O'Donnell Area Is Selected

O'Donnell has been selected as a pilot-plant site as Seagraves was selected last year for an experiment cage-egg production. Everyone knows how successful the experi-ment proved to be as that story has been featured in area papers and in leading farm magazines

Can Thank Mr. Smith Of Bank Arthur Clary of the Clary Poultry and Egg Wholesale firm of Lub bock, and E. J. Smith, O'Donnell's local banker, are working on the project to give the necessary knowlow and financial assistance.

Meeting Is May 12th A meeting has been called Thursday nite at 8 p. m. May 12th in high school auditorium where Mr. Smith and Mr. Clary will ex-

plain the business end of the pro-posed project and Ken Looper of Purina Feed Co. will talk. Mr. Smith's Answer O'Donnell was selected as pilot-plant site largely due to the efforts of Banker Smith who saw immediately upon moving here a need for an even distribution of farmer income every month in the year instead of a fat fall and a

lean spring. Not A Get-Rich Scheme — But Lots Of Work

Every farmer in this area is invited to attend — and if any of the O'Donnell merchants miss this meeting — well, we know they wont. Seating of such a crowd will probably be a problem so it is suggested that those who are definitely interested attend. In addition to farmers, the broiler deal is ideally suited to the small business man with extra time, the semi-retired yet active individual. All that is needed is at least an acre of land either leased or owned.

Mr. Clary said he would explain in detail the financial part of the proposal on May 12th. But the broiler producer will have an initial cash investment of only \$736 on a 4,000 chick deal and this sum will buy outright the needed brooders, founts, and feeders. The \$3,000 metal building to house the project will be a Federal Government Title I loan and feed purchases and chick purchases will be locally financed.

75,000 Broilers A Week Currently 90 percent of Texas consumption of broilers comes from out of state. Mr. Clary said he wanted O'Donnell to produce 75. 000 broilers a week. In talking to L. G. Clark, who is in the cage-egg business as well as farming, said the efficient broiler producer should realize \$200 to \$300 per month (depending of course on the capacity of the unit). Drouth Insurance

The need for farmers to diversify ( or living off of the farm) is known to all as the consumer demand for cotton is slowly dropping. And the high dry climate of the Caprock is suited for the chicken--semi-arid bird originally.

Also drouth does not hit broiler crop as severe a blow as row crops. 250 broiler plants here in this wide area and a pay day every 16 weeks with NO marketing pro-

blems is the deal. Ask Mr. Smith at the bank for further details and be at the meeting May 12th.
