

**MOTORISTS TO SEE RED**

Austin, Texas — The Texas Highway Department this week announced a highway safety measure designed to protect the motorist by making him see red — literally. The Department said it will require flagmen directing traffic at highway construction and maintenance projects to wear bright red vests and to use a flag of the same color.

The men in the red vests will begin appearing on Texas Highways by mid-February when Highway Department employees working on maintenance jobs will don the eye-catching apparel. Made from fluorescent red nylon, the new vests are designed to make flagmen more easily visible and recognizable to motorists both day and night.

**No Cause For Panic**

A four month old Latin American child was first Lynn County diphtheria victim since the disease has broken over the area. For the past two months Plainview has had over 60 cases. The Lynn Co. child, Randolph Recendez, lived near the West Point Community, West of Tahoka. It was the second diphtheria case, the other being from New Home, Dr. Rumbo here has been giving vaccine to a number of Tahoka children during the past few days. A number of local children are taking vaccine or booster shots. Most children receive DWI shots when infants and later on only require booster shots. As of going to press there have been NO cases of diphtheria in the O'Donnell School District and there is "NO cause for alarm" — however it is good preventive medicine for children to have the vaccine. Fifty years ago diphtheria was the no. 1 killer of infants but today it is only rarely reported.

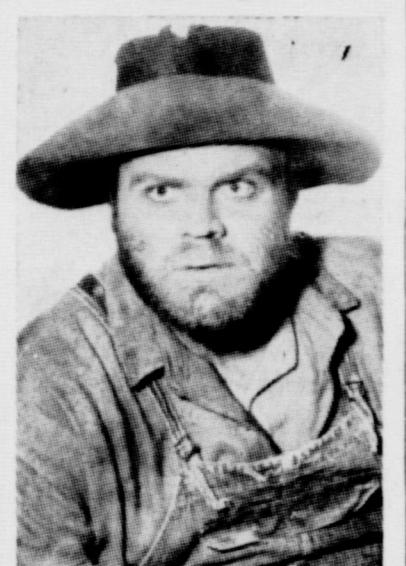

**CLEAN HANDS**

Our courts work with two sets of principles in meting out justice—those of "law" and those of "equity". Under "law" a court declares the parties' rights and duties and sets money damages for harm ALREADY done — as when someone goes back on his contract with you or injures you in an automobile crash.

But under principles of "honesty, EQUITY and conscience", for example, a court seeing harm on the way, may forestall it and enforce its orders by fines or jail terms.

England used to have two kinds of courts to hear cases under law and equity. But today both England and America use the same judge to hear both kinds of cases.

How did these two systems arise? Long ago the English king called upon the "chancery" — then largely made up of churchmen (the keepers of the king's conscience) to give "relief" where the older Common Law courts, grown rigid might fail.

Unable to use the Common Law, the chancellors applied certain rules and maxims, sometimes borrowed from ancient Greece and Rome — "who comes into equity must with clean hands." Sometimes they said: "No one can take advantage of another's error." A court of equity of his "clean hands" denied a suitor "relief" if he himself has done wrong on an issue.

**TAX QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

Tax questions are not new to the employees of Internal Revenue Service. The well trained tax employees who answer the telephone and talk to the taxpayers in person at the IRS offices in this region answer more than 100,000 questions every year. Even though the tax folks give the same general answer to thousands of questions, they point out that each taxpayer has an individual problem that requires the application of the law to his particular circumstance.

The ten most common questions being answered are —

- 1. Do I have to file a separate return Form 1040-A for each W-2 I receive?
- A. — No. You file only one income tax return. You combine all the income reported on the W-2's given you by the employers for whom you worked during the year.
- 2. I am a housewife. What's this community property business? Why can't I file a separate income tax return on the income I earned myself?

Answer — Texas is a community property state. The income that the husband earns, as well as the wife, belongs one half to each the husband and the wife. If the husband and the wife both have income they must either file a joint return including all of the income or split all of the community income and expenses. When they file a separate return, each must include one half of the income and the expenses for the community on his or her return.

3. I am having trouble taking my medical expense deduction. I am over 65. Can I deduct all of my doctor bills and my drugs and medicine expense?

Answer — No. You must subtract 1 percent of your adjusted gross income from the amount paid for medicine and drugs before taking the deduction. However since you are over 65 you may deduct all of your doctor bills without reducing the total expense by 3 percent of adjusted gross income. You are limited to a maximum deduction. The amount varies, depending upon such factors as number of dependents, whether you file a separate return or not and whether you are disabled.

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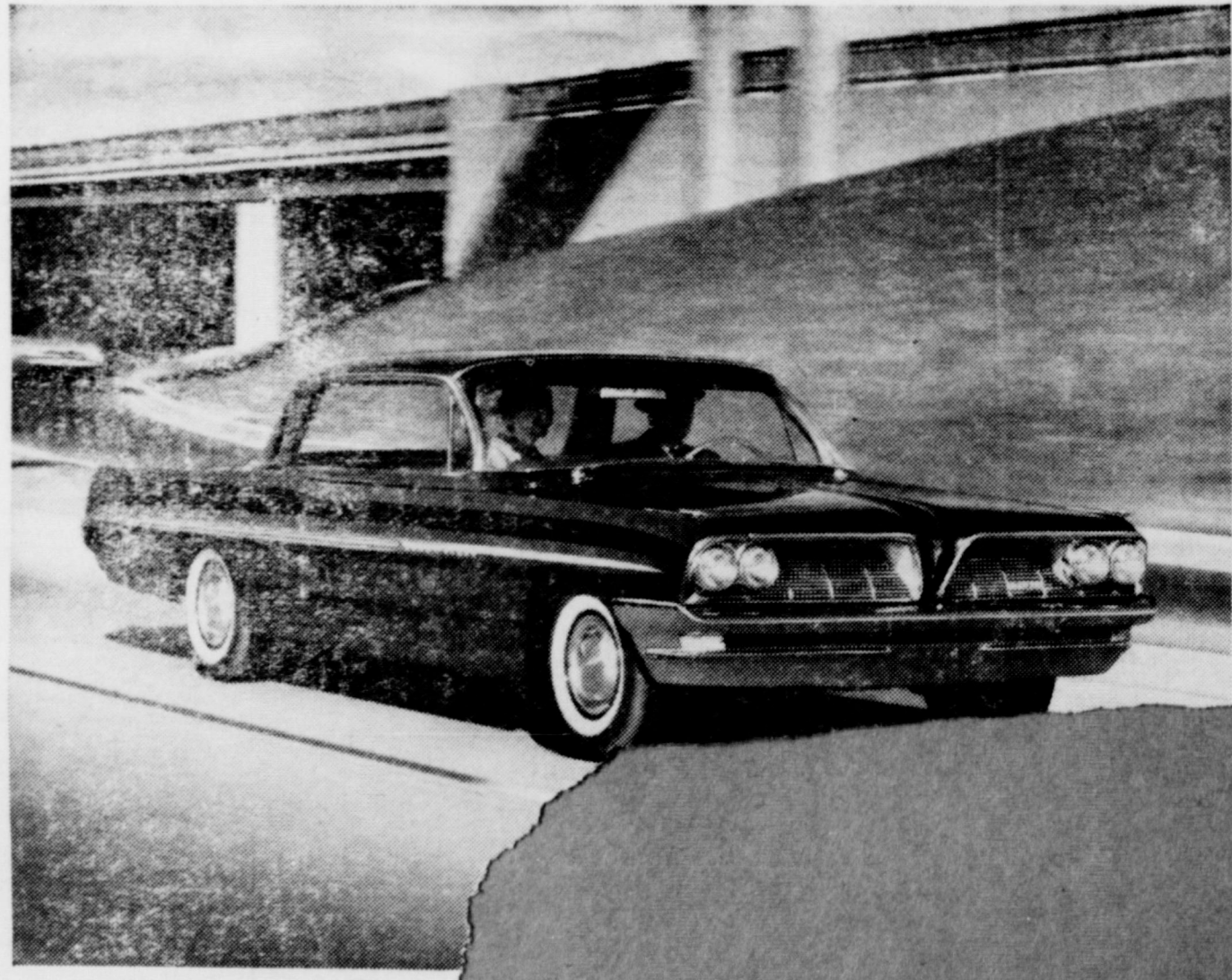

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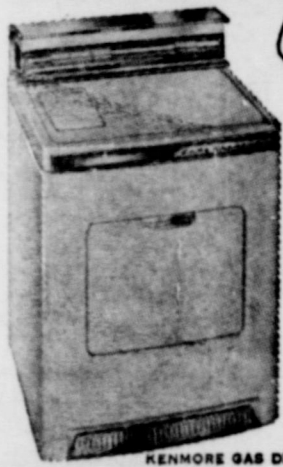
