Rains Prove Value of Soil Conservation

Recent rains have proved the need for more extensive soil con servation practices in the Lame sa Camp Area. Although num-erous small terraces have been broken, erosion by water has been reduced considerably. Very little water and soil have been lost from terraced and contoured ost from terraced and contoured and but the terrace breaks should be repaired as soon as possible. Small breaks can be repaired with shovels while it is nore economical to use fresnoes or scrapers to make the larger fills. The entire terrace should

be planted with broad cast or close drilled to sorghum crops to stabilize the structure until they have sufficient height and width to handle heavy rains.

Any gullies that have been formed can more easily be checked if some Sudan grass or other sorghum crops are left on proming for a few stabilize the gally and collect silt but will also check and hold the sifting sand during the next
