Third．Any man or woman or body of men and women attempt tig to perform without first se curing a license shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon con viction in corporation court，each individual must pay a fine not less than $\$ 10.00$ ．
Fourth．That，this ordinance shall be in full force and effect after its passage and publication as required by law．
