THE LATE ELECTION.

The late election was of considerable interest to all voters throughout the United States as congressmen had to be elected in every State and in many States the legislature elected last week will choose United States Senators and as a consequence both parties put forth every effort to obtain a favorable result. The main fight was for the control of the next national house. Before the election it was generally conceded that the next house would be democratic, but neither party expected such sweeping changes.
The Democrats swept everything before them almost, and a Republican majority in this congress was changed to a Democratic majority of 160 in the next. No party in the history of the government ever met with an overwhelming defeat as the Republicans sustained last week. States heretofore considered impregnable against the assaults of the Democrats have swung into the ranks of the mighty Democratic host. This is noticeably so in Pennsylvania and Kansas, both overcome a majority of 80,000 for the Republicans and have changed to the Democrats side.
What caused the result is now agitating the leaders in both parties. Many things doubtless caused disaster to the Republicans. The tariff was the main, but not the only cause. Extravagance in making appropriations for pensions and other things; the tyrannical rulings of speaker Reed in the last session of congress, the Lodge bill and many other things disgusted thousands of Republicans who did not go to the polls or voted with the Democrats.
Another thing must not be overlooked in considering the result of the election. The Alliance and other farmers organizations had no little to do with it. The farmers see every other industry but their own protected high tariff laws and special legislation favoring other classes by the national government to the detriment of agriculturist and they made themselves felt in a way that almost paralyzed the Republicans. The alliance was the main cause of the result in Kansas where six Republican congressmen out of seven were defeated.
Many of the ablest leaders in the Republican party have been defeated McKinley of Ohio and Cannon of Illinois went down in the storm. Ben Butterworth, an able statesman, saw the impending cyclone and declined to run. Wisconsin elects Geo. W. Peck, the funny man governor. Montana so confidently claimed by the Republicans, goes Democratic. In New York State the Democrats for the first time since the war have a majority of the congressmen from that state. Indiana the home of President Harrison, rolls up a large Democratic majority and so on through the country. As it now stands the Republicans can not claim a single state in the Union with absolute certainty in 1892 unless it is Maine.
The result settles Mr. Harrison's chance as a candidate for his party in 92 as the administration is largely blamed by the republicans for the down fall of the party.
It looks now as though Secretary Blaine was on the top and in all probability he will be the Republican candidate that will dash his brains out against the Democratic stone wall in 92. If the Republicans will nominate Blaine and the Democrats choose D. B. Hill for their standard bearer, this country will see one of the most enthusiastic campaigns for the presidency in 1892 that has ever been our good or bad fortune of the people to witness. But if you want to see the tamest affair ever witnessed let the Republicans nominate Harrison and the Democrats Cleveland. THE STAR surely hopes each party will kick the last mentioned candidates overboard, because we want to see a campaign that will make the welkin ring. D. B. Hill and Jas. G. Blaine are the men that will fire the hearts and brains of the two great parties. Let it be Hill and Blaine and the devil take the hindmost, and that will not be Hill.
Ugh! how cold it is for our Republican friends as the news comes in from the late cyclone.

INSANE.

Mr. Homer Magee, who has been working on THE STAR as local reporter for the last month, became suddenly insane Wednesday.
