





tor can be sure it is diphtheria. Diphtheria is a killing disease. It kills infants and small children. It can kill these children in two ways: either by choking a child to deathfor the membrane of diphtheria in the throat is as deadly as a strangling hand-or, the poisons it produces can attack the heart, so that a child, who is to all appearances well and ready to get about, may collapse when he begins to run and play. Diphtheria can also produce paralysis of the muscles of swallowing, which may also lead to death.




