Auto Wreckers Given Added Incentive

Auto wreckers have been given an added incentive to help rais the iron and steel scrap inventor-ies of the nation's steel mills and

foundries to a saf elevel.

A. C. Jackson, District Manager. US Department of Commerce. National Production Authority in Lubbock announced an amen-dmentto NPA Order M-92 (Auto Wreckers) which removes pur-chase restrictions in th following quarter by auto wreckers who, in any given quarter, wreck out all 1939 or older cars they had at the beginning of the period.

Other major changes in Order M-92 include changing the definition of "moter vehisles" to exclude certain buses whose parts scrap for a car unit; and provides that no wrecker may acquire a greater number of vehicles dur-ing any quarter that he has junked in the preceding quarter, unless he haswrecked out a number of cars equal to the total number of pre-1940 vehicles which were in his inventory at the beginning of the previous quarter. Mr. Jackson explained that the original order exempted only those cars built from 1946 on, but vehicles from 1940 upward are great mand and is not in the public in-trest to scrap them.

The Office of Price Stabilization today issued a regulation establishing new prices for perishable products- breads, cakes, pies, and restricts for which and pastries- -for which consumersnationally spend five billion dollars a year.

District OPS officials said the new regulation, Ceiling Price Regulation 135, specifies a fix-ed percentage by which the new ceilings may exceed prices char-ged during the base year of 1949 for these products. The permissible percentage by which bread and sweet goods products may exceed 1949 prices 1s

16 per cent. The new regulation becomes effective May 10, 1952 The effect upon the public will depend upon the amounts by which bakers in the various thier prices between 1949 and

the general price freeze of Jan-Among other things this fixed percentage reflects the rate of cost increases in the industry from 19b9 to July, 1951; increa-

es in certain other costs other han ngredient costs from July, han ngredient costs from 1951, to the present, and certain ost increases that are sceduled take place in the immediate Bakers whose present ceilings

are above the permissible percen-tage of increase over 1949 will ave to radjust their ceilings downward to bring them in line with the new level. Bakers whose current ceilings are below the ermttted level may raise theirs this level.

The regulation applies to types if bakers of perishable and frozen bread and sweet goods products—wholesale, retail, houshous and chain store bakers. Other sellers who buy from pakers are not covered by the regulation. Grocers, for instance, will continue to price cookies under the dry grocery regulations and bread and other perishable bakery products under the Gen-

Because many small bakers lack the records nessary to compute prices uner the regulation, they have the option, if their annual volume of business is less than \$100,000, to cintinue under the General Ceiling Price Regul-ation or the emergency regulation issued last Nov. 26, Supplemen-tary Regulaton 80 to the GCPR.

CHICKEN POX IS COMMON CHILD DISEASE

Chickenpox cases are most numerous in winter and spring says Dr. Geo W. Cox, State Health Officer. Ordinaily, people do not consider it a serious disease. But probly the mose serious factor is that light cases of smallpox and the symptoms of chickenpox are Only a phisician can tell the diff-erence. At the first sign of skin

eruptions, you should put the pat-ent in bed and call the family Dr. As in any other illness, chickenpox lowers body resistance to other disease germs. Thus, complications such as pneumonia, inflammation of the kidneys, erysipelas, and gan-grene of the skin may occure. resulting in a serious illness.

Chiskenpox is highly contagious It usually develops two to three weeks after exposure. After one attact, the patient is immune to the disease. Although chickenpox occures most frequently among children less thasn fifteen years of age, adults, too, can get the disease if they did not have it when they were children.

uth and nose. Skin eruptions of a sickpersons contain the germ. The disease spreads rapidly through families and schools, as an infected person can spread his germs widly by careless coughing, using a com mon drinking cup, towel or washcloth. Fir his own welfare and to protect others the patient should stay in bed and apart from sus-ceptible members of the household until all danger of spreading the disease is passed.

New Cottonseed Oil Extracting Method Told

A new process for solvent-extracting oil from cottonseed and other oilseeds has been developed, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reports.

The process, which is especially adapted to use by small mills, is called "filtration-extraction", because it involves the use of a continuous vacuum filter as the major operating unit. It worked successfully with cottonseed, and with certain modifications also proved to be suitable for the oil processing of rice bran and soybeans, on a pilotplan scale. Experiments with other oilseeds are under way.

USDA reports the investment required for applying the process for equipment and the cost of opera-

tion are relatively low.

Krilium Will Not Replace Fertilizer

Chemical Increases Soil Needs for Plant Foods

Krilium, the newly discovered chemical powder that can rebuild soil structure on rundown crop land within a few hours, will not take the place of fertilizers.

Midwestern agronomists who have tested this new soil conditioner, say that its use on farm land would actually increase the soil's need for plant food.

Prof. Emil Truog, of the Univer-The chickenpox germ gains ent-rance to the body through the moany nitrogen, phosphate or potash to the soil. But by improving tilth, increasing the soil's water-holding capacity and helping the soil "breathe" in more air, it promotes bigger crop yields per acre. More bushels mean a heavier drain on the plant nutrient supply.

Mixed with the soil, the new water-soluble chemical loosens tightly packed clay and clay loams and makes them fluffy and porous. It does this by "glueing" tiny soil particles together into crumb-like granules, ranging in size from a pin-

Cox, State Health Officer, said today that few people realize that babies and young children are very likely to become infected with tuberculosis if they are kept in rooms with persons who have the disease use the same dishes, sleep in the same beds, or are handled and kissed by persons who have tuberculosis.

"Babies and young children pick up germs of tuberculosis just as readily as they pick up the germs of measels or whooping cough, of any other of the so-called childrens diseases," Dr. Cox said. But tuberculosis unlike most diseases has more than one form. Babies who get tuberculosis may not show the symptoms we associate with the disease in older persons. Fertilized Soils Drink Hard Rains **Unfertilized Soils Break** Down Under Hard Rains

Does your farm land "drink" in pelting rains? Or do those rains break down the surface soil, seal the top like a lid, puddle and then run

The answer depends on soil care, say Missouri University agronomists.

The accompanying photos show what happened after a beating rain fell on two freshly plowed fields adjoining each other at the Sanborn Experiment Field at Columbia, Mo.

Both fields had been in corn since 1888. The top field was fertilized; the lower one not. For the test, all crops were removed and then the soil was plowed.

Soil in the top field took the rain in stride. The water drained quickly down in. There was practically no runoff; no soil damage, or loss of water or topsoil. The plowed clods are intact and the surface looks



On the lower field, the beating rain broke the bare surface soil into tiny particles. Clods were dissolved. The tiny particles quickly filled the pores of the surface soils, forming a hard, lid-like crust. Water could not get down in, so it ponded on the surface. This field suffered a double loss. It lost needed moisture for crops and it lost valuable topsoil due to runoff.

Farm Wife May Equal Spouse in Crop Know-How

The hand that rocks the cradle is regaining its traditional skill in agriculture.

Prof. Grant B. Snyder, head of the Department of Olericulture at the University of Massachusetts and rural youth leader, predicts that modern farm wives will soon be growing out of the kitchen into full working partnership with husbands.

He bases his opinion, he said, on records of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association, an or-ganization that offers rural youth in 46 states "apprenticeship" training in the best methods of commercial gardening. This training program is a year-long production-marketing contest sponsored by A&P stores, which provides \$6,000 annually in

scholarship funds. In the 1951 contest, Prof. Snyder pointed out, "more than 40 per cent of the 148 winners who split the \$6,000 melon were girls."

"Many of these future farm wives," he added, "are college students taking agriculture, and I am sure they will put their education and their NJVGA experience to good

use on their future farms." Prof. Snyder, co-founder and chief adult adviser of NJVGA, said the 1952 contest, which is open to boys and girls 12 to 21 years of age, "is expected to be the biggest in NJVGA history."


