When he first came to Lynn County, he was appointed by the Commissioners Court as County Attorney and he made a record for wholesome law enforcement and his last holding of this office found him going outside of his duties as Coungt Attorney to help juveniles who get into trouble to help them and thier families in checking them becoming criminals and this has been done by this man in a quiet

Then he became interested in men who had become chronic drunkards and gone to the bottom of the ditch and has started a number of husbands back on the road to sobriety and there is many a happy mother and wife and children caused by the efforts of this kindly man at the same time he has seen that our laws are enforced and he wants to round out his work for the juveniles and the poor fellow that is in the ditch because of liquor.

Hog Breeders Resume Pelletized Feedings Post-War Availability Of Dairy Products Helps

Many hog breeders have reluc-tantly dropped skim milk and dairy by-products from their hog rations in the past few years.

Although farmers for generations have recognized the values of milk products in hog feeding, several factors have frequently influenced them to forget or ignore those val-

But now that dairy by-products can be adapted to self-feeder and labor - saving feeding programs through pelletizing of the products,

they are again returning to their traditional place in more and more hog rations.

This is indicated in a summary of 1949 state fair results across the midwest hog belt, which seems to re-emphasize the feeding value of milk by-products and points up the fact that they can be fitted into self-feeder programs.

The summary, prepared by Kraft foods company, shows a total of 72 championship prizes and 70 first prizes won at six big state fairs and the national barrow show by hogs fed a pelletized dairy product in their rations.

Rats Blamed for Spread Of Mesquite in Arizona

Desert rats that gather reserve feed, store it in shallow caches, leave many of these undisturbed, are practically planters of the stored seed. This is one of the important causes of the rapid invasion of grassy range lands by mesquite shrub.

Mesquite, says the U.S. department of agriculture, displaces forage grasses and reduces the beef and wool production. In areas in Arizona the number of mesquite shrubs to the acre have increased about 50 per cent in the past 15 years, according to a U.S. forest service report.

The Merriam Kangaroo rat is a small rodent that lives in the arid areas of the southwest. The mesquite is one of its favorite foods.

Undulant Fever Must Be Wiped Out in Animals

The only known way to eliminate undulant fever in man is to eradicate the disease in domestic animals, according to W. W. Spink, professor of veterinary medicine at the University of Minnesota.

Prevention of undulant fever, or brucellosis, in man requires the pasteurization of all milk used for human consumption, Spink says. There is no way, he says, of prevention by immunizing.





4-H Club 'Fencer' Foils Post Decay **Creosote Treated Posts** Will Last Thirty Years

Terry Liston, 17-year-old presi-dent of South Carolina Four-H Clubs, has "snowballed" one wellknown conservation practice into triple savings-savings of timber, money, and his own time and energy.

Thinning a woodlot on his father's farm near Smoaks to allow healthier growth of the trees, Terry ended up with 700 fine fence posts. But he had noticed that pine fence posts rotted out in the ground faster than he could grow new ones.

Presenting his problem to the local county agricultural agent, Terry learned that pressure-treating the

posts with creosote would give them a life expectancy of more than 30

Although he realized that he was mally could not be filled, Terry contacted a nearby Charleston, S. C., wood treating plant and asked to have his posts pressure treated with creosote, along with ties and poles which Koppers treats for railroads and utilities.

Word of Terry's attack on the farm fencing problem spread among the community with the result that other farmers have turned to use of the specially treated posts as a better farming method.

The right to vote - to vote in secret and to have your votes count-

ed-is a great right. It is grounded in the faith that the average judgment of all of us together in the long run will be right that "you can't fool all the people all the time." It has many flaws. It has been corrupted, abused and negected, but by means of it the American people over more than a century and a half have done pretty well for themselves.

Through agents chosen by you and others like you all laws are made. No man, regardless of his station in life, wields more power than you in the voting booth.

You can also vote by not voting. for by staying away from the polls you can help a self-seeking minority make the wrong decision.

WHEN YOU REACH voting age you become a member of the "ruling class"-the one and only ruling class of this country.

Use this power to vote. Vote during the big year elections, of course-and at state elections. vote at your

Vote on policies and officers of your union.

Vote as a stockholder of any company you have invested in. Vote on civic improvements and

bond issues. Vote on officers of your club, your

lodge, your grange. In general, all citizens over 21 years of age have the right to vote, but the various states have different laws as to how long you must live in the same place, when to register, etc. In certain states literacy tests or poll taxes are required. In no state is property ownership a re-

quirement. But don't consider you have done your duty merely by voting in national elections every four years. There are also congressional elections, state elections, city elections, and local elections of various kinds.

THERE ARE three ways to vote. You can vote for (1) party, (2)

issues, (3) people. If the total party program, as expressed in its platform, appeals to you as being best for the country, it is sound to vote a straight ticket for the people pledged to put that program into effect.

If a single issue seems to you more important than anything else, it is sound to vote for persons who support your view of that issue, regardless of party.

If the ability of an individual to judge each issue fairly and to keep the interests of the people uppermost appeals to you, it is sound to vote for that individual, regardless of party or any particular issue.

But even if you spent your life at it, you couldn't be fully informed on all the candidates and issues

The answer is to do the best you can. It is better to vote on the basis of party allegiance and your own 'sense of things" than not to vote at all. Your own knowledge and convictions, whatever they are, will be combined with the knowledge and convictions of a lot of other people. As a group we are usually wiser than we think we are.





Treatment of the Tired Patient of 50

When a man or woman past 50 | university school of medicine), who has always lead an active life states that a basal metabolism test, begins to feel tired all the time it is not because he is growing old but because there is some underlying condition present, slight or severe. Perhaps the commonest cause of tiredness in a man or woman past 50 is infection, although his family and he himself may think it due to

overwork. An examination should be made by the family physician and dentist to try to find infection of teeth, tonsils, gums, sinuses, gall bladder or large intestine. The regular processes and the fighting forces of the body keep working away as best they can despite infection, but finally the infection begins to win the fight and tiredness and sleepiness is the result.

While infection is the commonest cause of tiredness in the patient of 50, the thyroid gland in the neck may become less active which also causes a "slowing up" of the individual physically and mentally. made which may show that the thy-In "Clinical Medicine," Dr. W. roid gland is underactive. The

which is used to test the rate at which the body processes of the body are working under control of thyroid gland, should be made. A persistent fall in metabolic rate may be first sign of body degeneration with symptoms of tiredness, nervousness and inability to keep up physically. The pulse is fast (at first) and abdomen distended. "Lack of physical and mental vigor is noted; the blood pressure may rise without organic disease." The treatment for underactivity of

the thyroid glands is: thyroid extract in doses of one-half to one grain daily, with organic iodine, which stimulates metabo! n (building up and breaking down of body tissue) and delays degeneration.

Kitchen Table Stool

Farm Safety Week Observance in July Fifteen Simple Rules Of Safety Outlined

National Farm Safety Week will be observed in the United States during the week of July 23-29.

The annual losses represented by farm accidents and fires are estimated around one billion. To reduce this enormous loss, 15 simple rules are outlined for Farm Safety

1. Keep walkways and steps in good repair, unobstructed and well lighted; 2. Keep ladders in good repair and easily accessible in case of emergency; 3. Always stop a machine before unclogging, oiling,



or adjusting. Keep all machine guards and safety devices in place; 4. Don't wear loose and floppy colthes around machienry; 5. Start tractors smoothly and turn corners slowly-avoid ditch banks and soft ground-always hitch to the drawbar; 6. Speak to animals when approaching them. Keep them calm by acting with calm self assurance yourself; 7. Always keep bulls in safe bull pens. Never handle bulls unless they are properly restrained; 8. Know and obey all traffic laws; 9. Keep your back straight and lift heavy loads with your leg muscles; 10. Use the right tools for the jobmake sure they are in good condition-keep them in a safe place; 11. Give prompt attention to even minor injuries; 12. Keep guns unloaded except when actually using them; 13. Don't use kerosene to start fires: 14. Don't smoke around the barn; 15. Never swim alone. Never dive into water without first determining the depth.



Watch This Skin Disease

When a state health authority says there is no such thing as a nat ural resistance to impetigo, parents of small children know exactly
of small children know exactly
what he means. Those parents
whow perhaps from bitter exper know, perhaps from bitter exper ience, that the same individual can suffer repeated attacks from this offensive, annoying skin infection.

Althou children are unusually susceptible, impetigo can be found in any age group. It is most pre-valent during the summer mnths but has been known to occur at

any month. Impetigo is a purulent skin in-fection. It isn't serious except in new born babies. An invasion a hospital nursery ward calls extreme attention to keep uninfect ed babies from getting it for it spreads like fire in dry grass.

Impetigo is caused by a pus form ing bacteria called straphylococcus; same sort of germ found boils and sores where pus is present. Uusually it forms an unsightly crust over wide areas of the body. The pus underneath the hghly infectious if allowed to get on any other skin surface.

The infection is easily transmitt ed when a non infected person uses the towel of someone infected, since the towel moisture permits the germ to survive. Children living in the most hygienic homes frequent ly get impetigo, althou it is perhaps more common among children living in homes where personal sanit ation isn't considered too important

Eight Ways Farmers Can Use to Keep Down Cost

Tire service experts say there are eight things the average farmer can do to get the best possible return on his \$200 or more investment in the tires on his vehicles. And coming just at the start of the planting season they serve as timely suggestions.

According to the B. F. Goodrich farm service department, farmers observing these tips will not only protect their tires and make them last longer, but will obtain maximum efficiency from their equip-

1. Check air pressure twice a month, taking reading first thing in the morning when tires are cool. Never release air from tires



Regular examination of farm tires and prompt repairs to bruises or other damage may prevent most eostly repairs. Gaywood Wagner, Free-hold, N. J., is shown inspecting a sidewall cut in one of the multi-ring front tires on his

after running tractor for long periods in hot sun. This will result in under-inflation and possible tire damage when casing cools off.

2. Do not permit grease or oil to remain on tires. This shortens the life of rubber. Wash off chemicals which accumulate after spraying with tractor.

3. When using liquid weight in rear tractor tires, do not fill tire than three-quarters full of liquid. Maintain correct air pressure, because a slight leak under this condition will cause a much greater decrease in pressure than if the tire were 100 per cent air-

4. When tractor is not in use for long periods, jack it up and cover it. Inflate tires to recommended pressure before putting tractor back in service.

5. Always use valve caps to keep out dirt and moisture and to prevent possible trouble from leaky

6. Examine tires regularly for signs of damage and remove stones and other foreign objects from treads. Have cuts, bruises or other tire damage repaired as soon as they are discovered.

7. Choose correct size when purchasing tires, keeping in mind the load they must carry and the par-ticular job for which the tractor is

8. Drive carefully at all timesespecially on the highway—to obtain longer life from tires and to extend your own.

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

United States Ground Forces Sent Into Korea; Uneasy World Fears Crisis May Lead to New World War

Eight days after the Communists North Korea invaded United States sponsored South Korea the people of the democratic nations were breathing a little easier, with nly an occasional shiver of fear sweeping down their spines.

Developments in the crisis, which could yet plunge the world into World War III, came quickly after the initial invasion.

Using tanks and planes which the southern forces lacked, the Communists swept through Seoul and within 12 miles of Suwon, important air base of South Korea.

The army of South Korea made stand after stand, but could not halt the Russian made tanks and planes used by the Communists. Within 48 after the opening attack South Korea was in a difficult position and for a time it appeared the invaders would sweep south with less and less opposition.

Then came the historical order of President Truman sending United States navy and air force units to the aid of South Korea. It was followed two days later with an order sending U.S. troops to the battle

Military operations developed quickly and with surprising efficiency. Observers throughout the world were astonished at the speed with which the United States got fighting forces into the field.

Following the President's first order, the air force in Japan and naval units in that area, were put under command of General Mac-Arthur. The planes immediately attacked Communist troop concentrations, tanks and planes. The navy blockaded the Korean coast.

Within 24 hours after the second order, troops had landed in South Korea and were well on their way to the front.

Meanwhile, the South Korea army had rallied and established a temporary line along the Hon The Communist army crossed the river at one point and advanced toward Suwon.

General MacArthur has at his disposal in Japan four U.S. infantry divisions, consisting of 15,000 men each, a number of tanks and heavy guns. Whether or not he will use all of them depends upon developments within the next week or two, observers reported.

Admits Arson

Newspaper readers throughout the country forgot the Korean crisis long enough to express horror over the confession of a 20-year-old Circleville, O., youth who admitted setting the Ringling Brothers circus fire in Hartford, Conn., in 1944 that killed 168 persons and injured 412 others.

The youth, Robert Dale Segree, also admitted that he was personally responsible for the slaying of four persons.

The youth admitted setting be-25 and 30 major fires in Portland, Me., between 1939 and 1946 and other fires in New Hampshire and Ohio.

EUROPE:

A Case of Shakes

Europe suffered a severe case of 'shakes' following the outbreak of the Korean conflict. Europeans saw the horrors of World War II as it progressed across that continent from east to west, and what they saw will not soon be forgotten.

With this memory and a strong belief that Russia had finally come from behind the iron curtain to fight World War III, the nerves of Europeans were at the breaking point for the first week of the crisis.

As the situation developed, however, the tension eased, but by no means vanished. In many areas, Berlin for instance, the majority felt World War III had begun. In other sections the thought persisted that it was a dangerous situation, but with hopes it would not set the world afire with war.

Some of the reactions:

Vienna-Austrians were beginning to breathe easier after the first week of war jitters, but there remained widespread fear of war. There was a notable surge of growing confidence in the United Nations and the United States.

Frankfurt-The Germans, both east and west, were plainly scared The military picture in Korea re- at the possibility of the Korean ains confused and the future de- struggle drawing Europe into a

> Berlin-War fears in Berlin apparently were worse than at the start of the Soviet blockade of Berlin two years ago.

> London - Extremely disturbed over the possibility of war, but approved the action of the United States. The thought persisted that the Russians are not ready for a full scale war.

A United Front

More than anywhere else in the world, the Korean incident was uppermost in the minds of Americans. There was a great fear of war in all sections of the country. But most surprising reaction was the united front presented to the rest of the world.

Americans in every walk of life approved of President Truman's action. One and all approved the decision that told communism that the United States would stand by its commitments and the point had been reached where democracy would make a stand against totalitarianism.

Even congress, which has presented a confusing picture of inconsistencies during the Truman administration, approved of the chief executive's action.

Senator Taft of Ohio, apparently unwilling to rise above the political view took the opportunity to demand the resignation of Secretary of State Acheson. Many observers found his senate speech untimely. He demanded the resignation of Acheson on the grounds his policy in the Far East had been reversed completely by President Truman and he had, therefore, been operating under the wrong policy. For

Rep. Vito Marcantonio, noted for his Communist leanings, added his voice of protest, but most people were inclined to consider the source and let it go at that.

Politics

A new movement was seen in the Republican party following a meeting in Philadelphia of representatives from 10 states and issuance of a "declaration of prin-

Henry V. Poor, former president of the New York Young Republicans, said the group drafted the "declaration of principles" as a basis of "revitalizing the Republican party."

TAXES:

House Votes Cut

The 1950 tax bill, much to the amazement of Washington observers, won the approval of the house of representatives with a top-heavy vote of 375 to 14. As the measure went to the senate, observers were not making any predictions.

The bill calls for \$1,010,000,000 of reductions in the excise taxes annually paid on furs, jewelry, luggage, toilet articles, admissions communications, transportation and many other items.

The revenue loss, however, is offset by provisions to increase corporation taxes \$433,000,000 annually and close loopholes in other tax laws.

Observers were making no predictions about senate action because of complexities stemming from the Korean war. Many sena tors have indicated the tax problem would be much different and any relief might be ruled out if the situation developed demanding increases in this country's military

The Republicans have been fighting the measure because of the proposed increase in corporation

Also in the tax news, federal revenue in May soared nearly half a billion dollars above that of the same month a year ago.

But the total for the first 11 months in the fiscal year ending July 1 was still more than a billion below that of the corresponding period of the preceding fiscal year, the internal revenue bureau reported. The revenue in May from individ-

ual and corporation income taxes and from employment taxes was well up last year. For example, the individual income taxes collected in May were \$1,878,357,644, as compared with \$1,604,794,824 in May

DRAFT LAW:

Boys Must Register

President Truman signed the draft bill into law. It gives him unrestricted authority to order inductions resumed at any time and empowers him to put the National Guard and the reserves on active duty any time he sees fit to do so.

The law runs until July 9, 1951 and males from 19 to 26 are subject to induction. Observers were not much sui-

prised at the extension of the selective service law after the Korean incident hit the headlines. Before that, however, congress was in a knock down drag out battle over the bill.

When first considered last spring there was considerable doubt that the lawmakers would grant a continuation. At the minimum, they wanted to limit the President's power to start inductions going again. The Korean situation, however, brought about quick agreement.

GAMBLING:

Blow to Bookmakers

A senate subcommittee investigating gambling throughout the country have released the names of more than 2,000 subscribers to racing news wire services.

The move was newsworthy in that it should prove "useful" to local law enforcement officials in combatting gambling.

Senator Ernest W. McFarland, chairman of the committee, said his group had no proof that any particular individual on the list was a bookmaker. He pointed out that/some listings-for newspapers, radio stations and the like-obviously fall outside the gambling realm. But he added:

"I believe the majority of those listed are bookmakers.' The committee has announced

plans to hold hearings this month in Miami, St. Louis, Kansas City and Chicago.

Near Record

Agricultural employment rose to 99,046,000 compared with 8,062,000 in May. Nonagricultural employment rose by 750,000 to a total of 52,436,000 between May and June. For five straight months the employment has increased.

Emotional Causes Start 'Heartburn'

By Dr. James W. Barton

frequently heard, many who suffer with it believe it has something to do with the heart. They worry unnecessarily. It is called heartburn because it is close to the heart region but it is not caused in any way by the heart.

Heartburn, sometimes called cardiospasm (heart spasm) is due to an obstruction of the lower end of the tube (oesophagus) which carries food from the throat to the stomach. The obstruction is not due to food or other substance but to a partial closure (spasm) of this muscular tube.

Just what causes this tube to close partly and appear to cause a real mechanical obstruction is unknown. In my own experience a close relative was sure she had a growth in the tube because she could feel the food "sticking" in the tube just near the stomach. In order to convince her that no real obstruction was present, I had her watch, by means of the fluoroscope (X-ray) the food (barium) going structive symptoms.

WHILE THE TERM heartburn is down to the stomach. While this was a number of years ago, I believed that nervousness was causing the symptoms.

In Gastroenterology, Drs. S. Wolf and T. P. Almy report that they made repeated observations of swallowed barium sulfate in 14 patients with well-established cardiospasm. They found that the obstruction in the oesophagus was often associated with a decided amount of movement of the lower two-thirds of the oesophagus.

Even when the oesophagus was widened to some extent, the cardiospasm was present; it was only when it was greatly widened that this extra amount of movement disappeared. These two physicians found that these spasms bore a direct relation to stresses and strains or freedom from stress and strain in the emotional life of these patients.

Bruising Causes Great Meat Waste Packing Industry Loss \$25,000,000 Last Year

America's livestock industry lost \$31,914,677 in dead, bruised and crippled animals in 1949.

Meat waste due solely to bruising, much of which could be prevented by greater care in handling of live-stock on the farm and in transit, was more than \$25,000,000.

These figures were disclosed by the National Live Stock Loss Pre-vention Board, an organization founded to promote better care and

handling of livestock.
In 1949 the animals dead on arrival at the nation's stock yards would have filled a train 101/2 miles



American livestock producers lost more than \$25,000 in 1949 because of waste meat resulting from bruised animals. Pictured above is the carcass of a hog which was condemned because



Old Half Dollar Commemorates Trip

The Old Spanish Trail half dollar of 1935 commemorated the 400th anniversary of the first overland trek on land that now is part of the U.S.

The expedition, heading westward through the gulf states and ending in what is now El Paso, was organized by Cabez de Vaca, a Spaniard, in 1535 in St. Augus-

The 10,008 halves of this special series were struck at the Philadel-phia mint in September, 1935, and they were distributed at \$2 each by the El Paso Museum committee, with the profit furthering the mu-

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L. W. Hoffecker, El Paso coin collector and later president of the American Numismatic association designed the coin. Edmund J. Senn prepared the models. No portrait of de Vaca is known so, as the explorer's name means "head of a cow," this device was chosen for the obverse (heads) of the coin. The words include Liberty/Alvar Nunex Cabeza de Vaca/United States of America/E Pluribus Unum/Half Dollar.

On the other side is a yucca tree in full bloom superimposed upon a map showing the expedition's route through Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas, the dates 1535-1935 and the words El Paso/Old Spanish Trail/In God
