



A -- It Would be possible to obtain the higher rate of GI allowance if you are supporting your parents, and are single. They will have to fill out a VA form, "Statement of Dependency." which may be obtained at any VA office. You must submit a certified copy of the public record of your birth, or of the church record of your baptism.

Q -- I want to study law under the Korean GI Bill. Would I be allowed to take a bar review course after I complete my college work?

A -- Yes. On your application form, list "Lawyer" as your objective. And put down both "Bachelor of Laws degree" and "Bar Review Course" as your training program leading to the objective.

Spiderweb Business **Proves Profitable** In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.-Such precision devices as gunsights, astronomical instruments and survey instruments require crossed hairs." Mrs. Nan Songer supplies spider webs with which the "hairs"

AccountantCanGet Goods on Credit Easier Than Others

URBANA - CHAMPAIGN, Ill .-When you want to buy goods on credit, you will find it a lot easier if you are an accountant or auditor than if you happen to be a laborer or farm hand, regardless of your income. Your occupation doesn't determine your credit rating, but it helps.

"The more specific factors which aid in determining reliability of risk are occupation, the amount and regularity of income, age, reserve assets of various kinds, char acter, and reputation," says Robert S. Hancock of the University of Illinois marketing faculty.

He recently studied occupations in relation to credit in cooperation with the Associated Credit Bureaus of America. He reports findings in "Current Economic Comment. quarterly journal of the University's Bureau of Economic and Business Research.

Business executives, accountants. and auditors got the best ratings from credit bureaus and department store credit managers. Next were independent and chain store retail managers, and a group including physicians, surgeons, and dentists. Public officials-federal. state, and local-ranked 19th in a list of 42 occupations. Transient and seasonal workers got the lowest rating.

A similar study made in 1941 at Illinois by marketing professor P. D. Converse gave army and navy officers next to the top rating, and ranked the medical men 12th and 14th as credit risks. In Hancock's study the officers dropped to 8th place, while doctors and dentists upped their rating.

Evangelist Hits Bottle in Moral Way at Meetings

WINONA LAKE, Ind .- About the last place you'd expect to see liquor bottles prominently displayed would be in a revival tent.

But "converted" whisky bottles are a part of the evangelistic equipment used by the Rev. Curt Emmons. They form a musical instrument played at services by his 20-year-old daughter, Ethelee. She taps them with wooden sticks -vegetable-brush handles-bringing forth a ringing sound.

Many liquor bottles are picked up, but few are chosen, for the ecclesiastical musical instrument. Emmons explained that perhaps as many as 250 are tried and found wanting before a bottle with the right musical tone is found.

Ethelee began playing snare drums when she was 7. She has played various instruments at the services and took up bottles about

eight years ago. The bottle that would be most difficult to replace is a piercing. high-pitched, half-pint gin bottle from London, England. It produces the highest note of the keyboard of some 27 bottle keys. Some of the bottles used for lower notes contain varying amounts of water.

When a bottle is broken Emmons begins hunting around vacant lots and other likely spots for discarded bottles. The keyboard contains bottles from 12 different states including Kentucky. The labels have been removed.

Amber bottles produce better tones than clear bottles-why, Emmons doesn't know nor could he account for the fact that only one of more than 200 bottles that look just alike is suitable for musical purposes.

Emmons told of a drunk who staggered in to the meeting one night and came up to the front row, where he could get a good view of the bottles. After the sermon, he went to the altar and renounced whisky.

'He walked out of that meeting as straight as yeu or I," Emmons said. "God sobered him up."

URSA MAJOR **Biggest Bears** Are Found Near

Iowa Town MARQUETTE, lows-The oldest, largest and most harmless bears in the world reside in north-

east lows. These venerable and innocuous ursine giants march high in the hills which overlook the Mississippi north of Marquette. They may be seen by visiting Iowa's only national monument, Effigy Mounds.

All told, there are 80 mounds within the monument's boundaries. But only 18 of these are bear mounds. There are three bird effigies and the rest are linear and conical mounds.

Great Bear

Great Bear Mound, largest of the effigies, is 140 feet long, five feet high and 70 feet wide at the shoulders. It is one of the Yellow river group at the north end of the monument. Yellow river mounds have been cleared of underbrush and hiking trails have been built.

A smaller bear mound in the same area has been outlined with gravel to aid the viewer's eye in following the lines of the effigies.

Effigy Mounds is one of mid-America's richest archeological treasures. A great deal has been learned about the stone age culture of the mound builders through study of pottery and implements found near the mounds.

A recent discovery which caused quite a stir among Iowa archeologists was the finding by national park service authorities that not one, but two separate tribal groups simultaneously built mounds in the monument area.

Sacred Ground

This has led scholars to believe that the area was a sacred burial ground set aside for all mound building peoples in the section. Apparently all the mounds were burial places.

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Ding Dong Daddy Is Charged by Wife No. 16 With Bigamy

LOS ANGELES-Wife No. 16 of the Ding Dong Daddy of the "D' Line, Francis H. Van Vie, 66, has charged her husband with bigamy. Mrs. Martha Moyle Van Wie signed a complaint that she married the former San Francisco motorman unaware of his 15 previous

marriages. The complaint accuses the roly. poly motorman of marrying Martha in Yuma in 1951, then eloping two months ago with wife No. 17, Mrs. Amelia Pritchard Van Wie, 73.

Mrs. Martha Van Wie agreed to testify as a witness if the district attorney issued a bigamy complaint. She made her promise a few hours before a warrant was signed against Van Wie.

She told Walter Sullivan, district attorney's investigator, that she met Van Wie early in 1951 at a social gathering here and he proposed marriage, hinting that he was wealthy and would take her off the old age pension rolls. Mrs. Van Wie said they separated after two weeks, were reconciled for a few weeks longer and finally separated four months after their

marriage. Mrs. Van Wie filed suit for divorce in Long Beach and a few days later learned of Van Wie's marital record as the "Ding Dong Daddy of the D Line" in San Francisco back in 1945.

Mrs. Pritchard left Van Wie when she also learned of her husand's past fame as a marrying motorman. At the time she left him, Van Wie was uncertain whether he ever had been divorced from wife No. 14, Mrs. Mary Abbe of Oakland, but promised the district attorney he would surrender if a bigamy complaint were issued.

Van Wie then accepted an offer to make a theater appearance in Oakland. Informed that Mrs. Martha Van Wie insisted she was his 16th wife, he declined comment.

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

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
