A new wildcat oil test has been staked on the John Saleh section 7 miles west of town just north of Gooch Lake. The test is to the Ellenburger at 10,000 feet. School Integration Vote Set Here For Friday

This Friday, June 1st an election will be held at the High School to determine if the O'Donnell School Board shall have the right to abolish the dual school system. There are three main reasons for calling this election: Federal law, Accreditation and Financing.

1. Federal Courts have ruled against dual and equal facilities stating that separate schools are not in keeping with the Federal Constitution. 2nd. The State Accreditation Division of the Texas Education Agency checks our school's facilities and program for standards which must be maintained. If any one part of the system does not meet the standards, the accreditation of the whole school system is rated by the weakest unit. This fact can cause the O'Donnell School to lose its accreditation because one unit is not meeting standards even though the rest of the school DOES meet the standards. The School has been WARNED and this is just one step away from LOSING accreditation. Next spring, when the accreditation visit is made, if the School System has not corrected the situation, our school is subject to LOSING its accreditation.

3rd If the School District had the money to build two equal school systems and did this to protect its accreditation, it would not assure the School System of being able to continue to operate two separate systems because cases that have been carried to court have ruled out dual systems. This would be a tremendous expense on the tax payers of the School District and even then would not GUARANTEE continued SEGREGATION.

Your school needs your understanding and support in this problem. Your school board is requesting that everyone in the district eligible to vote to be sure an express his or her opinion, either for or against this matter so your Board will know the opinion of the majority.

It's The Law In TEXAS -- TAKE ME OUT TO THE BALL GAME

It was a beautiful day for baseball, Harriet's fiance, Dick, was taking her to her first big league baseball game. They arrived just before the opening pitch and found their seats along the first base line in the fifth row. Harriet was enjoying all of the color and excitement of the ball park, the baseball fans, the hot dog vendors, and, of course, the game itself. Suddenly a hard hit foul ball flew into the stands and struck Harriet, severely injuring her.

Harriet brought a lawsuit against the baseball club. She alleged that spectators should be protected from such injuries, and that additional screens should have been put up to prevent fouls from coming into the stands.

The court said "No" to Harriet. She had chosen to sit in the un-protected bleachers in preference to sitting behind a screen where the tickets cost more. Therefore she had "assumed" the risk of being hit by a batted or thrown ball during the playing of the game. No recovery was allowed.

In such cases, the courts say that the spectator is an invitee to whom the invitor (the ball club) owes the duty to exercise ordinary care to render the premises reasonably safe for him.

"But," says the courts, "the invitor is not an insurer of the safety of the invitee, neither is the invitor or tected against all hazard nor relieved of all duty to himself for his own safety. And to the extent that he duty of self protection rests upon the invitee, the duty of the invitor to protect is reduced."

ANNUAL PHYSICAL EXAM CAN REDUCE FATAL CANCER

Last year 11,348 Texans died from the effects of malignant neoplasms, the statistical designation for all forms of cancer. For many years now cancer has been the second ranking cause of death in Texas—and in the rest of the United States. The only disease that ranks ahead of cancer, is heart disease and its associated vascular conditions. Latest evaluations on the effectiveness of cancer treatment indicates that one out of every three persons discovered with the disease is cured. But, using the conservative estimates which characterize the medical profession, half of all cancer victims could be saved if the disease were discovered early enough.

The "Pap" test is simple, inexpensive, painless, and absolutely reliable. It involves the physician taking a uterine smear which is carefully analyzed by a pathologist. Uterine cancer could be almost completely eliminated if adult women have a "Pap" test at least once a year during a thorough physical examination.

Carlsbad caverns have been explored to a depth of 1100 feet where there is the beautiful Lake of the Clouds. Trails take visitors to the 827 foot level but due to inaccessibility lower levels of the limestone decorated cavern are not open to the public.

To light a staggering array of magnificent limestone formations in Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico, 25 miles of wiring and 500 bulbs -- all hidden from view -- are used. About 50 bulbs a week are replaced and two full time electricians are employed.

A big vacuum is used regularly on the hard surfaced trails of the world's largest and most beautiful cavern -- Carlsbad Caverns National Park in New Mexico. Seven wheelbarrows of lint and shoe leather are picked up each vacuuming.

To light a staggering array of magnificent limestone formations in Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico. 23 miles of wiring and 500 bulbs -- all hidden from view -- are used. About 50 bulbs a week are replaced and two full time electricians are employed.

A big vacuum is used regularly on the hard surfaced trails of the world's largest and most beautiful cavern -- Carlsbad Caverns National Park in New Mexico. Seven wheelbarrows of lint and shoe leather are picked up each vacuuming.

Hatchery raised bobwhite quail, by agreement with Texas Game and Fish Commission, are available to 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters for quail management demonstrations. Details on the program are available from game wardens or conservation officers and from local county agents.

Carlsbad caverns have been explored to a depth of 1100 feet where there is the beautiful Lake of the Clouds. Trails take visitors to the 827 foot level but due to inaccessibility lower levels of the limestone decorated cavern are not open to the public.
