* TAX QUIZ -0-

O: How does a taxpayer benefit under the new law for 1954 if he has retirement income?

A: A qualified taxpayer may under certain circumstances be entitled to a credit against his tax equal to 20 percent of his retirement income -- not to exceed an amount of \$240.00.

Q: What conditions must be met for a taxpayer to qualify for the re-

tirement income credit A: First, the taxpayer or a deceased spouse of the taxpayer must have received earned income in excess of \$600.00 in each of any ten calendar years prior to the taxable year. These years need not be consecutive. Second, the taxpayer must have income in the taxable year retirement income. Third, the taxpayer must have a tax liability for the current year to which the credit may be ap-

plied Q: Would a widow who was never employed or engaged in business qualify if her deceased husband had received over \$600.00 of earned income in each of ten years prior to the widow's taxable year?

A: Yes. A widow or a widower whose spouse received such earned income is considered to have received earned income. She would qualify because her deceased husband had met the ten-year earned income

Q: Under the community property laws of Texas, would a married woman's portion of her husband's community income vuality her un-der the ten year earned income

A: Yes. Of course her one-half would have to exceed \$600.00 for each of any ten prior years.

S. S. News For Farmers

Most farm operators will be af fected by social security in two ways, beginning January 1, 1955. We have discussed how he will determine and report his own income for social security in previous art-Today, we will endeavor explain his responsibility concerning his hired farm laborers under

the social security laws. The law provides that any farm worker, whether it be outside the farm home or inside, who is paid as much as \$100 in cash wages in a calendar year is covered by social security and such wages must be reported by the farm operator. There is no other test except the receipt of \$100 or more in cash wages These wages are taxable, 2 percent to be collected by the farmer from the worker when he is paid and another 2 percent to be paid by the farm operator when the wages are reported to the Bureau of Internal

Revenue. This means that farmer A must deduct two cents from each dollar of cash wages earned by his hired help; must obtain each worker's social security number and full name from the worker's social security card; and, must report these numbers, names and amounts of wages paid each worker to the government through the Bureau of Internal Revenue, periodically. Along with the reports, Farmer A will send the tax collected from workers, together with a matching amount for himself. Only cash wages are to be reported and taxed.

Should farmer A hire a hand and be uncertain whether or not hand will receive as much as \$100 cash wages, he is permitted to deduct the tax from the hand's wages anyhow, and if less than \$100 paid, give the tax back to the worker when he leaves Farmer A's employment.

This coverage of farm labor is compulsory on both the farmer and the farm worker. Forms on which the reports are to be made will be furnished by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, along with instructions on how to complete the forms Your social security office will also assist you, if requested..

DENTAL WORK IMPORTANT

There are some 300 million denren, and the backlog is increasing at the rate of about 40 millin a year The toll of dental disease is a particular tragedy because the knowledge to reduce the high incidence of tooth decay is at hand, according to Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health

One of the chief reasons for the decay toll is the heavy consumption of sweets, he said. Sweets are readily fermentable and offer a good nutrient for bacteria to manufacture enamel-destroying acid.

Dr. Holle urged that parents offer fruit or popcorn or cheese to children instead of jams and pastries for between- meal snacks.

The ritual of toothbrushing is still one of the most effective methods of preventing decay, Dr. Holle said. However, he added, the brushing should be done immediately after eating rather than on arising in the morning and on retiring a

"In addition to the toothbrush. fluoridation of water promises to help reduce substantially through out a fifetime the dental crippling that now plagues the adult generation," Dr. Holle said

As part of the preventive program, children should be taken to the dentist as soon as their first teeth are in, said Dr. Holle

Th dentist and the young patient can thus become acquainted under favorable circumstances, free of any discomfort. This type of introduction is much better happier and more productife than one in which the child is suffering from a tooth ache caused by dental neglect, he added.

No More Suttons In Bixler School

ELDORADO, Ill .- Is an old name about to die in this community? Has Bixler school, south of Eldorado, seen the last of the Sut-

For the first time in 47 years the family of the late T. W. and Sarah Sutton will not have a descendant as a student there, the Eldorado Daily Journal reports.

The Sutton family moved to that vicinity in 1905 from White county and six of their children entered Bixler school, which then was a one-room affair. The late Henry Dodd, father of Curtis and Cecil Dodd and Mrs. Cassie Mabrey, was the teacher of all the grades then, with a total of about 50 people.

Those first six Suttons attending Bixler school were Frank. Charles, Simon, William, Herman and Mary. They are double cousins of Hubert Sutton, former White county superintendent of schools and presently principal of the Fairfield city schools.
