CIGARETTES — DO THEY SPELL "EARLY DEATH"

Austin - Half of the men and a fourth of the women of the United States smoke cigarettes daily, ac cording to a recent survey of the U.S. Bureau of Census. That adds up to something like 38 million cigarette addicts — 25 million men and 13 million women. Those figurbesides revealing the extent to which the smoking habit has become ingrained among Americans, accentuate the grimness of the recently validated relationships be-tween cigarette consumption and general death rate, including

dreaded lung cancer. It took the American Cancer Society four years of concentrated study of the smoking habits of 188,000 men to reach these conelusions-

A 57 percent greater death rate from diseases of the heart and circulatory system among smokers as compared to non-smokers; a 97 per cent greater cancer death rate, 186 percent greater death rate due to pulmonary diseases excluding cancer and a 29 percent greater rate of death from all other causes

Among men over 50 with a history of regular cigarette smoking. the general death rate is 52 percent above the death rate for men who have never smoked.

The same study revealed a slight relationship between pipe smoking and lung cancer and practically no relationship between cigar smoking and lung cancer. Present studies indicate that the reason cigarettes are more important in the cause of lung cancer than either pipes or cigars is that tars in cigarette smoke is drawn in at much higher temperatures.

Should you stop smoking? You must answer that question alone. Ask yourself if the fleeting pleasures you get from cigarettes outweigh the risks involved.

This Small Town Is **Mailing Center** For Rays of Cheer

CANASTOTA, N.Y.-Ma and Pa Bobb are a couple nearing their 70th birthday who live near here and consider bringing cheer to others the greatest satisfaction in life. This town is mailing center for rays of sunshine.

They send greetings, "sunshine letters," to hundreds of the bedridden or persons in wheel chairs, people often suffering more from loneliness and neglect than from physical ailments

During the past nine years thousands of shut-ins have received birthday and Christmas greetings as well as letters twice a month from the Bobbs.

The letter-visits to the shut-ins were begun in 1942. At first only 50 lonely persons received letters, but the idea grew until now more than 1,400 elderly people, all with physical handicaps, hear regularly from Ma and Pa.

The Bobbs find their shut-ins by consulting through the mails with health departments and public health associations.

There is no mention in the letters to the shut-ins of wars and economic problems. They concern things like the buckwheat cakes mom used to make, the woodbox beside the kitchen stove, and the peddlers who used to come around with pins, threads, shoelaces and buttons, the old covered bridges, and other things the oldsters remember with fondness.

The oldsters know that they are not expected to reply to the "sunshine letters.'

Curves Eliminated Between N. C. Towns

OLD FORT, N.C .- The re-location of a road between here and Ridgecrest is taking the hairpins out of a mountain trail, but the job itself is a hair-raising one.

With an army of bulldozers, tractors, trucks and other earth-moving machines, construction crews are making war against a mountain. In jeeps that scamper over ravines, like mountain goats, engineers direct the operation by radio-telephone.

The road-building project is based on the "leveling off" principle, which means filling in the valleys, as well as cutting through the hills. And in making the necessary "fills" and "cuts." workers must cope with the movement of millions of cubic yards of stone and soil, frequently working at angles that defy the 'aw of gravity.

In the words of one engineer, "The project would be next to impossible were it not for jeeps, which we use for operating in all advanced positions, and for the many trips we must make to and from the field office." The radiotelephone system of communications was also rated as "vitally essential.

When completed this fall, the new road will replace an eight-mile section of U.S. 70, which has 98 dangerous curves and a bad accident record. The new highway will have two 22-foot lanes, no hazardous bends, only 19 curves of the easy-to-take variety, and it will reduce the overall traveling distance by a good two miles under the old route.


The construction firm of W. E. Graham & Sons, Cleveland, N.C., called the road re-location project the biggest ever undertaken on this side of the Mississippi. Pointed out, too, was the fact that the new road will have 10-foot shoulders and a drainage system utilizing heavy-duty culverts up to 54 inches.


