MANY PESTY INSECTS THIS YEAR

Austin -- This can be said withwe'll have more out reservation nsects to Ight this year than ever before, especially flies and mosquit-oes. The reason is the unprecedent ed seige of wet weather most of the state is going thru this spring. Mosquitoes breed in standing water → whether in a Gulf Coast standing marsh, a West Texas stock tank, or a tin can or old tires in the back yard. They harbor in damp vegetatiin and undergrowth like have so much this year. As for flies, they breed in the garbage and filth of the area. And conditions are equally favorable for most other insect species. Insects have troubled man ever since he has been on earth. In all there are some thousand insect public enemies that do \$4 billion in damage annually. It is only by constant ef-fort that man is able to hold his own against insects.

Insecticides have steadily im-proved. One, DDT, was developed in 1942, and gave early promise of providing the knockout against insect hordes. But it hasn't. Flies, salt marsh mosquitoes, roaches, and lice quickly developed resistance to the chemical and Mex ican beetles, spider mites and many aphids are not affected by it.

Today we know a complete pro-gram of insect control calls for con stant application of good home and community sanitation things as garbage cans with tight lids, good systems of garbage pick-ups and well operated sewerage disposal plants - together periodic spraying with effective in-

Austin — For the past two weeks the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee has been holding hearings in Washington in an attempt to unravel one of the knottiest pro-blems of the day — the dangers of mass radiation exposures in this

Atomic Age.

The committee is interested chiefly in the effects of radioactive "fall-out" from nuclear weapons tests, but there is much more to the story than that. The very nature of radiant energy makes it at once a boon and a peril to human health. Let's look at the "boon" side first.

For 60 years radiating devices in the skilled hands of technicians have been tools of unparalleled importance in diagnosing and treating various diseases. X-ray and fluoroscopic machines actually per-mit the physician or dentist to "photograph" the interior of the human body and aim beams of deep penetrating rays - sometimes pushed by 2 million volts of electricity — have long been among the most effective ways of treating diseases in practically any body

These endless alfantages the reasons for possible peril, Radia activity can accumulate in the body so little exposures from day to day may add up to big exposures after weeks or months. However, physicians take total exposure into account when they use radiation.

Since September the State Health Department has controlled radiation devices and materials with the state. So far more than 1500 devices and materials have been registered, some 1400 them in the realm of medical practice and reseach.


