crossing signs and other warning signals by miniature reproductions of these signs.

AMISH CAPITAL

This Town Has More Buggies Than Autos

ARTHUR, Ill.—On the streets you'll find more horses and buggies than automobiles. The hitch-rack is used every day in the week except Sunday.

For this is the home of one of the larger sects of Amish people in the country. Approximately 1,000 Amish live on the farms near Arthur. They are prosperous, friendly and mind their own business.

But strangers stare at them because the men are whiskered, wear homemade clothing and flat black hats. The women dress just as severely, and keep their heads covered. They dislike the automobile and use the horse exclusively.

Hitch Rack Rules
 Arthur has entire streets where the hitch-rack reigns. Signs are posted, prohibiting autos to pass in these areas. The highways near Arthur are filled with the black-tapped buggies of the Amish farmers.

Strangely the Amish have preserved many Old World traits, yet form a harmonious segment of the area surrounding them. Although Arthur is known as "the heart of Amishland," there has been no friction between the people and their non-Amish neighbors. They are extreme pacifists.

Make Own Clothes
 Mention of the word Amish usually brings to mind a vague mental picture of queer, Quaker-looking people who ride in horse-drawn vehicles and wear plain clothes of their own making.

For nearly a century the Amish lived happily in Pennsylvania. A land shortage drove some of them farther west. Following the Civil War new settlements were made in Canada, Ohio, Indiana, Iowa and Illinois. Since then, many of these sects have modernized and accepted present-day living standards.

But the Amish in the Arthur community are strictly "old order." Although Lancaster county in Pennsylvania still is considered the mother community of the Amish sect, the followers at Arthur are perhaps the purest Amish in existence, and stubbornly resist inroads of modernization. Only adults are permitted to leave the Amish church, for they believe that each person should be convinced in his own mind that he wishes to accept the principles of faith, such a decision not being considered childish.

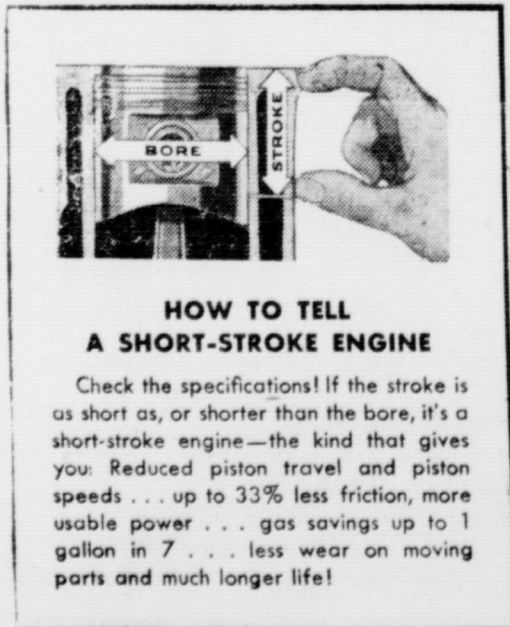

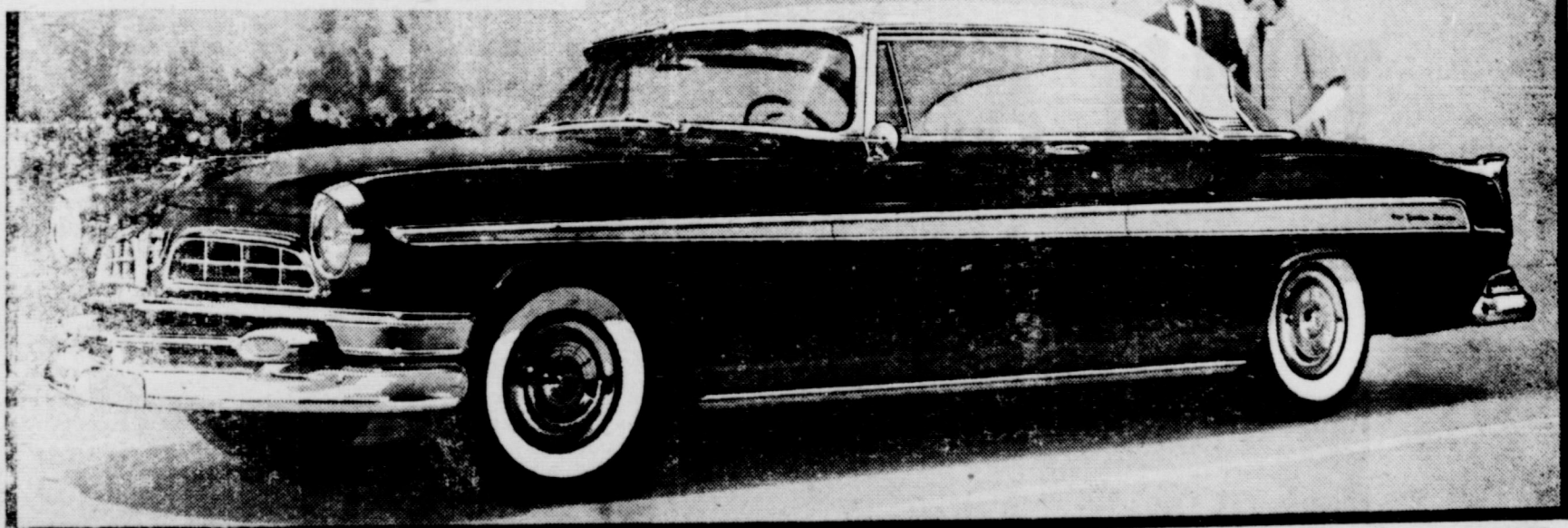

**Commuter Snags Train
But Can't Hold It**

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**Lifeboat Race
Began With Sea
Battles of Old**

NEW YORK—Had they lived centuries ago, seamen who rowed in the International lifeboat race held this year on the Hudson river might have been pulling an oar for their lives in a battle at sea instead of racing against friendly competitors for glory and exercise.

The Winner

While thousands watched from the Manhattan shore, a Norwegian crew beat an American boat by three lengths over a mile course from Grant's tomb to the soldiers and sailors monument at Riverside drive and 89th street, Great Britain, the Netherlands, and Israel trailed in that order.

Roman triremes, the galleys of the Barbary corsairs, the long ships of the Vikings—all were powered in battle maneuvers by oars. Rowers often were convicted criminals or war captives, galley slaves chained to their benches.

Sailing Days

When larger ships were built and sails replaced manpower, seamen still rowed. Oars moved the small boats that shuttled between anchor and shallow beach and towed great square riggers in and out of congested harbors.

Old records of naval battle contain references to instances where rowing boats were launched from warships to tow them to safety or into better position for attack. Oars and brawn took George Washington across the Delaware to surprise the Hessians, helped Sag Harbor whalers to run down their quarry and still help Grand Banks dorymen get about in search of cod.

With rowing a universal skill in the days of sail, it was natural that competition should develop wherever shipping gathered. Writers of the sea speak of gig and whaleboat races between windjammers' men of many nations in such farflung ports as Hong Kong, La Havre, and Valparaiso. There is a record of a rowing race on the Hudson in 1824 between New York ferrymen and a boat's crew from the British frigate Hussar.

This sort of racing, sometimes intentionally international in character but more often a matter of rivalry between individual ships or shipping lines, never became formalized.

MAGNETO CENTER

**Town of 4,700
Makes Vital
Airplane Parts**

SIDNEY, N.Y.—An electronic airplane instrument made in the community of 4,700 population is bringing aviation officials here from all over the world.

So widespread is interest in the instrument—used on airplanes to pinpoint trouble anywhere in the ignition system—that 167 officials representing 43 domestic and foreign airlines plus builders of planes and engines, recently came to watch the electronic units being manufactured here by the scientific magneto division of Bendix Aviation corporation.

Take Over Hotel

Because Sidney has but one small hotel, a nearby resort was taken over in its entirety for the record number of visitors, who conferred for three days on the role of the Sidney-built device in aviation safety and reliability.

In addition to the principal U.S. airlines, such foreign operators as Trans-Canada Airlines, Air France, KLM Royal Dutch Airlines, SABENA Belgian Airlines and Line Aeropostal Venezolana participated in the conference and plant tour.

Ralph S. Damon, president of Trans World Airlines, Inc., said at the meeting that the instrument called an ignition analyzer, is making a major contribution to aviation safety, which has increased 50-fold in 15 years and is expected soon to topple the safety record of any other form of mass transportation.

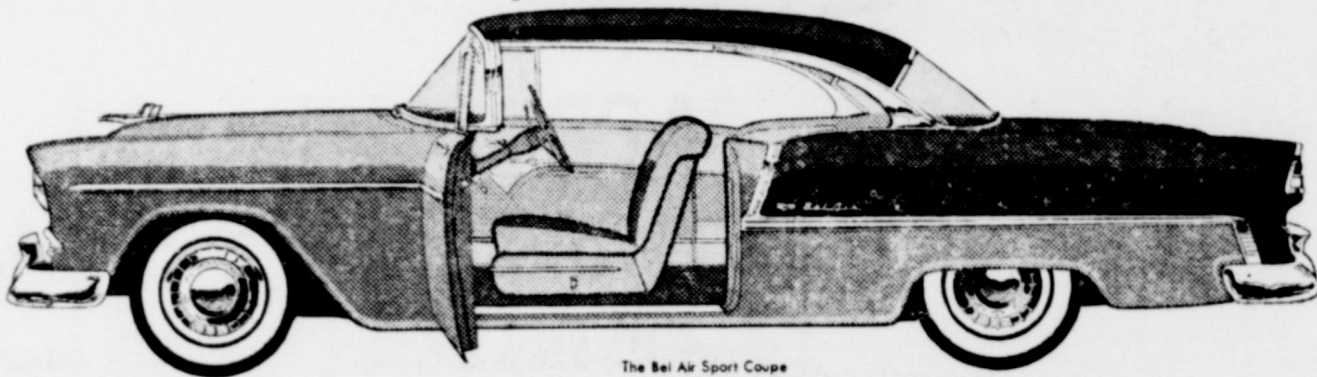

Spiderweb Business Proves Profitable In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.—Such precision devices as gunsights, astronomical instruments and survey instruments require crossed spider webs with which the "hairs" are made.

Her business goes back to her childhood when, because of her frail health, her parents encouraged her to be out-of-doors as much as possible. She became interested in insect life—first moths and butterflies, then crickets, and finally spiders.

By 1939, when 37, she had been experimenting with extracting the silken web from spiders for several years. The government was inquiring whether the web would be produced commercially.

Human hairs had been utilized for years in gunsights, bombsights and periscopes, but were susceptible to extreme temperatures. They contracted and broke in the sub-zero cold of the stratosphere—and sagged in high temperatures. An extremely fine, sturdy and elastic strand was needed—and the spider web was the answer.

Using fine needles, Mrs. Songer draws the silk from one of the spider's spinnerets and reels it on a metal frame for shipment.

FIRST AID

Mining Town Is 'Safety-Wise' All the Year

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo.—Three boys are walking down the main street. School is out and the prospect of the long summer recess makes spirits soar. Playfully, one youngster shoves another. He stumbles, falls against the large plate glass window of a department store and crashes through it.

An instant later, a red fountain spurts from his right arm where a razor-edged piece of glass has slashed through the artery. For a second he stares dumbly at the fast-flowing blood, then runs down the street, crying hysterically.

Springs Into Action
One of his two companions springs into action. He chases his panicked friend, catches him and knocks him to the pavement. Skilled fingers probe the armpit above the wound and the flow of blood stops.

With his finger on the pressure point, the quick-witted youth orders the third boy to summon an ambulance. Had the youngster been ignorant of first aid, his friend could have bled to death in a minute and a half.

This is just one of several examples showing how knowledge of first aid has paid off in Rock Springs, a coal mining town in southwestern Wyoming.

The coal company has the nation's top mine safety record. Recognizing that first aid training is an essential part of any safety program, Union Pacific coal sponsors an annual first aid rally and contest.

This Year's Contest
This year's contest was held in the coal company's Old Timers' association building. The competing teams worked in ten-foot squares, laid out in a circle in the middle of the auditorium floor. At a given signal, each team captain was handed a first aid problem in a sealed envelope.

Interest in the contest is keen, and the awards ceremony late in the afternoon is attended by equals from the girls and loud cheers from the boys. Wrist watches went to the winning junior girls, matched luggage to the senior girls, portable radios to the boys and \$40 to each member of the winning men's team. Lesser prizes went to all other competitors.

EDINBURGH — Stewart clansmen met recently at the site near Ballaehulish, Argyll, where James Stewart was hanged 200 years ago for taking part in the murder of Colin Campbell to protest the innocence of Stewart and to commemorate the bravery with which he met the hangman. An oration was made and the Very Rev. Duncan McInnes, dean of Argyll, held a memorial service.

The Stewarts say that James Stewart was a victim of the most outrageous frameup in history. The murder remains the most celebrated crime case in Scotland.

Stewart was tried by a jury consisting of eleven Campbells and four others and the presiding judge was the chief of the Campbell clan, the Duke of Argyll.

Robert Louis Stevenson immortalized the murder in "Kidnapped."

ISTANBUL—Not even a pair of animal tracks was found by a French expedition which battled its way to the top of Mt. Ararat looking for traces of Noah's Ark.

The expedition, led by Jean de Riquier, polar explorer, hoisted the French flag atop the rugged peak after climbing through snow, rain and heavy winds.

Turkey's big Soviet neighbor charged that neither group really was looking for the Ark but just wanted to peer down at Russian defenses on the other side of the mountain.

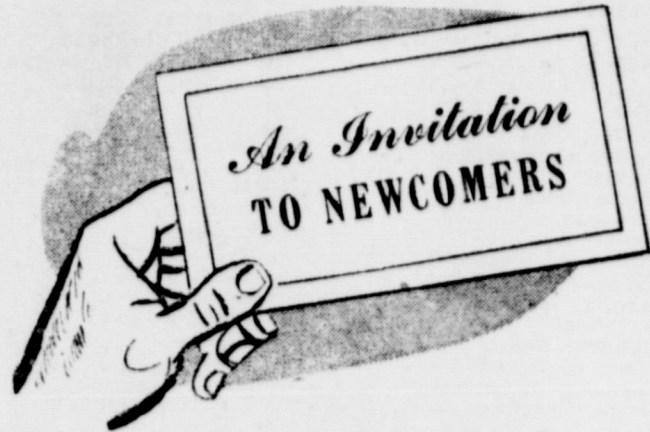

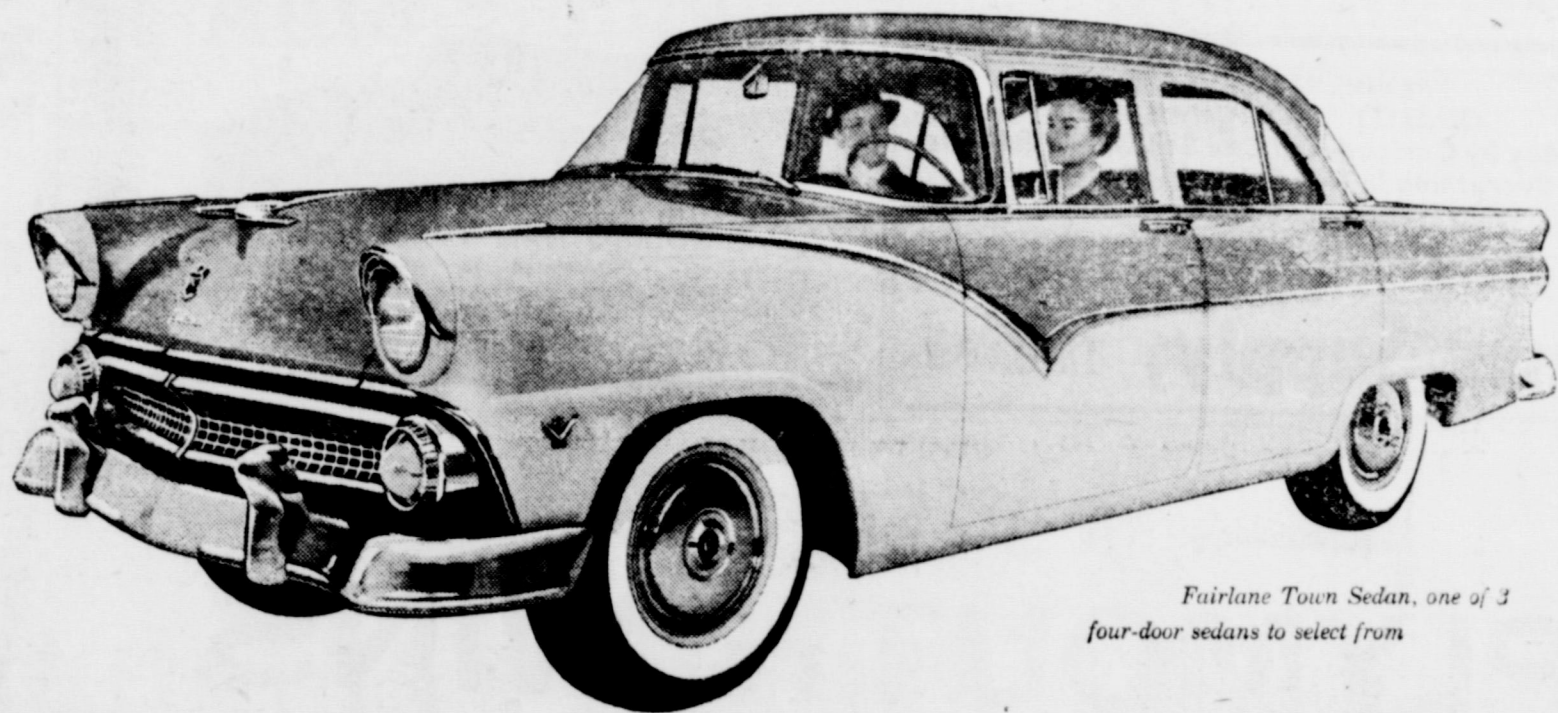

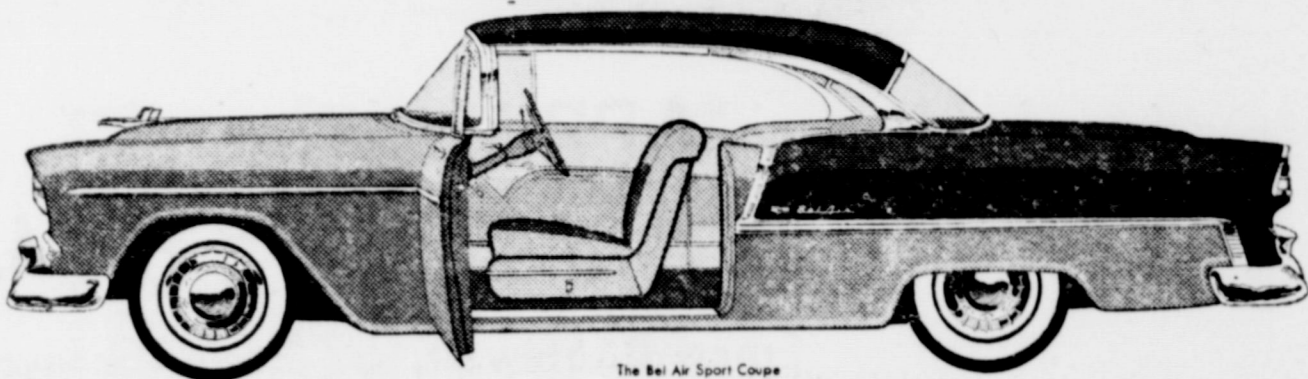

Spiderweb Business Proves Profitable In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.—Such precision devices as gunsights, astronomical instruments and survey instruments require crossed spidars." Mrs. Nan Songer supplies spider webs with which the "spidars" are made.

Mining Town Is 'Safety-Wise' All the Year

ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo.—Three boys are walking down the main street. School is out and the prospect of the long summer recess makes spirits soar. Playfully, one youngster shoves another. He stumbles, falls against the large plate glass window of a department store and crashes through it.

An instant later, a red fountain spurts from his right arm where a razor-edged piece of glass has slashed through the artery. For a second he stares dumbly at the fast-flowing blood, then runs down the street, crying hysterically.

Springs Into Action
One of his two companions springs into action. He chases his panicked friend, catches him and knocks him to the pavement. Skilled fingers probe the armpit above the wound and the flow of blood stops.

With his finger on the pressure point, the quick-witted youth orders the third boy to summon an ambulance. Had the youngster been ignorant of first aid, his friend could have bled to death in a minute and a half.

This is just one of several examples showing how knowledge of first aid has paid off in Rock Springs, a coal mining town in southwestern Wyoming.

The coal company has the nation's top mine safety record. Recognizing that first aid training is an essential part of any safety program, Union Pacific coal sponsors an annual first aid rally and contest.

Planetarium Shows Complex Universe

PHILADELPHIA — The Fair Planetarium show, "Hurling Through Space", shows just how many and how complex the motions of the earth really are.

There are many excellent and graphic ways to prove the rotation of the earth. There is the Foucault pendulum. There is the centrifugal effects of the earth's rotation, which accounts for the uphill flow of the Mississippi River, and there is the apparent rotation of the heavens.

The first proof of the earth's rotation was furnished in 1679 when the English physicist Hooke verified a prediction made by Sir Isaac Newton. Newton held that, if the earth rotates, a body on its surface will not be traveling as fast as a body in the top of a high tower, for the latter body will be farther from the axis of rotation.

He computed that at the equator a ball dropped from a 400-foot tower will land more than 1 1/4 inches east of the point where it would have fallen if the earth were not rotating.

This rotation of the earth produces other effects as well. The Earth is not spherical but has an "equatorial bulge", just like people. That equatorial bulge makes the axis of the Earth wobble, so that the north pole is not always pointed to the same part of the sky. Because of this slow change, in about 14,000 years the bright star Vega will be the pole star, instead of the present Polaris.

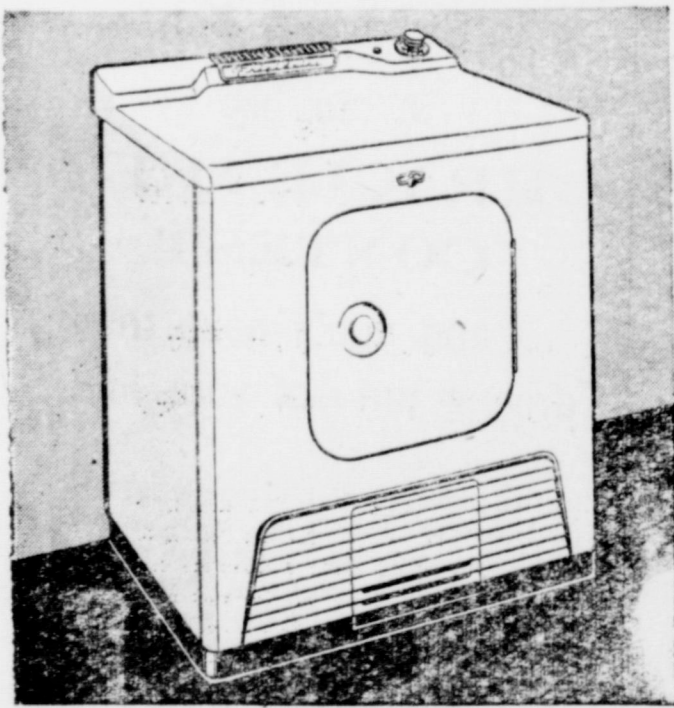
